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LHS Ranked Among Best High Schools By U.S. News & World Report

Lakewood High School has been named one of U.S. News & World Report's Best High Schools and a Bronze Medalist for 2017. The magazine awards Gold, Silver and Bronze medals according to state proficiency standards and how well schools prepare students for college.

Overall, the nation's high schools are scored on college readiness, math and reading scores and graduation rates. More than 20,000 public schools were evaluated and the schools scoring in the top 30% overall make the list.

Lakewood High was ranked 167th in the state, which falls in the top 20% of the 866 Ohio schools awarded medals.

Lakewood High fell 0.5 points short in the college readiness category of qualifying for the Silver Medal status.

"We are grateful for this recognition," said LHS Principal Keith Ahearn, who also added that the college readiness ranking may not accurately reflect the full diversity of opportunities available to students at Lakewood High School. The college readiness ranking is based on participation and perfor-

mance in Advanced Placement (AP) classes and tests.

"We are very proud of our 16 Advanced Placement course offerings and the students who are engaged in this rigorous course work, but we do not judge ourselves by their performance alone," Ahearn said. "We are also proud of our West-Shore Career Technical programs, where students are in classes that offer articulated college credit that will allow them to earn industry credentials or admittance to a two- or four-year technical school.

Scenic Street Open House Celebrates Transformation Of Vacant Lot Into New-Build

Builder Dana Paul was all smiles on this unseasonably-warm April evening as he unveiled the fruits of his tireless labor – a beautiful, new-build home at 1427 Scenic Street in Lakewood.

Nearly one year to the day after ground broke on this project, LakewoodAlive hosted a Scenic Street Open House on April 27, inviting city leaders and community members to Lakewood's Scenic Park neighborhood for an exclusive first look at the finished product. Paul, owner of Prairie Stone Group, the company responsible for the project, greeted friends and gave personal tours of the home marking the culmination of a long-held aspiration to give new life to a once-vacant lot.

The 1,425 square foot home features three bedrooms, two-and-a-half bathrooms and a craftsman building style emphasizing handcrafted quality and keen attention to detail. Paul intends to list the home for sale in the coming weeks.

The Open House festivities included tours, refreshments courtesy of Aladdin's Eatery and a ribbon-cutting ceremony. Paul, Lakewood Mayor Michael Summers, and LakewoodAlive Executive Director Ian Andrews addressed attendees from the property's front steps.

"It's a big deal when someone has the confidence to invest in our community," Mayor Summers said. "It's an even bigger deal when they commit to building a single house with a new design. We thank you, Dana, for your creative work and your investment in Lakewood."

With assistance from the City of Lakewood and the Cuyahoga Land Bank, LakewoodAlive had sought to convert this previously-vacant lot in western Lakewood into a new, single-family home. That transformation dream has now been realized.

"LakewoodAlive is thrilled to have played a role in this unique opportunity to inspire a rebirth for this property and to effect positive change within this historic Lakewood neighborhood," Andrews said. "We're extremely grateful to our partners and to Dana for their incredible work with reactivating this property."

The Making of a Housing Dream


In 2015, LakewoodAlive began its Community Engagement Program with a goal of interacting with residents in the Birdtown and Scenic Park neighborhoods to connect them to resources ensuring they live in healthy and safe homes. The nonprofit organization began investigating the lot, which had been vacant and controlled by the Cuyahoga Land Bank for the past three years.

LakewoodAlive worked with the City of Lakewood and the Land Bank to determine if a single-family home could be built on the property. Once the analysis confirmed this feasibility, a request for proposals was sent to dozens of developers. The property was transferred from the Land Bank to LakewoodAlive on January 6, 2016, setting this ambitious project in motion.

Prairie Stone Group was chosen as the developer for the home and took title on March 1, 2016. Excavation commenced April 30, 2016, and LakewoodAlive hosted a Scenic Park House Project Launch Party on May 19, 2016. Since then, Paul's tremendous efforts have resulted in the remarkable final product that now sits at 1427 Scenic Street.

City Council Meeting: April 17, 2017

All members of Council were present except Councilman Litten, whose absence was excused.

Public Works Committee Report

The Public Works Committee met on April 10, 2017 to discuss Ordinances 18-17 and 20-17. Present at the meeting were Councilman Nowlin (chair), Councilmembers Litten and Marx, Director Beno, Assistant Law Director Swallow, representatives from AT&T and and representatives from Cornucopia, Inc.

Councilman Nowlin discussed Ordinance 18-17, the proposal to grant three AT&T easements on city property for the use of internet and telecommunications services to its customers. During the meeting, Director Beno used an interactive map to show the three proposed locations: 14740 Lakewood Heights Blvd, 13029 Madison Avenue, and 14601 Detroit Avenue (technically on Warren Road near Boston Market). Beno searched with AT&T to find least conspicuous locations for the sizable pieces of equipment. AT&T has long term plans to position 50 pieces of new equipment in the public right of way over the next several years.

Councilmembers expressed hesitation installing new equipment in areas where old equipment was already highly visible, specifically the Detroit location. The members present voiced interest in minimizing the impact of this new equipment before installation. Councilmembers proposed using the easements as canvases for public art, as well as emphasized the importance of establishing design and sighting standards for all utility equipment. The Committee moved to defer the legislation in order to purpose more time to explore these ideas.

In addition, the Committee discussed Ordinance 20-17, the proposal to authorize a lease between the city and Cornucopia, Inc. for the provision of summer concessions at Lakewood Park. Councilmembers and employees of Cornucopia discussed potential hours of operation, removal of refuse, advertising, and employees. The law department brought a draft lease agreement and a brief overview of its points, as well. The Committee recommended adoption, with all members of the meeting present expressing optimism to the addition to Lakewood Park. The Council deferred the ordinance to the following meeting for review.

Public Safety Committee Meeting Report

The Public Safety Committee met on April 10, 2017 regarding the Animal Safety and Welfare Advisory Board. All members were present, and Council Chair O'Malley and Councilmember Marx advocated support of Ordinance 19-17, a proposed amendment to the code providing greater freedom to the Board to deliberate on animal related topics. O'Malley explained that in 2013, the code was amended to protect

the Board from deliberating on topics not explicitly referred to them from the Council docket. Frustrated by its inability to engage in pertinent animal related issues concerning the city in a timely manner, the Board hopes to reinstate prior language to the code. During the meeting, Councilmembers discussed many animal issues facing the city and voiced support for the board for bringing it to their attention. The committee supports adoption of this amendment, and it was deferred to the following meeting.

Lake Erie Wind Energy Project

Mayor Summers, in conjunction with Councilmembers Bullock, Marx, and O'Malley, presented the Ice Breaker Wind Project for Lake Erie by the Lake Erie Energy Development Company (LEED-Co). LEED-Co has worked for over a decade to pioneer freshwater wind farm technology. If approved, the company would install wind turbines seven miles off the coast of Lake Erie, visible from the shoreline on a clear day. Mayor Summers remarked on Cleveland's history of coal fire and power plants, saying, "We owe it to our community, both current and future, to support alternative sources of power generation to both diversify our supply and improve our environment."

Resolution 8929-17 expresses the City of Lakewood's support for the wind energy project. Summers explained the project is currently in the permitting phase and recommended LEED-Co to talk to the Council and Administration about the project, implementation plans, and impact on

the community. Councilmember Bullock voiced his enthusiastic support for the project, encouraging community members to write letters of support for the clean energy initiative. The Council adopted the resolution.

Potential Bike Share in Lakewood

"Spring is here, and bicycles are on the streets," Councilmember Marx began happily. She recognized the City's aim to be healthiest city in the United States, emphasizing Lakewoodites' commitment to active living. Marx coordinated a meeting with Bike Lakewood, Beat Cycles, and Spin Bike Shop with Alex Baca, the general manager of University Hospital (UH) Bikes, the bike share in Cleveland to inform the group of the steps to take to creating a bike share in Lakewood. Baca educated the group on the steps involved in creating a bike share in Lakewood. He also invited City Council and the Administration to take a courtesy tour through UH bikes to experience downtown Cleveland by bicycle.

Mayoral Appointment to LW Citizens Advisory Committee

Mayor Summers appointed Joshua Gonzalez to the Lakewood Citizens Advisory Committee. The Mayor described Gonzales as a young and new resident to Lakewood who brings great amount of enthusiasm and a desire to be involved in any way possible.

Mayoral Appointment to Lakewood Audit Committee

Mayor Summers appointed Adam Wills to the Lakewood Audit Committee for a two-year term, expiring in 2019. Wills grew up in Lakewood and went to Lakewood High School, expressing excitement to be involved with his hometown. Willis is a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) and is currently working as the Audit Manager for PricewaterhouseCoopers.

2007 GO Bond Private Placement Refunding and 1995 Water Revenue Bonds Defeasance

Finance Director Pae brought two pieces of financial legislation to the docket. First, she introduced Ordinance 21-17, which would refund \$6.05 million of the outstanding 2007 general obligation bonds via a private placement arrangement with Capital One (in order to reduce interest costs). Pae also introduced Ordinance 22-17, authorizing Council to defease, or pay off, the \$670,000 outstanding of the 1995 water revenue bonds, via the establishment of an escrow account with Huntington Bank. City Council referred both ordinances to the following Finance Committee Meeting.

Announcements from Council

Council Vice President Anderson thanked the Clerk of Council and City IT Department for their aid in presenting the agenda digitally for the public. In addition, Council President O'Leary jokingly encouraged residents to pay their taxes before April 18.

City Council Meeting: April 3, 2017

Rules & Ordinances Committee Report

Committee chair Councilman Litten, Councilmembers Marx, Nolan, and Bullock, Director Beno of Public Works, legislative liason Maureen Bach, Bill Hanna from Walter Haverfield, Kevin Lynch from AT&T, and several members of the public attended the last Rules & Ordinances Committee Meeting on Monday, March 27. First, the committee discussed Ordinance 59-16, regarding use of public ways by service providers. The committee discussed minor substitutions to curb ramps and how they should be left after work is completed, so as to conform to existing specifications within the city. While Lynch expressed concern for the ordinance, the committee recommended adoption of the ordinance.

In addition, the meeting discussed the ongoing Overlook Signage Project. The committee decided communication should be tabled until cost estimates for the design and maintenance plans are revised. "With new specifics," Litten stated, "the project could be brought back to the committee," as well as City Council. Ordinance 59-16: Use of Public Ways

by Service Providers

Kevin Lynch, the Director of External Affairs from AT&T, spoke to council about how the ordinance was "overbearing" and "unnecessary." Lynch explained that AT&T is concerned provisions will negatively impact the construction process for AT&T and other network providers. Lynch commented that AT&T would "simply be unable to comply" with proposed requirements, stating the process required for construction permits, under the new ordinance, will stall investment to the city and potentially prohibit 5G and future technologies to Lakewood residents. He threatened that AT&T is considering shifting its investment to another city over Lakewood with less burdensome restrictions, arguing that the Lakewood right of way ordinance is one of the most restrictive in the state. Lynch requested pulling the ordinance from the docket in order for AT&T to work further with council to revise it.

In response, Law Director Butler stated that the City is committed to working with all utilities working within the public right of way as the new regulations go into effect. Councilmember Anderson asked Bill Hanna

from Walter Haverfield to comment on AT&T's characterization of this ordinance as one of the most restrictive in the state. Butler responded he is aware of more detailed and demanding local legislation, remarking the characterization of Lakewood's ordinance as the most restrictive in the state as an unfair assessment. Next, Hanna remarked most communities do not exercise authority to regulate occupancy and use of right of way, leaving it instead to the state statute. He continued that Cleveland Heights and Painesville have more burdensome ordinances, contending Lakewood's ordinance is a conscious effort to address concerns in a way that is workable for both the city and occupants of the right of way.

Mayor Summers stated Lakewood is a unique community and comparisons to other cities were not relevant. He continued saying that Director Beno, Mr. Lynch, and engineers from AT&T planned to meet to work things



Obligatory Disclaimer: Record reviews are a tricky business. It's one thing to enjoy music, but to, like, pick out what you like about it? That being said, if I review your thing and I didn't like something, don't feel too bad. My opinion doesn't matter all that much.

Air Sicily - Sexy Eurobeat Vol. 1 -Objectively Good Records & Tapes - 5 songs - Cassette, download

Astute readers may remember that I've already reviewed this cassette. However, this is a brand new reissue of it, dubbed at a higher quality and, on my end, listened to through better speakers. I thought about just publishing the old review again, but where's the fun in that? I might as well go on about this new one for a while. I know for sure that local radio personality Jack and occasional door guy Noah are on this tape, but I'm told that Quality Time Records' own Ricky Hamilton was also involved, so there you go. You may be surprised to learn that this tape is exactly what I said it was before: 4 "music" tracks (I'm counting the rambling intro as a separate thing entirely; you may

decide not to) of noisy punk no wave. At its root, it's solid punk. There's just a bunch of noise on top of it and Jack muttering incoherently. This is an advance tape copy of the upcoming split 7" between these bands. I'm not sure which band is supposed to be Side A, so I'm going with Diva Cup. I think their two tracks are a step up from their previous 7", as they slow it down a bit ("slow" in this case being a relative term). I like the wrestling-style intro that kicks it off. The second song, which according to their Bandcamp page (no song titles were included with the tape) is called "Smart Ass" might be their best song

yet. I'm still not entirely sold on their whole all-bass abrasive hardcore thing, but they make it work well enough, so what do I know? I'm less familiar with Short Order, but what they seem to do is very short and very fast hardcore songs. I did note that their side sounds a lot cleaner. I assume that the actual 7" will include credits for that, but for now, hey, props to whoever recorded it, you did alright. My favorites of theirs were the second song and I think the eighth song (it's the one where they slow down for half a second), but my count might be messed up. My favorite part of this tape was actually the artwork, which looks to be screened onto an Aldi bag and doesn't actually fit in the cassette case at all. If you like your music really fast at all times, you'll probably like both bands here. 3.6/5

Rose Iron Works - Hidden Cleveland Gem

Overlook Park Neighborhood Association had the wonderful opportunity of taking a field trip of sorts to Rose Iron Works on E. 43rd St. in Cleveland. For over 100 years, Rose Iron Works, a family business, has been known for exceptional quality decorative metalwork. Together with industrial metalworking (started during the Depression to make ends meet), their products range from traditional to Art Deco and Contemporary styles.

Clients of Rose Iron Works (RIW) include the Mathers, Walter and Windsor White, Dr. George Crile, the Vansweringen and Halle brothers, and institutions such as Rockefeller's church, The Temple at University Circle, and St. James Catholic Church here in Lakewood. Many houses on Millionaire Row exhibited their craftsmanship. More recent works include collaborating with Victor Schrenkengost with "Time and Space" - the Zodiac Mural at Cleveland Hopkins, and the hall

mural at the Botanical Gardens. Additional commissioned work includes the stylized Ohio State seal in Youngstown, railings at the Cleveland Museum of Art, works at Western Reserve Herb Garden, the Union Club, as well as corporate sculpture and logos for many firms such as Republic Steel, Marathon and BP. RIW's work has been recognized with awards and acclaim throughout its existence. Karen Kasich, First Lady of Ohio, sought them out to design and create a chandelier for the Governor's Residence. Some of their pieces are at the Cleveland Museum of Art. Check out any metalwork in your Lakewood home, including decorative metal stair railings for the RIW stamp. Visit their website at roseironworks.com to match designs found in your own Lakewood or Cleveland home.

The grandson of founder Martin Rose, Bob Rose, graduated from Carnegie-Mellon with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. Continuing his family's legacy, Bob created an Artist in Residency program. He recruited Stephen Yusko, having admired his work for several years including his reputation as a fine designer and smith. Overlook Park neighbors also met Yusko in his new studio behind RIW's building. Yusko has shown his work in juried exhibitions nationwide and has taught at several craft schools and universities.

The 2017 World Congress will be held in Cleveland from Mary 14-21, 2017. This Congress will focus on the works of distinguished artists, designers, and craftsmen in America's industrial heartland. Rose Iron Works will be featured. See ArtDeco-WorldCongress.org for more details.

Additionally, the first major museum exhibition to focus on American taste during the creative explosion of the 1920s, 'The Jazz Age' will be a multi media experience of more than 400 examples of interior design, industrial design, decorative art, jewelry, fashion, architecture, music and film.

Within the confines of a concentration camp a secret love affair illustrates how the selfless love of one person for another can overcome oppression, even under the most extreme circumstances. When Bent was written, there was little awareness about the persecution of homosexuals by the Nazis. The original production starred Ian McKellen, and the play has gone on to increase education and historical research. Nominated for a 1979 Tony Award for Best Play.

Lyrics by Stephen Sondheim and directed by Scott Spence Gypsy is the Winner of multiple Tony, Grammy, and Drama Desk Awards for both the original production and its revivals, it is considered by many to be one of Broadway's all-time triumphs. The musical follows an overbearing stage mother, Mama Rose, and her two daughters across the country during the 1920's when vaudeville was dying and burlesque was born. Based on the memoirs of Gypsy Rose Lee, the score features songs that have become standards, and helped launch the career of Stephen Sondheim. "Everything's Coming Up Roses" and "Let Me Entertain You," are among the musical highlights.

The first stop on the 2017 Taste of Lakewood food tour: Thai Thai.

The Taste Food Tour: Thai Thai

I'm a soup gal. Since I was a kid, I've been known to eat it for lunch, dinner and even breakfast (my grandma told me it was ok and would heat up some for me in the mornings when I visited).

I could eat soup every day. Some-

times I do. I kid you not. Nothing satisfies like a steaming hot bowl of soup on a tough day, a cold day, a rainy one or even a good one.

I also love Asian food, particularly the flavorful kick that comes with Thai cooking. That's why, when I saw a picture of Thai Thai's Street Noodle Soup on Instagram a year ago, I knew I needed to dive into that giant bowl of goodness. A rich broth filled with rice noodles, bean sprouts, cilantro and choice of protein – beef, chicken or tofu.

Thanks to my friend Karen Lee, who felt on a not-too-distant cold, rainy day that we needed soup for a planned lunch date, I got my chance. I'm not ashamed to admit I've been hooked from Day 1.

Family-owned and run Thai Thai, 13735 Madison Ave., opened at in March 2016 and has been serving some of the Suttell family's favorite Bangkok street food ever since.

General Manager Siriphan Wongpeng, better known as Kiwi, manages the operations, while her mother cooks all the deliciousness using the family's favorite recipes they brought with them from Bangkok, Thailand. She also manages the restaurant's mouthwatering Instagram account and Facebook page.

Every time I go to Thai Thai, I tell myself I am going to try something different like:

 ${\it Larb}-{\rm North}\,{\rm Eastern\text{-}style}\,{\rm minced}$

chicken salad with chili, roasted rice powder, red onion, lime, lemongrass and cilantro – one of Evan's favorites

Pad Ke Mao – Fresh rice noodles with vegetables, chili, basil and choice of protein. According to the menu, the dish is said to cure hangovers

Kra Praow – A spicy, "most popular street dish" featuring a choice of protein with basil, fresh chili and garlic, served with jasmine rice and a fried egg.

But they also have traditional Pad Thai and Red, Green and Massaman curries. Such decisions!

On our most recent visit, Scott had the Kra Praow and raved about it. It looked terrific. I, however, only partially got out of my rut and tried the Street Noodle Soup with beef instead of my usual tofu (some of the best tofu I've ever had). Be sure to drizzle on either Thai Thai's house-made hot sauce (a little goes a long way) or some sriracha on the soup. Gives it all a little zing.

I asked Kiwi which recipe is her favorite. She says it's the Roasted Duck Noodle Soup (are you sensing a theme here?). Besides duck in a savory broth, it has bean sprouts, fresh cilantro, Chinese broccoli and roasted garlic. Even the menu notes, "Very Good!!!"

Don't forget to try Thai Thai's appetizers. If I ever break away from a meal of soup and try an actual plated entrée, I want to get one of the other



Thai Thai's signature Street Noodle Soup with tofu. Blogger favorite. Season this and any other dish with housemade hot sauces or sriracha.


soups in the Starter menu – Tom Yum (a spicy-sour soup with lemongrass, mushrooms, chili, cilantro and choice of shrimp or tofu) or Tom Kha (a mild coconut milk soup with a touch of chili, galangal, lemongrass and a choice of chicken and tofu).

But, seeing that I wanted still more of that addictive Street Noodle Soup, we went with the Fried Meat Balls on a Stick, served with a sweet-and-spicy sauce, and the Thai Egg Rolls stuffed with veggies and minced pork. I'm ready to go back for more. And, I know we will.

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

Movie Review Of "Going In Style"

"Going in Style" is a modern satirical comedy featuring five established more mature actors and performers. This 2017 movie of 96 minutes is a well done Zach Braff remake of the 1979 version starring George Burns, Art Carney, Lee Strasberg, and Charles Hallahan. In "Going in Style" three older retirees decide to rob a bank, which is unfairly foreclosing on mortgages. The bank, along with their former employer, a steel company which is moving overseas, is responsible for taking away their retirements earned after many years of hard work. This movie does not resemble bank robber movies like "Bonnie and Clyde" with Faye Dunaway and Warren Beatty. Regrettably, these now more mature actress and actor were unfairly embarrassed at the 2016 Academy Awards, when Academy management had them initially announce the incorrect winner of the 2016 movie of the

Except for some machine gun fire in an earlier bank robbery at the same bank where Joe (Michael Caine, age 84, "Blame It on Rio," Batman movies) was a witness, and later gunfire at the subsequent robbery, the movie had no violence. There are only a couple of adult scenes in good taste with Albert (Alan Arkin, age 83, "Catch-22"), and a grocery store cashier (Ann-Margret, age 75, "Viva Las Vegas"). Willie (Morgan Freeman, age 79, "Shawshank Redemption," 'God' in "Bruce Almighty," also Batman movies), Albert, and Joe, the unfairly treated steel company retirees, are persuaded by Joe to rob the New York bank that is threatening to foreclose on his home. There seem to be a variety of motives of this hilarious attempt of the retirees venturing into what seems like a silly and impossible adventure: needing money, wanting to prove they can do it as seniors, living life to the fullest

and with much risk, wanting to get even with the company and bank, and other issues. Interestingly, as experienced men in the ways of the world, they do a training exercise of shop lifting at a grocery store. A very funny sequence involves the getaway driver, Albert, who leaves the getaway car instead of staying with it. Joe and Willie try to escape on an electric grocery cart. While Joe drives, Willie sits up front in the big basket, opens a flour bag, and douses the female security guard who is chasing them, with flour. Woefully, all three are caught, but the head security guard lets them off with a warning. They now realize they need expert advice. Joe goes to his somewhat low-life divorced son-in-law, who sells many varieties of marijuana, to see if he knows someone who can train them. After some hilarious training, they decide they are ready to do the heist. There are interesting

minor characters such as a senile friend (Christopher Lloyd, age 78, "Back to the Future") helping with a cotton candy maker, a suave law enforcement officer (Matt Dillon), a frightened, nervous bank manager (Josh Pais), and a character waitress (Siobhan Hogan). In the seniors' planning for the bank robbery, they set up interesting alibis such as using a porta-potty. They also use an unusual hotwired escape vehicle. There is a nail-biting sequence featuring a lineup with a little girl witness. The end of the movie has an interesting conclusion with a coincidence with their crime trainer, a puppy, the law officer, and a dog carrier box. Recommended for older children on up.


