Metropolitan New York Synod

Reformation 500: "Faith, not Fear" – "Faith, not Fear" is our synodical tagline for 2017. Consider developing Bible Studies on how faith overcomes fear, a very relevant topic during our anxious times in nation and world. Or maybe plan a "Faith, not Fear" sermon series. Invite testimonials and conversation about how the power of faith in Christ can overcome our fears.

Revisiting the 95 Theses Today – Luther's posting of the 95 Theses is what got the Reformation started in the first place. Thus, we do well to take a look at the 95 Theses again today to see what the issues were then, and how those issues are still relevant today. We have developed a 95 Theses study guide based on Prof. Tim Wengert's new book, *Martin Luther's 95 Theses with Introduction, Commentary, and Study Guide.* In addition to this book available from Augsburg Fortress, the resource we have developed is available on our synod website for your local use and adaptation.

Rediscovering the Small Catechism: What does This Mean Today? – Most Lutherans have tales to tell about their days memorizing and studying Luther's Small Catechism. But again, the catechism is not just for kids! We have developed a spiritually compelling resource to worshipfully and conversationally engage the Small Catechism. Leaders and participants versions of this resource are also available on our synod website.

Luther's Spirituality in his Writings – Pastor Jonathan Linman is available to lead a presentation on Luther's spirituality in your local setting – an inspiring focus for our day when so many claim to be "spiritual, but not religious."

Telling Your Lutheran Stories – Consider inviting persons in your local setting to give testimonies or write up stories of what belonging to the Lutheran tradition means to them. See our synod website for examples of Lutheran stories. Also see the "Our Lutheran Life" series in *Living Lutheran*.
