ADULT DISCIPLESHIP



Medical Ethics (Room 501)

Have you ever had to wrestle with a difficult decision about your health care or the care of a loved one? At some point, many of us will likely be confronted by decisions on things like end-of-life care, infertility, pregnancy complications, abortion, congenital problems, gender identity concerns, addictions, and vaccinations. This series will begin with one session on a process for safe, respectful dialogue on issues that can elicit intense feelings (January 4) and one on the relevance of medical ethics to our faith (January 11). Then, Drs. Mark Templeman and Mike Magill, along with invited experts in medicine, theology, and philosophy, will discuss these topics in the context of our faith and current medical ethics principles. Come prepared to share your thoughts and feelings about these challenging topics and to learn from the experts and each other.

The Character of God (Room 502)

On January 4, we begin a six-week series on the character of God based on God's own self-description in Exodus 34. Join us as each week we consider God's compassion, grace, patience, loyal love, and faithfulness.





I've been thinking a lot about Mary, the mother of Jesus, lately—perhaps because we've just come through the Christmas season. I imagine Mary, having experienced one divine encounter after another, slowly coming down from that spiritual high back into ordinary, everyday life. Think about it: first, an angel appears to her, then she miraculously becomes pregnant. Elizabeth's baby leaps in the womb when Mary and Jesus (in utero) draw near. God inspires both Mary and Elizabeth to speak prophetic words. And that's just the beginning. There's the journey to Bethlehem, labor and delivery in a stable, the star, the shepherds, the wise men, and then fleeing to Egypt. All of this must have felt like a dream to an uneducated, Middle Eastern teenage girl.

And then life went back to normal... or as normal as it can be when you're raising the Son of God. Mary had to learn how to be a mom, change diapers, and be married. She had a home to manage and the daily, unglamorous tasks that fill every ordinary life. Mary had to navigate the transition from an incredible spiritual mountaintop experience to the quiet rhythm of everyday living. I think we often skip over this part of her story—I know I do. Yet this is the part I relate to most. We've all experienced spiritual, emotional, or mental "highs"—those exciting moments when we feel fully alive. But those moments inevitably fade, and we find ourselves back in the real world. Our divine encounters don't end when we come down from the mountain. In fact, I believe the way we encounter God in the mundane is just as important—if not more so—than those breath-taking mountaintop moments.

Brother Lawrence, a French Carmelite monk from the 1600s, understood this beautifully. His conversations and letters, later gathered into the book *The Practice of the Presence of God*, describe his simple life as a lay brother who worked in the monastery kitchen for fifteen years. He wrote that he tried to do "everything for the love of God, asking as often as possible for grace to do his work." He went on to say that "we ought not to be weary of doing little things for the love of God, who regards not the greatness of the work, but the love with which it is performed."

As we settle back into the routines of ordinary life, I invite you to join me in practicing the presence of God in all we do—approaching even the most mundane tasks with great love and welcoming God into each moment. May these simple, everyday moments be as transformative as the mountaintop ones.



On Sundays, you can find Dawn leading Parents Café – a ministry that has blessed her life immensely.



INCOMING DEACONS




Here comes January, how much snow will fall
