

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First Sunday of Advent

The Advent message is clear: "Be awake!" "Be aware!" Do not let the "shop 'til you drop' mantra distract us from the "disguises" Jesus takes on as we prepare for his coming this Christmas.



"Stay awake... for an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come"

Advent begins a new Liturgical Year. The word Advent comes from a Latin word which means "coming," referring to the coming of Jesus. There are a series of "comings." There was the original historical coming, 2000 years ago. There is the "coming" at the end of the world — normally referred to as the "2nd coming." Advent is a "remote preparation for that coming." Advent is an "immediate" preparation for the coming of Christ - "Now.!"

How?

An old Hasidic tale will help us to understand what Matthew is referring to when he admonishes us to "be aware" and "to be awake" now. The Tale goes: a Rabbi asked his students: "How can we determine the hour of dawn, when the night ends and the day begins? One of the Rabbi's students suggested: "When from a distance you can distinguish between a dog and a sheep?" "No," was the answer of the Rabbi. "Is it when one can distinguish between a fig tree and a grapevine?" asked a second student. "No," the Rabbi said. "Please tell us the answer then," said the students. "It is, then," said the wise teacher, "when you can look into the face of another human being and you have enough light in you to recognize your brother or your sister. Until then, it is night, and darkness is still with us." (Finding My Way Home, Henri J.M. Nouwen).

Some commentators have said that **the Catholic Church is a kind of Rip Van Winkle**, a kind of sleeping giant, at least "**sleep walking**." In the preceding verses to today's Gospel, we hear Jesus say, "the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light." This is the way things were before Jesus, the Messiah and Savior was born and entered human history 2,000 years ago.

Where do we encounter Jesus now?

If we look deeper, we will "see" his face in many different disguises.

Listen to **St. Thomas Aquinas**: "Godhead here in hiding whom I adore, masked by these bare shadows, shape and nothing more..."

Gerald Manley Hopkins, commenting on & developing the phrase 'God here in hiding.... here" stated, "Christ plays in ten thousand places, Lovely in limbs, and lovely in eyes not his...."



Matthew's Gospel names many of those disguises, like: "I was hungry...thirsty...naked...in prison...sick...a stranger...as long as you did it to one of these, the least of my brethren, you did it to me."

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THE ADVENT WREATHS

Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the **four weeks of Advent**. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and good works undertaken at this time. **The rose candle** is lit on the third

Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas. The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent

(or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent)

When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated **in the home**, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

Blessing of an Advent Wreath

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord. **Response (R/.)** Who made heaven and earth?

Reading: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone. You have brought them abundant joy and great rejoicing, as they rejoice before you as at the harvest, as men make merry when dividing spoils... For a child is



born to us, a son is given to us; upon his shoulder dominion rests. They name him Wonder-Counselor, God-Hero, Father-Forever, and Prince of peace. His dominion is vast and forever peaceful, from Davis's throne, and over his kingdom, which he confirms and sustains by judgment and justice, both now and forever, the zeal of the Lord of hosts will do that." (Is 9: 1-6). Reader: The Word of the Lord. R/. Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader prays

Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation. Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation? May he come quickly and not delay. We ask this through Christ our Lord. **R**/. Amen.

The blessing may conclude with a verse from "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"


OLG Ladies Guild Christmas Luncheon Meeting

St Nicholas & Gift-giving – Feast, Sat, Dec 6th

Some hold that the practice of Christmas giftgiving goes back to the birth of Jesus, when the **Magi** brought gifts of **Gold**, **Frankincense and Myrrh** to the stable at Bethlehem.

Others, hold that the practice of gift-giving goes back to **St. Nicholas** – whose feast day is **December 6** – it goes back to the **5**th **century**, when he was **Bishop of Myra** in contemporary Turkey.

He came from a wealthy family in which his parents died when he was very young. He inherited his parent's wealth. Despite inheriting his parent's wealth, he decided to become a priest and was later appointed a Bishop. He used all of his wealth to help those who were most in need.

In our time, the practice of gift-giving has been taken over by **secular commercial concerns**, which see it as an opportunity to make a lot of money.

Like St. Nicholas, we can keep the true spirit of gift-giving at Christmas time, by giving to those who are in need. It is in that spirit that we invite you to bring "**Gift-Cards**," place them on the Jesse Tree, or, place them in the box under the Jesse Tree. We will distribute the gifts to families in need for Christmas.

- 7. Podemos adoptar una familia que pasa necesidad, preparando una canasta con alimentos

básicos y obsequios para que puedan celebrar una Navidad digna.

- **8.** Recolectar juguetes para entregárselos a niños de escasos recursos.
- **9.** Celebrar el cumpleaños del Nino Jesús. Prepare un bizcocho dedicado a Jesús y canten las Mañanitas o Feliz Cumpleaños.
- **10.** Cantar o escuchar villancicos.

Son muchos los medios que podemos poner para celebrar bien la Navidad. Pero lo más importante es tener el corazón bien dispuesto, abierto y agradecido, para encontrarnos con el Niñito Jesús que nace por amor, y que quiere poner su morada en cada uno de nosotros.
