Again and again Jesus shows up among the hungry, the naked, the jailed, the poor and the outcasts. Our Saviour's cannot keep silent when it comes to showing the world that God is at work even, and especially, in the midst of these controversial topics. We are committed to having Courageous Conversations.

In our Courageous Conversations series, which will kick off Wednesday, April 17, at Celebration Campus, we will hear speakers who share stories of hope and resilience in the midst of struggle. Through these conversations, we in turn might better understand how to reject injustice where we find it and to work together to envision a better future for all. These conversations are for our whole community, so families are invited to attend together. (For our youngest conversation partners, we will have simple crafts and activities related to each topic.)

Our first Courageous Conversations series will take a closer look at Our Saviour's partner <u>Bright Stars of Bethlehem</u> (BSB), serving students in the occupied West Bank and Gaza. Knowing Jesus, Making Jesus Known

Someone You Should Know

KWYNN OLSON, Surge mentor and Sunday School teacher

For Kwynn Olson, helping to provide opportunities for kids to grow in their faith is important because of how formative those experiences were for him as a young person.

Kwynn, who has served as a Sunday School teacher for five years and as a Surge Confirmation mentor for the past two school years, was actively involved in youth programs at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Rockford growing up.

"I grew up in a family where church was pretty important," Kwynn says. "My grandfather was a minister in the Norwegian Lutheran Church, one of the churches that in time folded itself into the ELCA." Participating in youth choirs and other youth programs yielded invaluable friendships and "had a big impact on who I became," he reflects.



"If I'm going to expect other people to help, then I need to be willing also to help," Olson says.

Kwynn met his wife, Kristin, while both were students at Bradley University in Peoria, and the pair moved north to the Chicago suburbs to begin their careers. Looking ahead to starting their family, they sought a church home that was comfortably large, in line with the Catholic parish in which Kristin had grown up, and that offered strong children's and youth programs. When they found Our Saviour's in Naperville, "kids seemed to want to be at church," Kwynn says. "The church really seemed to be trying to build a foundation for them."

Kwynn and Kristin married at OSLC in 2008. Kwynn now is social studies department chair at Bolingbrook High School, and Kristin, a marketing graduate, works for Enterprise Rent-a-Car. They live in Montgomery and have two children, Henry (12) and Eleanor (9).

Kwynn first signed on as a Sunday School teacher when Henry was starting grade school. When Henry started middle school, Kwynn started serving as a Surge mentor. (Continued on p. 3)

(Continued from p. 2) "I try to help out in my kids' schools and in their other activities," Kwynn says. "I guess I have generally an attitude that if I'm going to expect other people to help, then I need to be willing also to help. If I want my kids to have nice things, nice opportunities, I can't expect other people to provide them."

Serving as a Sunday School teacher and Surge mentor has been rewarding and encouraging, says Kwynn. Both everyday moments in Surge and special trips, like youth retreats, offer meaningful experiences for students and lessons for mentors, he suggests. "We often times find ourselves dividing into groups, dividing into factions, but to be able to go to a place where none of that really matters and everyone is able to drop their guard a little bit, I think that's really great," he says.

In Our Saviour's, he says, "I feel blessed to find a spiritual home for my family and for my kids." Kwynn takes the long view, as well: "Making sure there are opportunties for kids to grow is important for my own children, and I think it's important for the church," he says. If Easter is about Jesus' rising from the dead, why do we hide eggs?

Each week, my work as associate pastor for youth & family ministry gives me opportunities to connect with the youths of Our Saviour's and catch a glimpse of these amazing young people's faith Here, high school Ignition students share their perspectives on our question of the month!





John Norweathers: I think that when Jesus was crucified and placed in the tomb, before he was risen from the dead, he was put away like candy being put into an egg. When someone takes something out of the egg, it symbolizes Jesus breaking out of death or rising up.

Emma Doyle: It's because you hide your alleluias during Lent, and then on Easter you find them again, like finding an egg!

Berit Mores: I think we hide eggs during Easter because the candy represents Jesus, who is risen out of the tomb, and the egg is the tomb.





Eileen Schuler: It's supposed to symbolize Jesus rising from the dead, and when you open the egg, there is a surprise, and you are searching for that.
