Discussion Topics

1. RIC Strategic Plan Presentation

Vicar Emily has focused on the plan as her graduate project working in conjunction with the *RIC in Action* subcommittee of Just Love. "Our Guiding Principles" came out of conversations with staff, Council, and multiple meetings with various groups and committees. She employed SWAT analysis as part of the information gathering process. The purpose of the plan is to define who we are as a congregation as stated in our welcome statement.

Our Guiding Principles

1. Rooted in Scripture, Relationships, and Intersectionality

Our faith calls us to love and welcome all people, seeing Christ in one another. We ground our actions in Scripture, nurture authentic relationships, and embrace the intersectionality of identities within our community.

2. Radical Welcome and Inclusion

We commit to being a church where all people—inclusive of gender, sexual orientation, race, ability, or background—can fully belong. We affirm that God's love is for everyone and work to embody that truth in our words and actions.

3. Listening with Love and Compassion

When disagreements arise, we choose to listen first; we seek to understand one another's perspectives with humility and grace, recognizing that transformation often comes through conversation and connection.

4. Centering the Marginalized

Following Jesus' example, we prioritize voices and experiences that have historically been overlooked, silenced or harmed. Our faith calls us to justice, ensuring that all are seen, heard, and valued.

5. Acting with Courage and Conviction

We are unafraid to live out our faith boldly. Whether in our worship, our service, our advocacy, or our daily interactions, we seek to shine Christ's light in the world—through action, service, and solidarity.

6. Joyful and Hopeful Witness

We embrace joy in our faith journey, celebrating progress and possibilities. We cultivate hope, trusting that God is always at work in and through us, leading us toward a more just and loving world.

7. Creating Spaces for Growth and Transformation

Conflict is not an obstacle but an opportunity. We approach difficult conversations with openness, curiosity, and the expectation that we will grow together as a community of faith.

8. Flexibility in Our Approach, Commitment to Our Vision

While our vision remains steadfast, we recognize that there are many paths to achieving it. We remain adaptable, discerning new ways to live into our mission while staying true to our core values.

9. Building Bridges Across Differences

Within this sacred openness, we remain committed to conversations and actions rooted in love, dignity, and respect for all people. We acknowledge that perspectives can differ, yet we affirm that any form of hatred, exclusion, or diminishing the humanity of another will have no place among us. Together, we strive to embody Christ's expansive, compassionate welcome.

10. Trusting the Holy Spirit in Our Discernment

We leave room for the movement of the Spirit, recognizing that wisdom often emerges when we pause, reflect, and pray. We lean into contemplative practices that guide us toward deeper understanding and faithful action.

"The Work of the Church" incorporates seven ways to live out our welcome statement. This is the work of the whole church, not just a committee. It lists ways to make a shared commitment through:

- 1. Leadership Accountability & Modeling
- 2. Worship & Liturgy Integration
- 3. Congregational Formation & Education
- 4. Congregational Cultural Shift
- 5. Ministry & Service Alignment
- 6. Communication & Visibility
- 7. Regular Reflection and Growth

- Discussion involved wording statements in a way that they are sustainable and stand the test of time.
- We might separate concrete and aspirational goals. Implementation needs to be done carefully.
- Perhaps set up a RACI by subgroup or committee to see who will take responsibility for overseeing implementation of the seven areas
- May need to narrow down to just a few goals to start
- Each committee needs to consider how they can incorporate the Welcome Statement into their Committee

The Council decided that the goal for this quarter is to specifically address how each Committee can incorporate the Guiding Principles into their work. Council members will work with the committees to see how they can address this.

0, Staffing Updates

The organizational chart was updated. Interviews are ongoing for the Children's Director. In the interim, Emily Moentman will be acting Children's Coordinator. Kim will not be returning. Karen will continue leading Surge and Ignition until someone is hired. Alexandria Colaiianni will be coming on as Congregational Wellness Coordinator. The position of Women's Chorale Director is currently open.

0. Flooring Update

Work began last week. Everything was going well until asbestos was discovered as they pulled up the carpeting. The vendor putting in the flooring will not proceed until asbestos abatement is done. If we implement asbestos abatement in all church areas where asbestos is present, it will cost \$45,000. We can save \$10-15,000 if we only address areas within our current flooring plan. While flooring in some storage rooms and the Bach Room may be candidates for abatement in the future, they currently pose no hazard and were not in the approved reflooring plan. The Council was presented with two options:

1. Address asbestos abatement in the areas currently under renovation. Additional funds will also be needed to replace subflooring. Since other areas of the church are in good shape and pose no danger, they will be addressed at a later date.

 Address asbestos abatement in the flooring of ALL areas of the church where asbestos may be present. This would involve replacing flooring that had not been earmarked for renovation at this time. Besides the additional asbestos abatement cost, we would need to provide funding for replacement flooring that was not in the plan.

The motion was made by Dave Mevis to do asbestos abatement only in the originally scheduled areas. The motion was seconded by Kathy. The motion was approved.

Because the amount will be over \$50,000, Council must approve appropriation of funds.

The motion was made by Dave Mevis to approve funds for asbestos abatement in the originally scheduled areas. The motion was seconded by Kathy. The motion was approved.

Jim Bono made a motion to amend the above motion in that it would be referred to the Finance and Property Committees to decide how to fund the abatement. The motion was seconded by Kris. The motion was approved.

To bring this vision to life, we are forming a *Bread Making Team*. This ministry will meet in a gluten-free kitchen for training during August and September. Team members will bake loaves for worship about every six to eight weeks, depending on our schedule and need. Whether you are an experienced baker or eager to learn, your hands and heart will help us serve Christ and neighbor.
