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#### Lincoln Electric and Imani Church Present Expansion Plans



Lincoln Electric's Welding Technology and Training Center will bring new visitors and increased employment to the City of Euclid.

The meeting of the Euclid Architectural Review Board on March 24th featured presentations on two major development projects coming soon to the City of Euclid. The plans of The Lincoln Electric Company and Imani United Church of Christ were both enthusiastically received by the Board and granted conceptual approval at the meeting

Lincoln Electric, represented by architect Andy Burbules of Structura Architects, shared their plans and renderings for the new Welding Technology and Training Center at the ARB meeting.

The Welding Center will be located in a two-story addition measuring 119,186 square feet to be built onto an existing building on the South side of St. Clair Avenue. The addition will feature a modern glass and metal exterior similar to Lincoln's main headquarters building located across the street. A light-filled atrium will greet visitors as they enter the new center.



Imani Church plans to add a new sanctuary and additional office space to their existing building on E. 260th Street.

"You've done a wonderful job" remarked Board Chair Robert Dorer. "It will be a beautiful building".

The Board was also pleased with the expansion plans of Imani Church. Faced with a growing congregation and ministry, Imani intends to construct an 11,500 square foot addition onto their existing building on East 260th Street. The addition will include a new sanctuary and added office space.

Designed by architect Roy Kevin Madison of Robert Madison International, the

new sanctuary is accented by a dramatic roofline and expansive windows. The addition will incorporate building materials and design elements that maintain consistency with the existing building.

Imani has been a member of the Euclid faith community for many years. Led by Reverend Michele Humphrey, the congregation contributes to the community in a variety of ways, including through the weekly distribution of food at their food pantry.

"Perhaps it's a good omen. " well, that turned out to be wishful thinking. Coach Babe Kwasniak's Vikings did make it to the final game in Columbus, but their rather remarkable season came to an end with a 66-44 loss to Lima Central Catholicthe same team they had beaten a year earlier to claim VASJ's sixth state basketball crown. In fact, it was the third year in row that these two squads met in the championship finals. Almost incredibly, it marked the fourth straight appearance in a state championship game for this year's Vikings seniorsfirst-team All-Ohio guard Sherman Dean III, Kevin Roberts, Jacob Stauffer, Anthony

Turk and Phillip Bessick. Certainly, they'd hoped to end their high school careers on a final victory note. But it wasn't to be. And, understandably, they and their teammates seemed less than jubilant in settling for the runner-up trophy on Ohio State's Schottenstein Center court.

Nonetheless, the 2016 VASJ squad far exceeded anyone's expectations-especially considering that all five starters on the 2015 championship team had graduated. Starting from scratch, Coach Kwasniak's cagers fashioned a very memorable tournament run. And watch out for them again next year. The leading scorer for the Vikings in the state title game was sophomore guard Jerry Higgins, whose shot at the halftime buzzer narrowed Lima Central's lead to 27-26. Higgins finished the game with 15 points. Among the others expected to return next season are 6-7 freshman Alonzo Gafney, 6-2 junior Noah Newton, and 6-3 junior Dan McGarry who made a significant contribution under the basket this season.

#### Ask an Officer



by Kate McLaughlin Question: What is CPTED and how is it used by the Euclid Police Department?

Answer: Kate McLaughlin, Community Policing Specialist

The problem of crime can occur when a motivated offender finds a suitable target in a vulnerable place, illustrated in the Crime Triangle. If one of three sides of the Crime Triangle is addressed, it can prevent the crime. We can use crime prevention measures to protect ourselves from becoming a victim, and we can establish safeguards to protect places. CPTED, an acronym for Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, is one of those measures to protect places. CPTED is defined as a multi-disciplinary approach to deterring criminal behavior by designing a physical environment that positively influences human behavior. There are several strategies to designing a safer space. Natural Access Control denies access to a crime target and increases the risk to offenders such as signs,

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

# HIT THE GROUND RUNNING

Mitch Opalich, president of Indelco Custom Products, Inc., is the third generation of Opaliches to steer the business that has been in existence since 1965. The company originally was founded by Opalich's father, George, and grandfather, Stephen, both engineers, as Cleveland Plastic Fabricators & Suppliers, Inc., when they were asked by a national manufacturing customer of their metalworking company to fabricate and machine plastics.

Since the family lived in Collinwood and Richmond Heights, Opalich says, "It made sense to locate the business in Euclid due to its proximity to a high concentration of manufacturing and OEM companies," and it has remained here even though the Opaliches sold the business to their employees in the early 1970s. In 1994, Mitch Opalich bought the business back after finishing graduate school and working in the financial industry. He sold the company in 2008 to a Minneapolis-based plastics distributor, and the name changed to Indelco in 2014. Though he no longer owns the company, he remains president, and the company remains family owned by the Dore brothers. Opalich sold the business to leverage the buying power, infrastructure and capital of

the third-largest player in the industry. He met the owners through his membership in the International Association of Plastics Distribution. Indelco Cleveland currently has more than 250 customers, 50 percent of which are in Northeast Ohio.

Opalich says, "We're an industrial plastic distributor and fabricator specializing in fluid process control." What does that mean? Well, some of the cool items that they have fabricated include:

- a Simona® Eco-Ice® plastic surface made of ultra-high-molecular-weight polyethylene that is used as an ice skating rink (Yes, you skate ON the plastic with no water or ice, and there's one in our backyard that University Circle Inc. had installed.)

- tanks and piping. Indelco works with an original-equipment manufacturer that requisitions the plastic material or part, many of which are Cleveland-based, and is responsible for machining, assembling, welding and bending the

items they fabricate. Another interesting project is one that the company did for Eveready Battery Company's Westlake, Ohio, researchand-development facility. Indelco helped Eveready convert its stainless-steel anode mixing system to plastic and standardize it throughout all of their facilities. The mixture was improved by using polyethylene tanks that did not interact with or contaminate the mix, making it cleaner and more uniform. Indelco also teamed with a process control manufacturer to fabricate double-walled tanks to hold hydrochloric acid for cleaning aerospace engine parts for

Rolls Royce that had to meet seismic speci fications due to the customer's location in

California. Interestingly enough, you can hold acids in plastic, and some of them are impervious to acids that will eat through

Plastic is machined and welded in a process similar to metal. Indelco hires skilled metal-industry welders and machinists then trains them on plastic techniques. Because the industry is young in the United States, since the 1960s, few trade schools teach plastic techniques, and most machinists are self-taught. The company has 20 employees in Euclid and 200 more at its corporate office and 14 other facilities.

Opalich's connection to HGR predates the existence of HGR. He went to Mayfield High School with HGR's founder, Paul Betori, and they remain friends. Opalich says he buys and repairs tanks from HGR when a customer specifies the need, and he has bought shop equipment for his facility from HGR. Gina M. 

#### **Euclid Symphony celebrates Leroy** Anderson

In the final concert of their 55th year, the Euclid Symphony Orchestra will present a Pops Concert tribute to Leroy Anderson.

The concert, at 3 p.m. on May 1 at the Shore Cultural Centre at 291 E. 222nd St. in Euclid, will showcase some of Anderson's most popular tunes.

Anderson, one of the most prominent pops composers, introduced many of his works to the American public in performances by the Boston Pops Orchestra. Anderson served as an arranger for the famous Orchestra and specialized in fun, short and catchy musical arrangements.

The tribute to Anderson is fitting for a man who is the most well-known and beloved contemporary composers.

Anderson entered Harvard University in 1926, served as director of the Harvard University Band and earned a master's degree in music in 1930, according to his official biography. He continued to study at Harvard after 1930, but shifted his focus towards a PhD in language studies, mastering Danish, Norwegian, Icelandic, German, French, Italian and Portuguese in addition to English and Swedish, the languages his Swedish immigrant parents had taught him at a young age, all the while continuing to serve as director of the University Band.

His work with the Band earned Anderson the attention of Arthur Fiedler, the Director of the Boston Pops, and he began composing music for the orchestra.

In 1942, Anderson joined the army, serving as a translator and interpreter in Iceland with the U.S. Army Counter Intelligence Corps. during WWII. He returned to the United States in 1943 and was assigned to the Pentagon where he served as Chief of Scandinavian Department of Military Intelligence. During his time there, in 1945, he composed "Promenade," which will be featured at the Euclid Symphony's Pops Concert May 1.

He later moved to New York, and continued to compose music for the Boston Pops. In May of 1948, "Sleigh Ride" was

#### Youth Golf and Life Skills Program Flourishes at Briardale Greens

The First Tee of Cleveland, a youth education program that focuses on building character, instilling life-enhancing values, and promoting healthy choices through the game of golf, is hosting an Open House at Briardale Greens April 9 beginning at 10 AM. Parents with children ages 6-18 are encouraged to come learn more about this community-based life skills program.

According to David Alexander, a member of the PGA and First Tee Lead Program Coach, there will be a number of activities planned for kids to learn more about The First Tee of Cleveland and the programs offered. Alexander has worked with The First Tee in a number of locations but has found Euclid's Briardale Greens a particularly rewarding and successful location for the

"In our first year we had 45 kids, but we keep growing every year. This year we hope to get up to 75," said Alexander. "It is a vibrant and diverse program that teaches valuable life skills and utilizes the golf course atmosphere." He added that the program allows girls and boys as young as six to begin to learn the game of golf, but also learn important life lessons which are reinforced in The First Tee's approach to instruction. The First Tee weaves its "Nine Core Values" - honesty, integrity, respect, confidence, responsibility, perseverance, courtesy, judgment and sportsmanship into every aspect of the program.

The instruction that kids receive when they participate in The First Tee of Cleveland is tailored to their age. "We get them out on the course, walk it and make sure they are enjoying the game while learning," said Alexander. He noted that younger players are able to practice golf skills and learn the game in a relaxed environment. Many players do not have clubs, but are able to borrow them from The First Tee during the

Seeing young players learning the sport of golf is something Matthew Baca, General Manager of Briardale Greens, enjoys seeing. "Because The First Tee of Cleveland specializes in working with kids, they are able to provide great instruction and they are very patient in helping them," said Baca. "The instructors are highly qualified and really do a great job of teaching the sport, but also much more. These kids are learning life skills that are very important." The First Tee of Cleveland is headquartered at the Washington Golf Learning Center, a course located in Cleveland off Harvard Avenue. In branching out to Euclid's Briardale Greens, the program saw an opportunity to impact the lives of kids in Euclid and the surrounding communities.

A Euclid native and junior at St. Ignatius High School, Evan Steigerwald has been involved with The First Tee of Cleveland since he was ten years old This past winter, Steigerwald received the Doris A. Evan, MD Scholarship from The First Tee of Cleveland, an award he plans to use for college. "The First Tee has helped me understand what is expected of me outside of just school or home. It has helped me a lot with my job as a caddy," said Steigerwald having learned how to caddy through The First Tee. "They have also helped me learn some important leadership skills." #### Egged House to Get a Free Paint Job from Neubert Painting

EUCLID, OH- An elderly man whose house was repeatedly egged by an unknown assailant for more than a year, will have his house repainted free of charge this summer by Neubert Painting. The house on Wilmore Avenue, which received national attention for the incident, was egged more than 100 times between May 20, 2014 and June 26, 2015, according to reports.

"We offered to repaint the house last summer as part of our annual Charity Paint Giveaway, but we were waiting for police approval since the case was still under investigation," said John Neubert, owner of Neubert Painting in Brook Park. Then last fall Neubert received the go-ahead from police to paint the house. They planned to do the job as soon as weather permitted.

According to news reports, a former

neighbor is allegedly facing charges regarding the eggings.

Since dried eggs have covered the house for nearly two years, the job will require considerable preparation before painting can begin, says Neubert.

The Charity Paint Giveway was created in 2008 by Neubert to provide free exterior painting services to a homeowner or nonprofit organization whose building needs painting, but can't afford it. "We have been trusted by Northeast Ohio homeowners since 1975, and we feel part of our mission is to give back to our community. This continues our tradition of doing community service projects for people in need."

More than \$100,000 in free painting services has been provided through the Charity Paint giveaway since 2008.



## Music and Recruiting in the Austro-Hungarian Army

by Nan Kennedy Music for Miles Brings Rousing Classics to Waterloo Arts

The Impreza Piano Trio, Sunday April 10, 4 pm

How did the Austrian army lure peasants to its recruiting stations? With music! And the Impreza Trio will demonstrate, in its April Music for Miles concert at Waterloo

Eric Charnofsky is at the piano in this newly formed Cleveland-area ensemble, with Emily Cornelius on violin and Lauren M. Dunseath playing cello. All three of these musicians have a wide background of performance experience as soloists, chamber and orchestral musicians, and are also active as teachers at all levels. Their debut program comprises trios from the standard chamber music repertoire, including works by Haydn, Shostakovich, and Mendelssohn.

Lane Cooper's show "What Dreams May Come" will be hanging in the gallery, and the Callaloo will be ready as always with glasses of wine and flavors of the Caribbean. Or it might be the time to try Waterloo's new coffee shop - Six Shooter, at the corner of

The concert opens with Haydn's "Gypsy Rondo" Trio in G Major from 1795, colored by a Hungarian style Rondo finale movement which incorporates several gypsy tunes - including "Recruiting Dances" that were used by Austrian army officials to attract peasants to recruiting posts. The first two movements are more tranquil; first a set minor, followed by a gentle, melodic Adagio. Shostakovich's Trio No. 2 in E minor,

composed during World War II and premiered in Leningrad in 1944, its four movements express degrees of intensity, angst, drama, joy, and frenzy. The music powerfully reflects on the conditions Shostakovich witnessed in Soviet Russia, and the impact on listeners is usually mesmerizing.

The Impreza program will close with Mendelssohn's extraordinarily rich and varied Piano Trio No. 2 in Cminor, a four-movement work composed in 1845, with virtuosic writing for the three instruments. You'll recognize the familiar "Old Hundredth" hymn melody, commonly known today as "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow," in the final movement. The music is majestic and extremely dramatic, and will make for a grand ending to the overall program.

Emily is also a dedicated teacher with a large private teaching studio in Shaker Heights.

Lauren M. Dunseath is a cellist with diverse musical tastes. She performs regularly in chamber and orchestral settings, and has an active teaching studio in Cleveland, Ohio, where she directs the Ohio City Cello Choir. Lauren received her Bachelor's degree at SUNY Purchase under the tutelage of Julia Lichten and her Master's degree at CarnegieMellonUniversity with fellowships in Opera and Contemporary Music. #### The Way It Was 50 Years Ago in Euclid

Long-time Euclid residents may remember what the city was like half a century agoand in many ways it remains much the same, despite numerous changes over the years. For those who are relative newcomers, this article-and future installments in this series-may provide some useful perspective on the history and potential of our great city on the lake.

The news, sports, and other items covered in this series have been gleaned from the pages of the 1966 editions of the old Euclid News-Journal, the community's former weekly newspaper. That paper eventually was acquired by the Sun Newspapers before that chain decided to abandon the city, leaving Euclid without its own paper until the arrival of the Euclid Observers (first the editions produced by Mary Jo Minarik then the version you're now reading, published by John Copic.) Ready? Let's begin with the January editions of the 1966 **Euclid News-Journal** 

JAN. 6, 1966- The lead story, based on Mayor Kenneth J. Sims' annual report, was headlined "City Nears Action on Housing Project Redevelopment 99 The mayor noted that Euclid had reduced its bonded indebtedness by \$13. 9 million, enabling the city to begin focusing on needed improvements, including redevelopment of the city-owned housing projects. the low-rent projects had been constructed during World War II to house workers employed by local factories producing aircraft parts and other equipment needed for the war effort. "I want to see those projects tom down and redeveloped entirely," Mayor Sims said, "but in

an orderly fashion without displacing any of the residents,"(the largest of the housing project tracts sat on what now is Briardale Greens Golf Course. In those days, it was known as "The patch," and youngsters who lived there were dubbed "Patch Kids.") Mayor Sims' annual report also noted that there was renewed optimism about securing federal financial aid to build the \$4 million Babbitt Rd. underpass-to eliminate the hazard of driving across the railroad

■ The front page of the Jan. 6, 1966) News-Journal also included a story about Mary King, who had been a controversial school board member, announcing her candidacy for a seat in the Ohio House of Representatives. She planned to challenge incumbent Gerald Fuerst and several other contenders-including a political neophyte from the Collinwood area by the name of George Voinovich. (You may have heard of him. He won that election and went on to become Mayor of Cleveland, Governor of Ohio, and a United States Senator. The Euclid News-Journal and its sister paper, the Collinwood Scoop, both endorsed Voinovich for the state representative's post.)

Another front-page story noted that the Euclid Board of Education was wrestling with the dilemma of how to raise enough money to pay for a new physical education complex at Euclid High School, as well as financing construction of a new Euclid Central Junior High. Photographs on Page One included a shot of Mayor Sims swearing in the six Coalition Party members on Euclid City Council-Willard Schutt, Harry Burkhart, Tony Sustarsic, Max Gerl, Charles Wade, and Council President Harry Knuth (The independent Coalition had been formed in 1938, the year Sims launched his long career as one of the most farsighted city officials in the nation. It was his vision that eventually enabled the city to acquire the land where the Memorial Park baseball diamonds and Memorial Pool are located. He also understood the importance of having a strong industrial component as part of the city's tax base.) In a second photo, also taken by local photographer Carl Tomcik, Euclid Municipal Court Judge William F. Burns is shown swearing in the Democratic Party councilman Joe Whalen, Ed Eckart and Frank Chukayne. (Eckart is the father of Dennis Eckart, who later served as a U. S. Con-

JAN. 12, 1966-Euclid High graduate James Duffy (Class of '58) announces his candidacy for a state representative's position same seat sought by Mary King and George Voinovich. Duffy was a halfback on the Euclid Panthers football team. ■ Some 300 youngsters, ages 7 to 11,

are expected to participate in the Euclid Jaycees "Kid Wrestling" program slated for Forest park Junior High. After losing six straight Lake Erie League games, Coach Hal ("Doc") Daugherty's Euclid basketball team sports a lackluster 1-8 record. Looking ahead to the upcoming game, against Shaw High, Coach Daugherty indicates he'll replace his poor-performing seniors with promising underclassmenincluding sophomores Ewald Heise, Ricky Brown, and center Al Vilcheck. (Heise and Brown were members of the Euclid Pony

League All-Star team that qualified for the 1965 Pony league baseball "World Series" in Chula Vista, California. Two years later as a 6-foot-10 senior, Vilcheck played on the Panther basketball team that reached the state semifinals--the "Final Four" in the Ohio high school playoffs-the only Euclid team ever to advance that far.)

• Meanwhile, Coach Clarence Eckert's wrestling squad was preparing to launch defense of its LEL crown in a meet against the Brush High Arcs. The Panthers'133pound Rich Piscopo was slated to face Brush ace Mike Mignona-both sporting unblemished 4-0 records..... In a previous meet the Panthers coasted to a 29-9 victory over the St. Joseph Vikings, although 154-pounder Jim Orazen dropped a 9-2 decision to the Vikings' Kerry Volkman described in the News-Journal as a "rough customer." (Orazen's two older brothers, Ed and Mike, had been State Champions for Euclid.)

The Forest Park Junior High basketball team improved its record to 6-0 by thumping Memorial Junior High of South Euclid, 68-26, as Jeff Booms led all scorers with 20 points. Perkins Pancake Home on Shore Center Dr. sponsored an ad promoting its "Sunday Special'-a honey-dipped fried chicken platter for just \$1. 00... Convenient Food Mart offered a dozen fudge sickles for a mere 49 cents... And Gornik's Clothing at 22340 Lake Shore Blvd. offered Hart Schaffner & Marx suits for just \$69, 90.

Well, that's how it was a half century ago. But to some of us Euclid old-timers, it still seems like yesterday.

#### **Classical Collinwood**

An appreciative audience echoed their approval throughout the March 17th evening performance by CityMusic Cleveland hosted by St. Jerome Church. Ronald Strauss, MD, President of the Board, as well as an amateur violinist himself, welcomed everyone to the first-ever Collinwood appearance by the orchestra, which is celebrating its 12th season of bringing free concerts to Cleveland neighborhoods. The orchestra brought 38 skilled musicians and the very talented soprano, Jeanine De Bique for this performance which included selections by Beethoven, Grieg, Bizet, and Puccini.

The response from the concert goers included one by Clurie Bennis, who has only missed one performance in twelve years. She volunteers to help the orchestra bring "maximum music set in minimum overhead." The venues receive no compensation for hosting an event. Teri Dew, a local

resident, who regularly attends CityMusic concerts, was really excited that the performance was held so close to home. For longtime parishioner Kathy Mrsnik, this was her first CityMusic Cleveland concert and she said, "It was all that was promised and more. They were fantastic." A Pepper Pike resident enthusiastically thought the performance was spectacular, enhanced by the exceptional acoustics of the church, and the gracious hospitality of parishioners and the community. Before the concert, St. Jerome parishioners served up delicious Guinness Stew and Irish Soda Bread in the school gym and, later, coffee and pastries in church at intermission.

In the words of Dr. Strauss, the mission of CityMusic Cleveland is to make classical music accessible to everyone, with no economic or geographic barriers. The orchestra highlights its social conscience through music and educational programs.

rome Church is honored to be a CityMusic Cleveland concert venue and looks forward to May 12 when the orchestra returns to perform another free music program, which will include selections from Mendelssohn and Dvorak featuring violin soloist Tessa Lark, for all Collinwood to enjoy.
