

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The Feast of the Holy Family



The Feast of the Holy Family:

The Nobel award winning Slavic writer, Ionesco, wrote a play, *The Bald Soprano*. There is a scene in the play in which a man and a woman board a train from Manchester to London. They squeeze their way through a crowded carriage to reach their reserved seats. As luck would have it, they were sitting opposite one another. The man "breaks-the-ice" with a harmless question: "Where do you come from?" The woman, caught off guard, volunteered, "Why, Manchester!" "And, where do you live," she was quick to inquire? "I'm from Manchester, too," he replies. Now, A little

emboldened, he asks, "Where in Manchester do you live?" Opening up a little, she gave her street address, while asking him, "And, where do you live in Manchester?" To which he responds, "I live on that same street." Throwing caution to the wind, he presses her, "And where on that street do you live?" She volunteered the street number. She presses him with the same question, "And where do you live on that street?" You guessed the answer – he lived at the same number – they were husband and wife. Ionesco, a perceptive writer, exaggerates to make a point: in the modern world, it is possible to live in the same house with someone, sleep in the same bed and, not really know that person. Frank Sinatra alludes to it in song, "Strangers in the night." The Beatles, in their hit, "Eleanor Rigby," express a similar refrain; "Look at all those lonely people."



A paradox in the modern family is that family members can be strangers in the most intimate of settings. Why? There is a kind of rugged individualism – "doing-your-own-thing:" "me" not "we," or, "us" at the center of our lives. Couple that with being 'wired' into our own impersonal world – Podcasts, iPhones, "chat rooms" etc. St. Paul discerns the malaise when he writes, "If I have the gift of prophecy, understanding


all the mysteries there are and knowing everything and if I have faith, in all its fullness, to move mountains, but without love, then I am nothing" (1Cor 13: 3). Addiction to technology – information - leads to a disconnect in relational intimacy.

The Holy Family 'imaged' God's love. God's love is an 'I-Thou' - relational love – "God is love" – which He expresses in the Blessed Trinity. His love becomes 'real' - human – for us through his Son: "God so loved the world that he sent his only Son into the world ... (John 3: 16). God did not send a Book – the Bible. No, He sent a



Person – His Son. The family is an 'I-Thou,' inter-personal relational school in which love is caught and, not merely taught. The 3 "Rs" - reading, writing and arithmetic – are important. The most important "R" is the 4th "R" – experiencing love in 'I – thou' inter-personal family relationships. The family is a school of relational love where love is caught & not merely taught.

Thursday, January 1st: The Feast of Mary, the Mother of God Holy Day of Obligation: Vigil Mass: 4 P.M., Morning masses: 8 and 10:30 A.M.

When the shepherds hear God's message in today's Gospel, "they went in haste" to Bethlehem. Those who heard the message "were amazed." Mary's response to the mystery of Jesus' birth – "She treasured these things in her heart." Let's briefly reflect on each of these three responses.

"The shepherds went in haste" to Bethlehem, when they heard the angel's message. When Mary heard the angel Gabriel's message, she "went with haste into the hill country" to visit her cousin Elizabeth. When Abraham heard God's message to leave his homeland, he acted with haste. and went to a land that he did not know existed. When God raised up Moses and directed him

to lead his people out of slavery in Egypt, "he acted with haste."

How do we respond to God's Word? Do I put it off? In the words of St. Augustine, do I say, "Lord, make me chaste, but not just yet." Or, "Yes," "I'll get around to getting out of bed on a Sunday morning to take my children to Mass – and teach by example." Or, do I "Act with haste?"

What "amazed them?" God breaking into human history as a vulnerable, helpless child. In the words of St. Thomas Aquinas, in his famous Eucharistic hymn, "Godhead here in hiding, whom I adore." We have lost a sense of "amazement," "a sense of wonder." We do not have a sense of "Emmanuel – God with us," in the Eucharist or in the Tabernacle – "Godhead here in hiding," – the Transcendent God "in hiding." Yet, the shepherds, Mary and Joseph were "amazed" at the "disguise of God," "here in hiding" in a helpless, vulnerable, impoverished baby Jesus. The very normal young 15-year-old Italian teenager, Carlo Acutis, who was canonized a Saint by Pope Leo X1V in Rome recently, couldn't understand how fellow teens who line up in their thousands to purchase tickets to 'Rock concerts,' football games, or, the latest phones, did not see the same teens "queue ...in front of the Tabernacle... So, he realized that people don't understand the importance of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist." They have no sense of the Jesus "in disguise" in the Eucharist or Tabernacle. They have no sense of "amazement," or "wonder."

"She treasured these things in her heart." Mary, while remaining a virgin, gave birth to the child Jesus, did not fully understand God's plan; so, she "treasured these things in her heart" and, "pondered them." The German Jesuit theologian Fr. Karl Rahner, a prominent theologian at the Second Vatican Council (1962-65), stated that by the time he was twelve, he had learned the essential core of his faith; he spent the rest of his life attempting to understand it. That is the purpose of theology, "faith seeking understanding." Mary was the first theologian – "She kept these things in her heart and pondered them." That is why it is so important to, not only read the word of God, but to reflect on it – to like Mary, 'treasure... and ponder it." Do we ever take one of the Gospels and read a passage from it and reflect on it? In the 60's, many young people went East – John Lennon of Beatles fame - to learn to be quiet and "contemplate." Father Karl Rahner, was quoted as saying, "The devout Christian of the future will either be a "mystic," one who has experienced "something," or he/she will cease to be anything at all." You don't need to go East. Do what Mary did, "She treasured these words in her heart and pondered them."

New Year's Resolution: Read the scriptures: be "amazed:" "Treasure... and ponder them."



Primero, ¿cuánto recordamos lo que Dios ha hecho por nosotros? ¿Qué tan bien conocemos las historias de salvación que se encuentran en las Escrituras? ¿Recordamos las oraciones que Dios ha respondido, como nos ha guiado, el amor de Dios que otros nos han mostrado, y las veces que Dios nos ha perdonado?

Segundo, ¿cuánto reflexionamos sobre lo que Dios ha hecho? Incluso si tenemos muchos recuerdos de la bondad de Dios hacia nosotros, también debemos orar y preguntarnos cómo hemos cambiado debido a lo que Dios ha hecho. ¿Perdono las heridas más fácilmente? ¿Comparto mi fe con mi familia o amigos? ¿Apoyo a mi parroquia con mi tiempo u ofrendas? 

But she [Mary] was greatly troubled at what was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be -Luke 1:29.

And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart - Luke 2:19.

He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was

obedient to them; and His mother kept all these things in her heart-Luke 2:51.

When we pray the Rosary, we follow the example of Our Lady. Luke's Gospel repeats that Mary "pondered," Mary "reflected," Mary "kept all these things in her heart." Pious tradition tells us that Mary was the one who created the Stations of the Cross, allowing her to walk again and again at the side of her Son during His Passion and death. She contemplated the mysteries of the life of her Son, keeping them in her heart, in her memory, at the very center of her being. Doing this, she becomes a model and icon of the Church.

It's the Church's task to "do this in remembrance of Me" - to offer the Passover of the Lord, the Eucharist, over and over again till the end of time. It's the Church's task to preach the Gospel, the same Gospel, and preserve and spread the one faith in Jesus Christ in all ages till Christ's Second Coming. It's the Church's job to remember the events of Christ's life, to ponder them so thoroughly that we are transformed by them, that we come to resemble them, that we become the Body of Christ to the height and depth of our being.

Christ's life has this power to transform us because He is God. As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches us:

His Paschal mystery ... is unique: all other historical events happen once,



and then they pass away, swallowed up in the past. The Paschal mystery of Christ, by contrast, cannot remain only in the past, because by His death He destroyed death, and all that Christ is - all that He did and suffered for all men - participates in the divine eternity, and so transcends all times while being made present in them all. The event of the Cross and Resurrection abides and draws everything toward life (1085).

By 'pondering these things in our hearts' like Mary did, we shall become holy. We shall have a share in the eternal life of Christ. This 'pondering,' this 'loving contemplation of the life of Jesus, is the spirituality of the Immaculate Heart, is how we come to 'know' Jesus.
