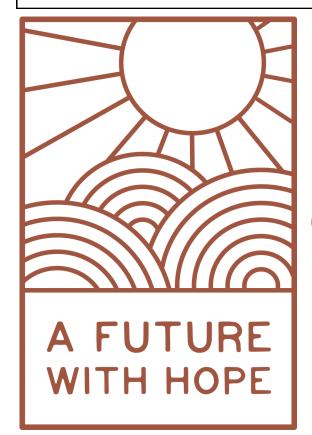

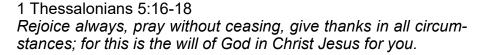


COMMITMENT OF GIVING SUNDAY WILL BE NOVEMBER 16

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One day, a man was driving home from his retirement party after 40 years of a successful career in corporate business. As he drove home, he had the despairing realization that he would never again update his resume. That really made him sad because he loved updating his resume. It was a record of all of

his accomplishments right there in front of him on paper. Everything that he had done and achieved and accomplished—it was right before him. And no one would ever ask to see that again.

When he got home, he decided to pull out a yellow tablet of paper and make a list of all the blessings God had given him in his life. Not his achievements, God's blessings in his life. He was amazed by the length of the list. It was such a spiritual experience for him to make this list that he turned it into an annual practice. Every Thanksgiving, he'd pull out this yellow tablet, and he'd start over. Every year, the list grew longer and longer.

As the years progressed, this man went through all the losses of life that anybody at this stage goes through. He found himself at church a lot, attending the funerals of his friends. Then his wife. He had a bout with cancer. He had to sell the big house and move into the condo.

But despite continuing to lose more and more of the things that used to be in his life, every year he would still make this long list of thanksgivings. And every year the list continued to grow longer and longer, not because more wonderful things were happening to him, but because he was getting better and better at paying attention to the goodness of the everyday grace—the daily bread—that he had been given.

Cicero believed that gratitude was not only the highest virtue, but also the parent of all the other virtues. Martin Luther referred to it as the basic Christian attitude. It's because it means that you're paying attention to the goodness and the grace of God in your life.

Gratitude has nothing at all to do with the circumstances of your life. We all know people whose lives have actually been pretty battered by reality, and still, they

are the most joyful, grateful people you know. It's extraordinary. And we all know people who have what seems to be relatively easy lives, and they're some of the grumpiest people you know. It's not about the circumstances. It's about paying attention to the blessings and grace in your life.

I know that when I catch myself complaining, it is a red alert that my soul needs some time with God, because I haven't been paying attention. Usually, it's because I'm too busy or I am out of sync with life. Gratitude is always a byproduct of a vibrant life with God.

I hope you take time to practice gratitude, especially this month. It's one of the things I love about the holiday of Thanksgiving: it's not so commercialized, or filled with junk, but it's about family and friends and slowing down and making a mess in the kitchen and being grateful for the abundance of creation and the lives we get to share.

May it be so in each of our lives as we continue the long tradition of nurturing a culture of gratitude for God's abundance at Mount Olympus Presbyterian Church.

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When I was a kid, one of my favorite movies was Hallmark's 1987 version of *The Secret Garden*. This adaptation of Frances Hodgson Burnett's classic story was dark, mysterious, and moody—utterly captivating to my ten-year-old imagination. I can still quote much of it from memory.

In one scene, Mary, the young protagonist who has suffered great loss but is also quite spoiled and self-centered, speaks with Ben Weatherstaff, the gardener. As they marvel at the garden's transformation from a sad, overgrown place into a beautiful retreat, Ben

wisely observes, "Where you tend a rose, a thistle cannot grow."

That line has stayed with me. It's a simple truth with deep spiritual meaning. Scripture often uses the imagery of gardens and growth to describe the condition of our hearts. Proverbs 4:23 reminds us, "Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life." What we choose to dwell on—what we "tend"—will either nurture beauty or allow weeds to take over.

In today's world, especially with the constant stream of bad news and social media noise, it's easy for "thistles" of fear, anger, or despair to take root. While it's important to stay engaged and compassionate, we must also make space to tend the "roses"—the good and grace-filled things God is doing all around us. Philippians 4:8 encourages us to think on "whatever is true, noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable... excellent or praiseworthy."

There is still much good in our world! I recently read about an organization that has rescued over 250 million pounds of food from being wasted, redirecting it to people in need. Or the local story of a church that gave its entire building to another congregation—not even of their own denomination! These glimpses of generosity and redemption remind us that God is still at work, quietly cultivating hope.

As the holiday season approaches, I invite you to tend the roses in your own life through the practice of gratitude. Maybe that means limiting time online, noticing small kindnesses, or—like our family—filling a "Marvelous Things of 2025" jar with blessings big and small. However you do it, gratitude is one of the best ways to tend the garden of your heart—because where gratitude grows, thistles cannot.
