

### A LEPTON FOR YOUR THOUGHTS

A *lepton* (Gr.) was the smallest of coins used in Jesus' day and was made of copper. Like our erstwhile pennies--which we are no longer making, since each one costs 3.7 cents to make! This coin figures large in a teaching of Jesus which we really need to hear: "And He looked up and saw the rich putting their gifts into the treasury. And He saw a poor widow putting in two small copper coins" (Luke 21:1-2 NASB).

The scenario is simple. Obviously rich people were putting in obviously large gifts into the horn-shaped receptacles at the temple. And an obviously poor widow put in two leptons. How did Jesus know that she was a poor widow? Those facts could have been at least partially observed, but the biggest fact about this woman could not have been known by anything except divine omniscience: "And He said, "'Truly I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all of them; for they all out of their surplus put into the offering; but she out of her poverty put in all that she had to live on" (Luke 21:3-4). Jesus knew that she had put in a different kind of offering than the rich people he had observed because he is the *kardiognosta* (Gr.), the knower of hearts.

We need to do some parsing of this teaching to keep from missing his point. The point cannot be that Jesus wants us all to give until it hurts, as some have taught. No, we are explicitly told that God blesses his children for our own sakes and that we may give to others. If we gave everything away we would be refusing his blessing and negating our opportunity to give to others.

It cannot mean that the gifts of rich people don't matter much simply because they are rich. That would include all of us in the West, by the way, since even the humblest of us is in possession of many things only available to kings and queens in the past. No, God has used wealthy people of faith to propel the plan of redemption through the ages, namely Abraham, Moses, Joseph of Arimathea, Joanna the wife of Chuza, unnamed women of means who supported Jesus, and many others.

Allow me to pull in a Biblical concept from the broad context. Jesus told the Samaritan woman at the well that God seeks those who will worship him in spirit and in truth. I take that to mean that no external acts are intrinsically worshipful. Everything depends on the intent of our hearts. And Jesus knows that intent full well. The same exact act could be meaningful or not when done by different people for different inward reasons.

What drew the praise of Jesus for the gift of the poor widow is immensely beautiful. First, he knew that her gift, which was tiny in monetary terms, represented an inward trust in God for her daily needs. This is a precious jewel to our Lord, and he has ordered the providential course of our lives to draw this kind of restful faith from within us.

Second, in spite of her own need, the poor widow prioritized the needs of others over her own. Paul said this about the materially poor Christians in Macedonia as they gave to the starving believers in Jerusalem: "For I testify that according to their ability, and beyond their ability, they gave of their own accord, begging us with much urging for the favor of participation in the support of the saints…" (2 Corinthians 8:3-4).

Our hearts should be pierced by her example. Our intentions deserve a regular and intense examination by the Holy Spirit using the scalpel of the word of God. Am I thinking that just because I do a certain thing that I have genuine faith in that area of my life? Jesus knows whether I do or do not. Am I thinking that outwardly large deeds have more value than outwardly small deeds? Jesus knows, and he yearns for us all to learn faith and love in the depths of our being. The outward deeds are merely the context by which the inward spiritual life is revealed.

Two leptons revealed the thoughts of the poor widow. So it goes for us in work, family, ministry, community, and all of life. May we give our Lord what he wants most of all, and may we enjoy his immense pleasure in so doing!





One of the key characteristics in a thriving and positive ministry environment is trust among the members of the team Trust is something that takes time and is earned. Every church we've entered as a new ministry couple was one in which we had to build relationships and earn trust. We discovered that as people learn that you care about them, and have their best interest at heart, they begin to trust you and open up. And that is something you cannot rush.

In fact, I've often found that people who are immediately open and transparent are often the ones that end up being a problem down the road. It is the people who take time to learn to trust and feel comfortable that often become our biggest supporters.

As team members learn to trust you, they will begin to share their struggles, joys and concerns. They will do this because they know that no matter what they are struggling with you are in their corner and that you seek to help them thrive and grow.

As we seek to build a positive ministry environment, we must understand that this will only happen as we strive to help others be the best version of who God created them to be. That happens as we notice their strengths and point those out. It happens as we affirm their spiritual gifts and give them opportunities to gain confidence in using them in ministry. And it also happens as we have those harder conversations and address weaknesses in a loving manner.

When people trust you and know you want to build them up, it creates an environment where they will flourish. And a thriving and flourishing team is one that is a joy to work with in ministry.

# Why Do We Sing Carols at Christmas?

The tradition of singing carols at Christmas has a very long and complex history dating back thousands of years. Song has often been used in various forms to unify a people, to preserve, and to pass down important events in history and culture. The birth of Christ is no different.

The first century church incorporated many of the worship elements found in the Jewish synagogue into Christian worship, including chanting and the singing of Psalms. In Ephesians 5:19, Paul encouraged the early church to "speak to one another with psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs from the Spirit." As the gospel message spread throughout the world and the Roman Empire, early church music was sung in Latin and was not understood by the common parishioner.

The first known Christmas carol was commissioned by a Roman Bishop in 129 AD and was titled "Angel's Hymn". This began a tradition of composers writing carols to be sung during the Latin Christmas Mass, continuing until the arrival of the Middle Ages around 1200 AD. During these dark times, most people in Europe lost interest in celebrating Christmas completely - widely assumed due to the language barrier of the Latin liturgy.

In 1223 AD, a young monk by the name of Francis of Assisi had a burden on his heart to reach the common man with the message of God. Francis recognized that the message of salvation wasn't being translated (literally) from the clergy to the people. He began presenting Nativity plays in the Umbrian language of his region in Italy, and included songs telling the account of the birth of Christ. These songs became increasingly popular among the people, spreading to countries all over Europe. The tunes were the same, the message was the same, and these carols were translated into languages all could understand. Through Christmas carols, the story of how our Savior came to dwell among us was now able to be heard, understood, and passed down from generation to generation!

Today, carols are sung at Christmas all around the world and in many different languages. These songs are well known and are included in traditions outside of the church walls. The message of salvation is being proclaimed through carol singing as a powerful evangelism tool!

"Sing to the LORD, praise His Name; proclaim His salvation day after day. Declare His glory among the nations, His marvelous deeds among all peoples." Psalm 96: 2-3 (NIV)

As we sing our favorite carols this Christmas season, let's pray that the message of hope, peace, love, and joy will bring to salvation those all around the world joining in the same song.
