

Open Doors 2015: International Students in the U.S. Up Ten Percent to Nearly One Million; Highest Rate of Growth in 35-Years; Increases Reported in 44 States. Study Abroad by American Students Picks Up Momentum

- Students from India and Brazil show the largest increases; Latin America is fastest growing region
- · Study abroad by U.S. students up by five percent


November 16, 2015 – The 2015 *Open Doors Report on International Educational Exchange*, released today, finds the number of international students at U.S. colleges and universities had the highest rate of growth in 35 years, increasing by ten percent to a record high of 974,926 students in the 2014/15 academic year. This strong growth confirms that the United States remains the destination of choice in higher education. The United States hosts more of the world's 4.5 million globally mobile college and

There were large increases in the number of students from Brazil, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, all countries whose governments are investing heavily in international scholarships for their students, sending tens of thousands of them abroad to develop a globally competent workforce. Nigeria also ranked among the fastest growing international student populations in the United States. Students from Brazil increased 78 percent to 23,675 this year, accounting for 12 percent of total growth. Latin America & the Caribbean was the fastest growing region of origin for international students in the U.S., increasing by 19 percent over the prior year, and benefiting from the support of 100,000 Strong in the Americas, a public-private partnership led by the U.S. State Department, as well as other initiatives launched by governments in the region.



"While more Japanese students still go to the United States and China, Canada has emerged as a new popular destination for language study, college and working holidays.


Japanese students can stay, study and travel in Canada without a visa for as long as six months and may opt for a holiday working visa that is good for a year.

Personal security has also been a concern among Japanese students, particularly after recent school shootings in the United States. "My parents were telling me, 'Oh, please assure us that you are going to be in a safe place," Ms. Katayanagi said.

"Our streets are extremely safe. Our communities are extremely safe. Most Canadians are very friendly," Mr. Keddy said. "If you are a Japanese parent and if you are thinking of your child going for a foreign education for whatever reason, what is happening in the U.S., it would be very difficult, I think, in clear conscience to send your child there."




Changing Tides in China

- Trends towards a nationalistic focus
 - English was downgraded on the Gaokao in 2016, scheduled to be phased out by 2020
 - 2014: Beijing stopped approving new international curriculums, limited the number of students permitted in existing programs, and insisted on city residency for enrollment
 - Additional limits on travel visas and "sister schools" abroad
- The massification of Chinese/Asian higher education
 - "Capacity showed a smooth increase from 0.67 million in 1988 to 1.08 million in 1998, and then surged from 1.6 million in 1999 to 6.89 million in 2012 more than 10 times in number within 25 years" Centre for Global Higher Education



Approximate Cost of an Undergraduate Education





GDP Per Capita, PPP







Saudi Arabia cuts funding for students abroad

A year ago, there were long waiting lists for foreigners seeking to move into residential compounds for well-off expatriates in Riyadh and oil-producing Eastern Province. The waiting lists have now shrunk or disappeared, and more villas in the compounds are vacant, residents say.

"Saudi Arabia continues to decline as a top destination for expatriates...given the country's higher dependence on oil revenues and the extent of planned austerity measures," Gulf Talent, an online recruitment portal for professionals, said in a report this month.

MORE INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS BEING RECRUITED

Enrollment leaders say developing international markets is just as or more important than developing domestic markets, with more than half of institutions making efforts to increase international student enrollment. Public institutions performed much better in 2015 than in 2014 in hitting their goals in recruiting international students. Private institutions lost ground in 2015 in their recruitment of this same student population.

Competition, state disinvestment in higher education, and losses from the Great Recession have all contributed to the difficult financial position many institutions find themselves in. Virtually all state flagships have increased their enrollment of out-of-state students, who pay more in tuition, building on a "merit-based financial aid arms race" as schools like the University of Wisconsin-Madison compete for its state's most talented with the University of Iowa or Illinois, for example.

The University of Chicago's average aid for international students has significantly decreased. During the 2013-2014 school year, its average award was \$53,637, making it a top 10 school for financial aid to students from abroad. For the 2014-2015 school year, that average fell to \$48,340, knocking the school out of the top 10.

Saudi Arabia cuts funding for students abroad

The government has been forced to tighten the rules of the \$6 billion King Abdullah Scholarship Fund, limiting it to those attending one of the top 100 universities globally, or studying a program rated in the top 50 in its field.

The government did not specify the scale of the cuts, but said the new conditions are part of its efforts to save money. It is cutting overall spending on education by 12% this year.



So Where Are They Headed Instead?


Q13 If yes, what locations are they now considering for study? (check all that apply)

Q16 If yes, where did they enroll? (check all that apply)





In recent years, however, a revival of the liberal arts model may be coming from a most unlikely place: Asia. While the future of small liberal arts colleges in the U.S., many seeing anemic funding and attendance rates, looks tenuous, in recent years, educators and administrators in countries like China, Japan, South Korea, and Singapore are focusing on schools which focus on critical thinking and creativity. While Asian students continue to stream into U.S. colleges – Chinese students alone account for nearly 30% of all foreign students in the country — there is a "gradual liberal arts switch happening," says David Kim, CEO of C2 Education, a tutoring and test preparation service with 150 centers nationwide and based in Atlanta, GA.



The traditionally American liberal arts model continues to gain popularity around the globe, but perhaps nowhere has it become so well-established so quickly as in the Netherlands. After Utrecht University founded the first liberal arts-oriented "University College" in 1998, several other Dutch research universities, including the Universities of Amsterdam, Leiden, and Maastricht, followed suit. At least two more university colleges, at the University of Twente and Erasmus University Rotterdam, are scheduled to open this September.







Political Climate Survey

214 responses collected

- 167 High School/Independent Counselors



Counselor Feedback

- Between a quarter and a third of respondents reported being asked by students frequently or in most conversations about political climate, guns, safety and security, racial tensions, and cost.
- Students are more likely to ask counselors about all of these topics, with the exception of:
 - Safety/security in the US (frequently to most conversations with students among 34% of respondents, 40% with parents)
 - Cost (frequently to most conversations with students among 73% of respondents, 82% with parents)
- Free responses added
 - Islamophobia/Anti-Muslim concerns
 - Concerns about acceptance and diversity
 - Concerns about civil discourse and both liberal and conservative extremism

Counselor Feedback

- 64% of counselors have seen an increase in traditionally US-bound students considering non-US options. Why?
 - Cost (80%)
 - Political/cultural climate (37%)
 - Guns (33%)
 - Safety/Security (32%)
- 35% said other factors are deterring students from applying to the US. Popular reasons included:
 - Difficulty of applying to the US
 - Increased awareness and appeal of non US options (clarity in admissions, sense of "adventure")
- Where are they going? Canada, UK, Europe



November

- 39% of counselors said the US election result in November may significantly change their students' and families' willingness to, or decision to, attend university in the United States
- "Two students have already changed their mind on ED applications to wait to hear about the election results. They are concerned to have to go to a country where they might not feel welcome and safe."
- These concerns will not disappear if Donald Trump loses the election

College and University Feedback

US Universities:

- 89% report being asked about cost often or always
- 39% report being asked about safety or security often or always
- 61% said push factors have negatively impacted yield at their school citing primarily cost (83%) and political climate (39%)
- When prompted explain concerns re: political climate
 - 13 of 14 free respondents said they've been asked about the presidential election \
 - "One counselor said every time Trump opens his mouth, more students look to Canada"

Non-Us Universities:

 3 European respondents, and all reported seeing an increase in US citizens triggered by cost and safety concerns
