John #42: No Greater Love (John 15:12-17)

PRAY

Loving one another does not come naturally to us... Do you agree with that claim?

It might not seem accurate at first, that: Loving one another does not come naturally to us 'Cause think about how a newborn baby automatically loves their parents

That seems pretty natural, right? And yes, biological or familial love is natural However, I'm not talking about love as the feeling of affection

I'm talking about love as the action—the giving of ourselves for others' sake That love—which is, more definitionally, true love—doesn't come naturally No, what's natural to us is looking out for ourselves... Gobbling up what we need, grabbing what we want, and grappling with anyone else who gets in our way

We need to be told to love and taught how to love... We need to see examples of love Or else we will never love as we need to love

Thankfully, most of us can point to people in our lives who taught us or showed us how to love

But even more than any of them, we have a supreme teacher and example in Jesus Christ He commands us to love, teaches us to love, and shows us by example what love is I'd like to show you this from the Bible...So please **OPEN** up with me to John 15 [page #902]

We're smack dab in the middle of Jesus' final discussion with his disciples before his death He just made his final 'I Am' statement in John, claiming to be the true vine: **READ v.5**¹ He went on to say: **READ v.9-11**²... So remember: He is after our complete joy He wants the absolute best for us... Let that frame his words we'll hear today

We'll start in v.12: **READ v.12³**... That might sound familiar to you...

As he said almost the same thing back in chapter 13, probably like an hour before this: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

Why was Jesus being so repetitive?

Well, this a discourse... And we all naturally repeat ourselves in discourse
I mean, if you listen closely, I'll repeat myself numerous times in this sermon
Even when it's not the exact words, it's the same ideas, concepts, and themes
Why? Sometimes we're forgetful, but usually it's when we want to emphasize something

We want to make sure that whoever we're talking to *gets* what we're saying If you've been with us throughout John, I'm sure you noticed John as a whole is repetitive: Father, Son, Spirit, life, light, love, glory, believe, behold, obey, abide, and so on

John doesn't want us to miss the truth of things, like they, the first disciples, often did I'm sure that's part of why Jesus was so repetitive: they didn't get it yet So today, don't get annoyed by Jesus repeating the same things over and over Ask yourself: Do I get it yet? Have I grasped it? And am I living it out?

[tr] So what did Jesus want to emphasize here? His command to love, based on his love: **READ v.12⁴...** Obviously this isn't Jesus' *only* commandment for his followers

But love does beautifully sum up the heart of his commands
Here, Jesus wanted to get it through his disciples' thick skulls—and ours'
By repeating it again and again... He would have us know, as J.C. Ryle commented, that "We can never think too highly of love, attach too much weight to it, or labour too much to practice it."

And Jesus doesn't just demand that we love, he demonstrates real love for us... So we see:

Jesus <u>loves</u> us so we'll <u>love one another</u> (v.12)

- [r] That's the big idea: We must love one another, as he loved us
- [r] Jesus loves us so that we'll love one another (See? Repetition!)
- Now, be careful: We're tempted to hear this command and immediately apply it to other people To think things like, 'Yeah, they should be apologizing to me... Or forgiving me... They really need to stop being so angry... They should be contributing more to our church... I've served before; now it's someone else's turn...' And on we go
- But no! We need to consider how *we* ought to love one another as Christ has loved us: Where we are not loving well, where we need to grow, and where God is at work in us
- Back in v.9, Jesus said, 'As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you.' Incredible... Incomprehensible... Amazing love, how can it be?
- But now he goes: **READ v.12b⁵**, and we're not so quick with the hallelujahs, are we? We think: Unreasonable... Impossible... How can it be?
- Loving like Christ loved can seem insurmountable... How can we ever live up to this standard? On one level, we can't... It's beyond us

No matter how much I try to love you, I won't love you as much as Christ did He loved us when we were unlovely... When we were his enemies... Unthinkable! Yet despite the fact that we can't reach this goal perfectly,

He still sets the standard for us to aspire to and aim for

But no wonder God sent us a Saviour to save us and a Spirit to help us!

With God purifying us and working in us, changing us,

We can, in truth, obey this commandment—and increasingly so In fact, 1 John 4 says God perfects his own love in us

Let's take heart that Jesus doesn't ask us to do anything he doesn't do first
He wants us to love one another... But he loved us first
Giving us both the example and the motivation to obey his commandment

I was horrified this week when I heard the lyrics of a new song by a formerly Christian artist
Who sang: "This is love. There is nothing that divides us from this boundless love divine"
OK, in Christ, that's true... But outside of Christ, sin does divide us from God's love
I guess it shouldn't surprise me, though, that heretics gonna heresy

But the part that was most disturbing was the conclusion of the song:

"This is love: This my mind, this my breath, this our life, this our death"

What?! No! We are not love... We don't mystically find love within ourselves!

On the contrary: "In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved

us, we also ought to love one another... We love because he first loved us... And this commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother." (1 John 4:9-11, 19, 21)

[tr] So... We're going to spend the rest of this time considering *how Jesus loves us* Jesus loves me! This I know, for the Bible tells me so

John 15 tells us so and tells us how Jesus loves us, from his own mouth I want to show you 4 ways Jesus loves us in order to motivate our love for one another... First:

Jesus loves us so we'll love one another [keep on screen with each sub-point]

➤ He loves as our <u>Substitute</u> (v.13)

[r] Jesus loves us as the ultimate, greatest substitutionary sacrifice... He's our Substitute

When we hear the word 'substitute' today, we may think of substitutes in sports,

Like a basketball or football player coming off the bench, taking someone else's place

Or perhaps a substitute teacher, who replaces your normal teacher for a time

But I want you to picture something else: I want you to imagine being on death row

And someone coming and saying, 'I want to take their place in death... Substitute me for them'

Or... Picture a hero, maybe a superhero, swooping in to save the day from an existential threat

Fighting off the bad guys, stopping the destruction, but losing their life in the process

Now listen to how Jesus describes the greatest possible love: **READ v.13**⁶ (or 'those he loves')

READ v.13a⁷... That just means: 'No one has a greater love than this'

This is the pinnacle, the apex, the zenith... This is peak love: READ v.13b⁸

If we think about it, almost no one would deny that sacrifice is the epitome of love,

And that life itself is the highest form of sacrifice

We see it baked into our collective consciousness as a culture

One movie, show, or book after another... Our stories echo the greatest story
From Baloo saving Mowgli to Anna saving Elsa to Iron Man or Black Widow to
Harry Potter to Baymax to Obi-Wan to Gandalf to Spock to Bing Bong...
Even in very non-Christian works, heroes die so others won't...
We all know, instinctively, the highest form of love is sacrifice, even unto death

READ v.13⁹... Jesus' disciples didn't realize yet that he was about to do this himself
He was going to die on behalf of his friends, the very next day
God's love would reach its climactic, greatest expression on the cross:
In the Father sacrificing the Son and the Son sacrificing himself
Which doubled as the Son substituting himself in death for those he loved
We were the ones that deserved to die... We are the ones destined to die, left on our own
But Jesus came to live the life we should have lived, yet fail to live
Though he had no sins for which to die, he died in our place, under God's judgment
He then rose from the dead, triumphing over our enemies of sin, death, and the devil
The world has *never* seen a greater display of love than in Jesus... There *is* no greater love

Do you know this love? Have you seen the lengths and depths God went to to love you? Have you believed that Jesus really did live, die, and rise again? Have you received his mercy, forgiveness, acceptance, and loving care?

If not, what are you waiting for? There is no greater news than this for you

There is no greater grace... No greater life-changing truth... No greater
gift... No greater affection... And it can all be yours through faith in Christ

And believer, have you grown numb to the greatness of this love? Does it move you still?

Do you recognize how this love should fill us with confidence, peace, joy, and endurance After all: "If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?"

(Romans 8:31-32)... Who can bring any charge against you? Who can ever condemn you? Who or what shall separate us from the love of Christ?

"For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39)

Then, so loved by God, we ought to live with a deep-set love for others, particularly believers As 1 John 3:16 says: "By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers."

Now, not many of us will likely actually, literally die for someone else

But we must all die to ourselves, living sacrificially for one another

The opposite of laying down our lives would be clinging to our lives and all that is ours

Refusing to share with those in need, not sacrificing our schedules for the sake of
someone else, always talking and never listening, always keeping to ourselves in private,
growing angry and bitter, not forgiving, not giving, not serving, or not praying for others

Positively, what does this look like? Loving others will always mean the sacrifice of something Whether our pride, our wealth, our time, our energy, our attention, our privacy, our comfort, our priorities, our getting even, our grudges, our winning, or our rights

If love is patient, it means we sacrifice our time and our tempers
If love is kind, it means we give up the habit or the right to be nasty or cruel
If love doesn't envy, we sacrifice our yearnings (our dreams) for what others have
If love doesn't boast, we stop putting ourselves above others in our speech
If love is not arrogant or rude, we won't emulate popular figures of the day

who are constantly insulting, cursing, or demeaning others
If love doesn't insist on its own way, we must be OK with others getting their way
If love is not irritable, it means crucifying our yelling at family members
If love is not resentful, it means doing hard heart work to make sure we forgive
If love doesn't rejoice at wrongdoing, we'll sacrifice our comfort or reputations
to keep speaking the truth in love

If love rejoices with the truth, we should be encouraging and celebrating others If love bears all things, it means putting up with a lot of negative stuff If love believes all things, it means believing the best about others,

not jumping to conclusions or interpreting things uncharitably If love hopes all things, it means believing God is at work in them too If love endures all things, it means going through tough times together And if love never ends, it means never giving up on a Christian relationship

Do you see? Love always will cost you something... It's always a sacrifice

But if Christ sacrificially substituted himself for us, we can follow in his footsteps And in countless, daily, small or big ways, echo the greatest love ever seen

[tr] Jesus loves us as our Substitute... But his love becomes much more personal than that He doesn't just die in our place in the past and then disappear No, he wants to be an ongoing, intimate, core part of our lives Which is an unimaginably glorious privilege for us... See:

➤ He loves as our Friend (v.14-15)

[r] Jesus shows us his love as the greatest, ultimate friend we could ever have

Right after saying how the greatest love lays down its life for friends, Jesus says: **READ v.14**¹⁰ Now, that doesn't mean his friendship with us is conditional upon our faithfulness Obedience doesn't make people Jesus' friends, it's what characterizes his friends After all, look what he says next... Their friendship was already a done deal: **READ v.15**¹¹

In chapter 13, after washing the disciples' feet, Jesus said they should serve as he had served But now he says their relationship was much closer than servants are to a master: **READ v.15a**¹² A servant relationship is a contractual or legal obligation...

There is not necessarily any intimacy, closeness, or confiding in each other But that's not the relationship Jesus wants with us... He wants friends! **READ v.15b**¹³

This is crazy on a number of fronts...

Compare this to other religions, almost all of which have distant and demanding gods They'll give the orders from afar, but they won't draw near in love, let alone friendship There's always a strong boundary between us and them... Transcendence, not nearness But in Jesus, we have the transcendent Creator coming down to our level,

and pursuing a close, personal relationship with us... It's scandalously intimate!

Yet in no way does Christ being our Friend diminish his awesome holiness

No, Jesus is not your homeboy or BFF! He hasn't made us equals... We still worship him Yet if friendship is partly defined by affection, there can be no greater Friend than Jesus Which of your friends has better stuck by you, through good and bad?

And think of what a special experience it is when anyone calls you their friend

Friends aren't stuck with you like family members are

Friends don't just happen to be around you, like mere acquaintances, peers, or co-workers Friends *choose* to be part of your life... They want you to be part of theirs

Through some common interest or passion, your hearts are drawn together And how special it is when a true and lasting friendship is discovered!

Like, I don't even consider every one of you to be my friends!

I want to and hope I do love all of you

But I don't and I can't let you all in on the most inner circle of my life There's only so much of me to go around!

Not so with Jesus... There is plenty of breadth, length, height, and depth in him to go around! And how incredible is it that the God of the universe would want me as a friend?

Dane Ortlund asks: "What if you had a friend at the centre of your relationship circle, whom you knew would never raise his eyebrows at what you share with him, even the

worst parts of you? All our human friendships have a limit to what they can withstand. But what if there were a friend with no limit? No ceiling on what he would put up with and still want to be with you?" ... That's what we have in Jesus!

Tim Keller has said that besides common passion, there are 2 key features of real friendship:

Transparency and constancy: "Real friends always let you in, and they never let you down."

And it's the transparency that Jesus was stressing here in John: **READ v.15b**¹⁴

He's let us in, in mind-blowing ways... *All* the Father told him, he shared with them (As an aside, this doesn't mean God the Son wasn't all-knowing himself It just means that in his humanity, Jesus shared everything the Father gave him to share)

What do you choose to share with people around you?

With acquaintances, you'll have casual conversations, make small talk and such With online "friends", you'll share your interests, activities, and pictures of food But how about with your friends IRL (in real life), sitting with you over a meal? There's not much, if anything, you won't talk about with them

Jesus has made God known to us, to the extent and effect that we are his IRL friends He hasn't held anything back from us... He's told us all kinds of intimate details

Think of it this way: A king of a nation can demand obedience from all his subjects

His servants are simply told what to do, and they must do it, no questions asked

But his friends? They enjoy his confidence and he informs them of his thinking

So that, while they too obey, they obey with a full understanding of their king's heart

Jesus, as our Friend, is still our Lord who is to be obeyed

But now we obey out of love, with an understanding of his motives, plans, and purposes¹⁵
And that makes it *so* much easier to obey and follow him

As Dane Ortlund also says: "Incredible: the triune God brings us into his plans to restore the universe. He makes us part of his inner circle. He informs us of what he is doing and welcomes our participation in it."

If we're his friends, it means we can come to him with familiarity and boldness in prayer
He has shared everything with us... We can share everything with him
Pouring out our hearts, disclosing all our secrets, letting him know the real us

If we're his friends, it also means we have a source of comfort in any kind of trouble or sorrow Or in loneliness as well... He was betrayed by a close friend, but he'll never betray us For he has the other mark of a true friend: constancy

But if we believers are all his friends, true loneliness should be a rarity among us
If he has loved us like this, shouldn't we likewise seek to love others as friends?
Do you have some people in your life who you can be completely transparent with?
Or who think of you as a safe person to be transparent with, themselves?
And do you have some constant Christian friends, who'll stick with you no matter what?
Don't take that for granted... And aim to be that constant friend for others

[tr] So... If we are so loved by God that we are befriended by him,
Should we think highly of ourselves, being proud of our privileged place in God's plan?
Not at all... Jesus lets us into his inner circle entirely by grace

It's not because we are wiser, better, more gifted, or more righteous than anyone else Listen: **READ v.16**¹⁶... I could have phrased this several different ways, but I settled on this:

➤ He loves as our <u>Source</u> (v.16)

[r] His love is seen in the way he is the initiating source of our everything

He is the source of truth and revelation, as v.15 implied

In v.16, we see he is the source of our salvation... Theologians call it our election

READ v.16a¹⁷... Now, we do experience something of a choice to follow Jesus, But that only happens after he first chooses us...

He chose us... We didn't initiate our relationship with him

Truth is: we never would have, if he didn't intervene in our hearts So this really is something to praise the Lord for, not be bothered by

He is also the source of our fruit... Returning to the vine and branches metaphor Remember: Our fruit is any change driven by our faith: changed attitudes, behaviour, character But if Jesus is the Vine, he is what sends life coursing through our branches,

enabling us to bear fruit for him... He's the source of our life and godliness

READ v.16b¹⁸... Specifically fruit that abides, or remains... It doesn't rot or spoil Given how these apostles soon started up the church, it's likely that the fruit that would abide here especially refers to evangelistic fruit

Which would mean: We here today are evidence of their lasting fruit

Are we now participating in this mission in the world, sharing Jesus with others?

But notice: v.16 is not only Jesus' desire for us... This is Jesus' plan for us

He's 'appointed' us to bear fruit, setting us apart in this world for this mission And he'll see it through and make sure it happens

Finally, we see that he is our source of blessings and answered prayer: **READ v.16c¹⁹**We already addressed, in previous passages, how Jesus could make such huge promises
But evidently, these promises weren't too dangerous to repeat over and over
The focus here in v.16, though, is on prayers related to abiding fruit and the disciples' mission
They're connected... As we bear fruit, that's when God especially answers our prayers
Do you believe God is willing, able, and committed to answering prayer? Are we even asking?

He is our Source... And in this case, we *cannot* love others in the exact same way he does Because we cannot be the Source of people's salvation, fruit, or answered prayer But we *can* be conduits, letting God's blessings flow through us to others

If we've been blessed, we are blessed in order to be a blessing

[tr] And just in case we still don't get the point, Jesus goes: **READ v.17²⁰**Jesus loves us so we'll love one another!

And as we close, I'll point out one final way we can see that he loves us:

➤ He loves as our <u>Lord</u> (v.17)

[r] Jesus loves us as our Lord, whom we are called to obey and to love

He's bookended his thoughts with the theme of love, but also the theme of 'command' 'This is my commandment'... **READ v.17**²¹

So always remember: He is our Friend... But he never abdicates being our Lord It just makes him a Lord unlike any other lord we could imagine

Again, we don't emulate this exact form of love, as we are not lords over one another

But what we should take away here is that his commands are an expression of his love
He has loved us, and he commands us... They go together, hand-in-hand

As one of the songs we sing here goes, He 'shelters us with [his] commands' They are for our good, revealing his heart to us, and guiding our ways

What does he command us? To abide in him... To bear fruit... To ask in prayer, boldly But all of his commands find their heart in love... To love one another

As we'll see in the next passage:

Our love should stand in stark contrast to the hatred we may see and experience in this world While many may despise us or insult us or even try to hurt us,

Jesus didn't leave us alone... He intentionally left us with each other

CONCLUSION

So the question is: Will we follow his commandment and truly love one another?

Will we, by the power of the Spirit, seek to live out what we have heard?

No, loving one another doesn't come naturally to us, at all

But thank God: Loving one another has comes *supernaturally* to us

Because love came to us in our Lord Jesus
