Euclid Advances Next Phase of Waterfront Improvements



Phase II of Euclid's waterfront plan will feature a three-quarter mile multipurpose public trail and a sand "paddle-craft beach". This project is in the engineering and design stages and positioned to break ground in 2017.

Euclid's vision to provide unprecedented public waterfront access, habitat enhancements and upland stability is moving closer to reality.

Phase II of Euclid's waterfront plan is in the engineering and design stages and positioned to break ground in 2017. Complementing the 250' James Farrell Memorial Fishing Pier, rededicated in August 2013, the \$11.5M Phase II project features a three-quarter mile multipurpose public trail along the shoreline heading east from Sims Park. Engineered offshore rock structures to improve wave action and sediment flow, revetments to protect the upland and public access points connecting the trail are also included. At the western terminus – just past the location of a future marina - a sand "paddle-craft beach" will be created to launch kayaks, canoes and other small craft into Lake Erie.

"The next phase of improvements will allow more people to enjoy our beautiful lakefront while encouraging new development and setting the stage for a future marina," predicts Planning & Development Director Jonathan Holody.

This exciting vision to reclaim Euclid's historic waterfront began in summer 2009 when the City of Euclid engaged Smith-GroupJJR, an experienced waterfront engineering and design firm, to plan and implement waterfront enhancements. In April 2016 JJR's Project Landscape Architect and

Engineer met with shoreline property owners and the Waterfront Steering Committee to develop options, discuss easements and set a timeline for permitting and construction of Phase II.

A \$4 million Cuyahoga County Casino Revenue Fund loan, of which \$2 million is forgivable, provides a significant portion of the necessary funding. Additional project funding is provided by Federal, State, private foundation and local funds.

Please join us for a public meeting scheduled for Tuesday, May 24th at 7:00pm in Council Chambers at City Hall during a special meeting of the Planning & Zoning Commission. That evening a presentation of the final E.185th Street TCLI plan will also be presented by Northeast Shores Development Corporation.



Saving Lake Erie

Although Lake Erie water is only 2% of the Great Lakes, it provides drinking water for millions of people, electricity from over 20 power plants, and contains 50% of all the Great Lakes fish. Our lake is the most valuable fresh water fishery in the world. Power production, fishing, and tourism generate billions of dollars a year in revenues.

All this activity requires clean water. Unfortunately, the high levels of agriculture, industry, communities, and people surrounding the lake create serious water pollution Phosphorus and nitrogen can cause an over abundance of algae in the water. Toxic algae can sicken people, animals, and kill fish. In the 1960s the toxic algae blooms in the lake required legislation to reduce phosphorus from some detergents and cleaning supplies. Farmers also changed to lower phosphorus and nitrogen fertilizers. Those efforts helped clean up the lake to the point that by the 1980s we were

the "Walleye Capital of the World." Unfortunately, today this type of pollution has again risen to dangerous levels. In 2014, toxic algae caused nearly a halfmillion residents in Toledo to use bottled water for two days. There is good news, however. By reducing phosphorus and nitrogen flows into the lake by 40%, we could be at safe algae levels in weeks. This will take combined efforts by legislators, agriculture and residents to accomplish.

There are many other pollutants contaminating our water in addition to phos-

phorus and nitrogen. Residents can help reduce much of these pollutants by making a few easy and simple changes.

Reduce nitrogen and phosphorus. These chemicals in detergents, cleaners, and fertilizers go from your home and yard into the lake. Buy products with no phosphorous and use less fertilizer. Avoid washing anything on the driveway to prevent detergent running into the storm drain. Wait until after it rains to fertilize the lawn. Clean green. Harsh cleaning chemicals can harm you and the environment. Soap and water, vinegar, and baking soda will clean almost anything. Avoid cleaning products with antibiotics (vinegar is a safe, mild disinfectant). Reduce the use of bleach. Take unwanted prescriptions to a local drop box. For information on Green Cleaning workshops contact cuyahogaswcd.org, 216-524-6480x76.

Avoid products with "microbeads." Trillions of these plastic, pinhead size beads are going into the waterways. Once in the water they absorb toxins and then get into the fish. Many facial scrub cosmetics and super cleaning toothpastes contain these beads. For a list of products go to http:// onepercentfortheplanet.org/2014/10/a-listof-products-that-contain-plastic-micro-

Pick up the poop. Animal waste from agriculture and our yards is a major pollutant. For a small yard sign from the NEO Sewer District to remind dog walkers to "Pick up the Poop," call 216-881-6600.

Adopt a storm drain. Water from storm drains takes dirt, cut grass, leaves, debris, and yard runoff directly to the lake. Picking up litter and raking out your closest drain before a rain will help reduce these pollutants and prevent street flood-

Support local organic farmers. Sustainable agriculture practices produce healthy food and reduce pollution. Buying organic foods helps them stay in business and encourages other farmers to join them.

Go native. Native plants require less water, no fertilizers, and support birds and bees. Replace a patch of lawn with native flowers and shrubs. Avoid herbicides and pesticides that kill birds, bees, and fish in very high numbers.

Encourage legislators to pass laws protecting our waters. Contact your local and county governments to find out how they are helping the environment.

The National Stroke Association uses the following information to get people to act in recognizing symptoms and getting help. It is recommended to think "F.A.S.T." F – Face: Ask person to smile. Does one side

of the face droop? A - Arm: Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

S – Speech: Ask the person to speak a simple phrase. Does the speech sound slurred

T – Time: If you observe any of these signs, then it's time to call 9-1-1.

Heroin Related Deaths at an All Time High, Vivitrol Can be Life Saving

The heroin epidemic in Northeast Ohio is taking a toll on many families because of the increased number of fatal overdoses. Most of the overdoses are due to the heroin and fentanyl combination.

The Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office reported twelve fatal overdoses in four days in mid-March. A week later, they reported eight more fatalities within three days.

Police in Elyria said they responded to six overdoses in 24 hours in late April. So far the city of Elyria has seen twelve deaths due to the heroin epidemic.

Lake County has reported ten fatal overdoses so far this year, but that number is expected to increase according to the Lake County Coroner's office.

Moore Counseling and Mediation Services, Inc. provides help to individuals that are struggling with this addiction. Moore Counseling has been treating heroin and

other opioid users with Vivitrol, showing great success.

HIT THE GROUND RUNNING

Ironhawk Industrial is a manufacturer and distributor of high-tech snow removal products made in The United States. The company came to Euclid in 2012 and has enjoyed a great relationship with the city and the local business community. After the company started in late 2010, the owners looked for a location that provided expandable space, access to major interstate shipping routes and the right business environment.

Euclid is a community that is interested in growing economically. The mayor personally returned the owner's initial inquiry call, and the Economic Development Director Jonathan Holody has visited their offices several times to assist them with getting to know the resources available in Euclid. The infrastructure investment and landscaping on E. 222nd Street has been a real plus, along with responsive city services.

Ironhawk makes high-tech blades and cutting edges that are used in 38 state departments of transportation for plowing and road repair. Ironhawk also serves most of the municipalities in Northeast Ohio where clearing roads during the snow season is important to serving their residents


Snow Plow Blades Used by 38 States Made in Euclid

and businesses.

During the last five years, the company has acquired two additional snow-related companies: Safety Source, run by General Manager Pat Gavin, and Elkin, run by General Manager Eric Fox. Fundations Transforms Reading As educators we are always seeking the best

tools to help our students succeed in the classroom in each subject area. Phonics is such a key component to reading that we decided to explore how to enhance instruction here at Our Lady of the Lake School. With the support of Mrs. Kingsbury, and after doing some online research and speaking with reading specialists, we decided to focus on the Wilson Reading Fundations phonics program. This program is truly all encompassing. Fundations provides a systematic and explicit approach to reading and spelling with phonics.

In Fundations, students use all types of manipulatives along with fine and gross motor skills. Each day the class does a sound drill to focus on new sounds and review sounds previously taught. There are many picture cards (which the students love) and posters to aid in this process. Sound boards are used to help students spell words and allow teachers to observe exactly how a student is hearing a word. Fundations focuses on using fingers to tap the sounds of decodable words to assist students in hearing sounds. Students move quickly from spelling simple one-syllable words to multisyllabic words, which quickly increases their vocabulary. Expanding

vocabulary is another huge component of the program.

Fundations has completely changed my approach to teaching reading. As a reading teacher I would often say "Use your finger to help you follow along and point to the words." This program has taught me that we need to teach students to read in phrases as opposed to word-by-word. Teaching the "scooping" method always helps students to build fluency skills.

If you notice there is very little use of technology. After taking the class I learned this was done on purpose. The Wilson creators want the students doing everything by using fine or gross motor skills. They argue that students are relying too much on just opening a device and typing answers. This program really believes in muscle memory and how it helps the brain to remember faster and more easily.

We will be bringing the Wilson Reading Fundations phonics program to our entire Kindergarten through 2nd grade next year. Our teachers will all be attending training sessions over the summer. We know that implementation of this program will great ly benefit our students. We look forward to our coming 2016-2017 school year with enthusiasm and much excitement!

Looking For A Ham Sandwich

Todd G. Buchholz is quoted as saying "Today's generation is literally going nowhere." This is the common view of many people in this day and age, and I have to say that to some extent, I agree. Often, adolescents can be lazy, disrespectful, and not motivated to succeed. However, Euclid High School has program offerings that seek to fix that issue. A program that has been in existence since 1995 is the Euclid High School Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC).

The main goal of Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps is not to recruit you into the military, as many people believe. In actuality, the law prevents anyone in the program from ever recruiting you. Sergeant Major John F. Rethage, the Naval Science Instructor at Euclid High School, says that JROTC "...will instill discipline, responsibility, leadership, professionalism and a sense of pride in the unit. It will teach (the students) respect, attention to detail, and a sense of unity." In other words, the purpose of the program is not to put you into the military per se, but to give you useful life tools and a firm foundation as you go into the real world.

It is a citizen development program that everyone can benefit from, not just those who have an interest in joining the military. It builds the character of those involved by imparting values that simply make for a better person. The discipline, respect, self-confidence and commitment that is taught daily to the cadets by example, and by experience is simply invaluable.

When doing military drill on Mondays, students learn immediate obedience to orders. When preparing their uniform for personnel inspection on Wednesdays, students learn attention to detail. When given the opportunity to lead the platoon in an exercise on physical training Fridays, students gain a level of self-confidence.

In addition to helping students with their life in the here and now, the program prepares students for life after high school. It equips its cadets by teaching vital traits that will be needed in their professional life, such as leadership, economics, patriotism, teamwork, the importance of diet and exercise, and wise decision making. Cadets are constantly having resources shown to them that put them on track for either college or the military.

One such resource that is unique to the program is jrotccollegeprep.org., a website that administers practice tests to get students ready for taking the ACT and SAT. Another unique opportunity for students in the program is the Find Your Interest (FIY) survey that aids students in career exploration, offering information about various career paths. Cadets will also take the NEFE economics course that teaches them about financial planning.

Also, if the student is interested, they can request information about any branch of the military and any field they are interested in going into. Ultimately, the program covers a large range of life skills that will prepare a student for "the real world" whether that means attending college or joining

Sergeant Major Rethage often compares those who are "lost in the sauce" and "hoboes looking for ham sandwiches," to people who are living without purpose. I encourage you if you are like me, and you want to live with purpose, do something about it. Sign up for the course that will prepare you for your life after high school; the course that will give you the strategies you need to go into whatever field you are passionate about. March right down to your counselor and tell them to change your schedule and put JROTC on it. Let's become the generation that lives with purpose; join me in JROTC!

Large Organization of the Year: **HELP Foundation, Inc.,**



HELP Foundation has been a vital part of the Euclid community since 2009, when they opened their Adult Day and Vocational Program Center on Shore Center Drive along with services through the Seniors Program at the Lakefront Community Center. Organized in 1965, today HELP cares for more than 700 individuals each year in 27 locations throughout Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake and Summit counties and operates two residential facilities in Euclid that provide a welcoming home for 7 clients. Their mission is to "ensure that people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (or IDD) have the homes, environments and opportunities to be valued members of their communities".

In 2015, HELP Foundation purchased 4 acres of vacant land on Euclid Avenue and completed their new 10,500 SF office building which today serves as their administrative headquarters and training facility along with a new 8,300 SF storage building housing their many transportation vehicles and archived documents. With this new addition to the community HELP Foundation has brought on additional employees.

Small Organization of the Year: PetFix



Three years ago PetFix, transformed a former beauty salon at 885 East 222nd Street into its clinic. The move was significant for the small non-profit because the organization had traditionally provided spay/ neuter services through a mobile unit only that traveled across northeast Ohio. In its 10-year history, more than 50,000 dogs, puppies, cats and kittens have been fixed. A permanent location was needed and in June of 2015 the mobile clinic was retired and replaced with a full-time transport program which now allows pet owners from Cleveland's inner city and surrounding 4 counties who have no means of getting to and from the clinic, access to PetFix

Besides the important low-cost surgeries available to Euclid residents, the staff is dedicated to educating the public through community outreach. In the past two years, nearly 1,700 pets attended four wellness clinics held in Euclid and three Cleveland communities. Besides receiving vouchers for spay/neuter services at PetFix, each pet received a wellness exam and vaccinations from veterinarians who volunteered for the events. Nearly 450 pets who attended the events, were fixed at the Euclid clinic!

PetFix also partners with numerous community cat caregiving groups, including the Euclid Beach and Collinwood Feral Cat projects in 2013/14 where nearly 300 owned and free-roaming cats living in the 44119 and 44110 zip codes were fixed at no cost to the owners/caregivers.

Business Person of the Year: Janet Scott, owner of Great Scott Tavern



Janet Scott felt that Euclid needed a nice restaurant with cocktails, nice atmosphere, good food and reasonable costs within the city of Euclid. A lot of time and effort, including working with architects, lawyers and contractors, securing permits, financing, etc., were all involved in making the restaurant what it is today. Originally, she actually started out with the idea of opening a small coffee shop and ended up as we know the restaurant today!

The sound of whooping and hollering you hear is the happy dance at Ss. Robert and William Parish being done by Fr. John Betters (Pastor), Fr. Scott Goodfellow (Parochial Vicar), and the members of the Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Parish Ambassadors. The occasion is the result of our CRS Rice Bowl collection thus far:10 times more than the previous year, and still counting!

Catholic Relief Services carries out the commitment of the bishops of the United States to assist the poor and vulnerable overseas. The CRS Rice Bowl is an annual Lenten collection. Parishioners receive their Rice Bowl from the church at the beginning of Lent. They then make daily or weekly contributions to the Rice Bowl throughout the 40 days of Lent and finally return their filled Rice Bowl to the church during Easter. Our CRS Ambassadors are a newly formed group of five parishioners committed to helping the priests and staff at Ss. Robert & William make events like the Lenten Rice Bowl a huge success!

Using the tools offered by the CRS Rice Bowl website, our CRS Ambassadors team used bulletin inserts, Mass petitions, and personal reflections offered by each ambassador on the work of CRS. A Meatless Meal, featuring foods from five countries, using Stories of Hope videos, and modeling the Solidarity Walk, was also offered.

But it is really our Ss. Robert and William School, its staff and students, who became true advocates for the disadvantaged,

not only overseas, but in our community The faculty religion committee dedicated themselves this year to the Rice Bowl project. Through their leadership the iPad, iPhone, "I"-generation became immersed in the difficulties of life in the countries CRS serves. Twenty minutes of silence was observed during lunch each Monday, with that time reserved for Stories of Hope videos and readings, followed by silent reflection. The children were encouraged to participate with offerings to the Rice Bowl, and to collect non-perishables for our local Hunger Center. The lunchroom featured the poster of a child sitting at an empty table, representing all the Stories of Hope children. Each donated item earned a "can" on the table. The results were incredible! Literally hundreds of items were donated to the Euclid Hunger Center.

As CRS Parish Ambassadors, we know there is much work yet to be done, but we feel inroads have been made in our parish in promoting awareness and support of


