## **Euclid Girl Scouts host Food Drives for Local Hunger Centers**

Over the past weeks, several Euclid Girl Scout Troops have held various Food Drives to support two local organizations dedicated to ending hunger in our area.

In October, Junior Troop 71033 decided to make End 68 Hours of Hunger their service project for their Agents of Change Journey. The Girl Scouts spoke in their classrooms and asked for donations of nonperishable foods from the 68 Hours grocery list. The girls spoke after mass at St. John of the Cross and raised over \$1,200 that weekend which they immediately turned around and bought food to be donated to the group.

End 68 Hours of Hunger Lake County is a local chapter of a national non-profit group that provides food and meals to children who are apart of the government lunch programs in schools. It was found that while they were getting nutritious

## Former Police Station and Court House Building **Receives Landmark Designation**

Euclid residents may know the building at 445 East 200th Street as the home of Decker Appliance. But before the building was occupied by a local appliance-repair company, it housed the Euclid Police Department and Court House.

The City's police and court operations were moved to the site in 1929 after a fire destroyed the original location at the corner of Euclid Avenue and Chardon Road.

The Euclid Landmark Commission recognized the historical significance of the Decker Appliance building by designating the property a Euclid Landmark on September 10, 2015.

Rebecca McFarland, Chair of the Landmark Commission, presented a bronze plaque manufactured by the Family Bronze Company of Cleveland, Ohio to the building owners at the Euclid City Council meeting on December 21,

The Decker Appliance Service Company was founded in 1940 by Paul Decker. In 1965, the company was purchased by Arnold Ayers. Still family owned and operated, the Ayers family is celebrating their 50th anniversary as owners of Decker Appliance.

Decker Appliance provides repair services for all major-brand appliances. 

## **Euclid Music Legends Johnny Pecon and Frank Yankovic Honored at Polka Music Awards**

The the late Euclid bandleaders Johnny Pecon and Frank Yankovic, America's Polka King, who both would have been 100 this year, were honored at the 52nd Thanksgiving Polka Party Weekend, staged at the Downtown Cleveland Marriott Hotel by the Euclid-based National Cleveland-Style Polka Hal of Fame and Museum, and the 28th annual polka music awards ceremony on Saturday, November 28, 2015. The awards show theme, "A Century of Cleveland-Style Polka," saluted the Slovenian and American influences on the music, especially by Yankovic and Pecon, and Slovenia's late polka powerhouse Slavko Avsenik. Pecon's sons John and Jeff and Yankovic's son Bob performed in honor of their fathers.

Featured entertainer was Denis Novato, World Diatonic Accordion Champion, who arrived from Europe for the occasion. Several Polka Hall of Fame honorees appeared on stage, including Canada's Polka King, Walter Ostanek, Joey Miskulin of TV's Riders in the Sky, past President Fred Kuhar, and Dusan "Duke" Marsic, who was recognized by polka radio host Tony Petkovsek for his 90th birthday. Three Polka Hall of Famers celebrated 80th birthdays, Hank Haller, Del Sinchak and Walter Os-

The Frank Stanger Orchestra enjoyed a three-peat win as Band of the Year. Frank Stanger, a native of Doylestown, OH, also collected trophies for Musician, Album and Song of the Year, as did bandmates Paul Yeager and Joe Zdelar for Side Musicians. The late Cleveland musician and radio host Eddie Bucar and the late drummer Dave Wolnik were inducted for their lifetime achievements in polka music.

The two All-Time Hits were played by local bands Patty C and the Guys (Lojze Slak's "V Dolini Tihi (Quiet Valley)") and the Veseli Godci (Merry Music-Makers)

Since its founding in 2004, the orchestra CityMusic created has presented a regular schedule of free concerts in city and suburban neighborhoods. Social issues are central to its programming: bullying, the Holocaust, the plight of Cleveland refugees and of its homeless children. It often commissions new works to suit the topic, and recruits stellar soloists and conductors. And it is building new audiences, with an education program modeled after El Siste-

All that will now be enjoyed in North Collinwood, with CityMusic's selection of St Jerome church as its latest venue: the orchestra will play there on March 17 and May 12. CityMusic players will also perform at Waterloo at the beginning of the year - on January 15 and February 19 - as both an introduction to the CityMusic program and an extension of Waterloo Arts chamber concert series.

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





## From Euclid to Hoboken

In the September issue of the Euclid Observer, I told you about the journey Valerie and I were just about to make in the footsteps of Major Arthur Houts, who lived in Euclid with his wife Georgina (born Crichton in 1884) and their son Kenneth (1903-1985) in the 1910s.

Our journey is now over. We have gathered new information, and hundreds of pictures, old and new, and we still have to put all this together. This is our first attempt to sum up what we have experienced, and what we have learned.

Indeed, we have had a busy stay in the United States. We have met a lot of interesting, friendly, and helpful people, be it in Ohio or Alabama

Starting with Euclid, we met John Copic of the Euclid Observer. John drove us through Euclid, showing us places we had missed on our way from our hotel in Cleveland to Euclid.

John took us to the Euclid Historical Society and Museum. I encourage everyone in Euclid who has not visited them yet to spare some time and meet them - and why not join them! They were very friendly and helpful. The last known address of Major Houts was Stop 130, Lakeshore, Euclid. I had figured it could refer to something like a railway stop. The Euclid Historical Society confirmed that: two trolley lines operated by the Cleveland, Painesville, and

Eastern Railway, ran through Euclid, and one of them followed Lakeshore Boulevard. The Euclid Historical Society was not able to locate Stop 130 during our visit, but I eventualy found Stop 130 on a map from their archives. On this 1912 map, Stop 130 is at Lakeshore & Cut Road (now E 200th

mory, a historic building similar to the Central Armory - destroyed in the 1960s. Major Houts and the 5th Ohio National Guard had their quarters at the Central Armory, but the Grays Armory was also used in 1917 by units of the 37th Division.

We also met retired Colonel John Jenkins, president of the 37th Division Veterans Association, and his wife Rose, who drove us to Camp Perry. The camp has a rare souvenir from France: one of the 48 train cars offered by France to the United States after WWII. It was part of a gratitude train, filled with presents from several French cities or provinces. The car in Camp Perry was built in 1913. It is of the famous 40 and 8 model - in fact 40 or 8, as it could hold 40 men or 8 horses. It was in cars like these that the soldiers of the American Expeditionary Forces (AEF) travelled through France during WWI.

Our stay in Alabama was also very dense. In August 1917, Major Houts was among the first ones to leave Ohio to supervise the building of Camp Sheridan in the northern

Southern side of the Alabama Capitol: every State is represented here, both with its flag, and with a local stone. Another stone can be found on the site of former Camp In Cleveland, we visited the Grays Ar-Sheridan. It has been brought here in memory of the Ohioans who had been trained at Camp Sheridan in 1917-1918. We also visited the Montgomery County

Historical Society. The people there did more than their best to help us, much like at the Euclid Historical Society. They have their own archives - and very rich ones indeed! Afterwards, we went to the Alabama Department of Archives and History. Thanks to archivist Keri Hallford, and with a hint from the Montgomery County Historical Society, we could find a map of the trenches in Camp Sheridan, dug for training purposes. Like on the actual frontline, the trenches wore names. The enemy trenches were named after Hamburg and Frankfort. The US trenches were named Cleveland, Superior, and... Euclid! To be more precise, Euclid seems to be a communication trench.

To follow as closely as possible the journey of Major Houts, we then took the Crescent train, northbound, at the Birmingham Amtrak station. In April 1918, Major Houts and the 37th Division left Montgomery by

We skipped Ohio can be found. The first one is on the Fort Lee, where the 37th spent only a month, and headed to New York.

> In New York, we went to the South Street Seaport Museum, which used to have in its collection a large-scale model of the USS Leviathan – the ship used in June 1918 to transport Major Houts and a part of the 37th Division from Hoboken to Brest -, in its dazzle-camouflage paint. That is where we fell upon the sad part of our quest: the Museum has lost most of its collection in 2012 due to hurricane Sandy. They are still trying to save and restore some items, but the model of the Leviathan seems to be lost

> As we stayed in New Jersey, we took a ferry from the Hoboken terminal to the South of Manhattan. This was the closest we could do - ocean liners are getting rare - to the departing of the USS Leviathan in June 1918. The New York skyline has changed a lot since 1918, but the soldiers leaving for France saw the statue of Liberty getting thinner exactly as we saw it.

> There is a lot of information we still have to analyze. So we probably will have more to share with you in the future. In the meantime, we would like to thank everyone we have met during our journey.


