



Lakewood Interceptor Tunnel Rehabilitation Project Is Now Underway



The Lakewood Interceptor Tunnel Rehabilition Project is now underway. This major effort by the City of Lakewood helps us protect the lake we love and meet the requirements of the federal Clean Water Act.

The Lakewood Interceptor Project is a key element of the Lakewood program, which is working towards modernizing our sewer system to protect the natural environment and meet the requirements of the federal Clean Water Act.

The project will reline the large, combined sewer intercep-

City of Lakewood's Clean Water tor that transports flow from the local, street-level collection system from most of the city to the Lakewood Wastewater Treatment Plant. There, the flow is treated to meet rigid environmental standards and is safely released back into the environment offshore in Lake Erie.

> Our current combined sewer design was common a century ago, and under most circumstances, transports all waste to the treatment plant. However, during heavy rain or snow-melt events, this infrastructure was designed to overflow some untreated waste mixed with stormwater into the environment via permitted

Congratulations Chief Kevin Fischer

In Lakewood, we all benefit from the highly skilled, professional, and dedicated servants in our public safety forces who do so much for us all. We have also had a history of great leadership in our safety forces, and I was excited to recently swear in someone well suited to continue that tradition -Police Chief Kevin Fischer.

Chief Fischer is long-time veteran of the Lakewood Police Department (LPD) who has spent his entire career serving our residents and keeping the public safe. Starting off as a patrolman in 1999, Chief Fischer has risen through the ranks over time, and has been in leader roles for over a decade, first serving as a sergeant and then lieutenant prior to taking on his new role.

In determining who would succeed our prior chief, Kevin Kauchek, the City conducted a civil service by Meghan George, Mayor, City of Lakewood

He has served as the head of LPD's Training Division and led the Narcotics and Vice Unit. Chief Fischer also has experience as both a Neighborhood Officer and a Motorcycle Officer.

One aspect of Chief Fischer's background that shows his mind-

set for innovation is his status as the first member of LPD to receive formal training and certification as a Crisis Intervention Officer. He achieved that accreditation nearly a decade ago, and since then has helped lead the way by integrating crisis intervention methods to LPD. One of his goals is to continue adding more and more officers to the ranks of those officially qualified with the crisis intervention designation.

Chief Fischer's ties to our Lakewood community run deep he grew up in Lakewood, is a proud graduate of Lakewood High School, and remains a Lakewood resident to this day. I look forward to working with Chief Fischer to keep Lakewood safe and to continue enhancing the methods and tools LPD draws upon to deliver top notch service to our residents and the public. When you see the Chief out and about, I encourage you to say hello and welcome him to his new role.

Many Reasons To Vote No August 8th

As you may have heard, there is an unusual extra "election day" at an unusual time in Ohio on Tuesday, August 8th. There is only one item on the ballot, "Issue One," but it is imperative you vote in this election and vote "No" on Issue One. If Issue One passes, it will forever alter how amendments to the Ohio Constitution are passed and make the process significantly less democratic. It would take away the last remedy we, the people, have to make any change without being stopped by the gerrymandered supermajority in the Ohio General Assembly.

Currently, if the people want to make a change or pass a law that the state legislature will not, we must collect hundreds of thousands of signatures from half the counties in Ohio. The proposed amendment must then meet strict language requirements to make it to the ballot. Finally, it is put up for a yes or no vote in the next statewide election. As you might expect in a democracy, if the majority of the voters vote "Yes," the amendment is adopted. Currently, many amendments do fail, and some pass with popular support.

This process is already extremely difficult and arduous. Issue One would needlessly make it harder to the point of near impossibility for the people of

ahead of the August 8th Special Election. Ohio to exercise their constitutional right to amend. To begin with, it increases the number of signatures to 5% of the registered voters of every one of Ohio's 88 counties, which includes exceptionally rural areas where this would be nearly impossible.

The kicker is Issue One would increase the percentage needed for the amendment to pass from a simple majority to 60%. That's right: even if, say, 58% of the state voted in favor of an amendment (by all measures, a very popular

issue), the amendment would fail.

The immediate cause of the Ohio General Assembly resorting to such anti-democratic measures is the Reproductive Rights Amendment on the November ballot. However, Issue One would go far beyond and effectively shut down the peoples' Amendment process permanently, a process that has worked just fine for 111 years. It would halt any chance for progress in the foreseeable future on all issues like raising the minimum wage, marijuana

legalization, criminal justice reform, environmental issues, etc.

I will leave you with an excerpt from Teddy Roosevelt's speech to the 1912 Ohio Constitutional Convention in support of the very process Issue One would destroy: "But it is a false constitutionalism, a false statesmanship, to endeavor by the exercise of a perverted ingenuity to seem to give the people full power and at the same time to trick them out of it... Constitutionmakers should make it clear beyond the shadow of a doubt that the people in their legislative capacity have the power to enact into law any measure they deem necessary for the betterment of social and industrial conditions. To hold the contrary view is to be false to the cause of the people, to the cause of American democracy."

Please, join me in upholding what Teddy Roosevelt called "the absolute right of the people" and vote no on Issue 1.

outfalls, which can pollute our community waters.


The tunnel is the critical backbone of the city's sewer system. It is buried below Edgewater Drive at the east end of the city at West 117th Street and runs west before turning south beneath West Clifton and onto the Lakewood Wastewater Treatment Plant. The project will require rebuilt and new vertical access points from the surface. These access shafts are being identified along the interceptor, and in all cases, will be situated within the existing right-of-way. This is a significant construction project,

requiring large equipment and considerable material.

We do not anticipate needing access to private property, but work areas will require lane shifts and other traffic configuration adjustments. We will contact impacted areas and properties directly to provide additional, area-specific information.

The Interceptor Tunnel Rehabilitation Project is a critical part of the Lakewood's sustained reinvestment for infrastructure renewal in the 21st century.

LREF Summer Fundraiser Kicks Off

Did you know that the Lakewood Rangers Education Foundation (LREF) provided more than \$41,000 in scholarships to members of the Lakewood High School Class of 2023? Or that LREF awarded nearly \$14,000 in teaching grants for Lakewood City Schools staff members for the 2022-2023 school year? These are just a couple of the myriad areas in which the Foundation is able to help provide support for Lakewood City Schools students

and staff. To do so, LREF runs several fundraising campaigns throughout the year. LREF will be kicking off its Summer Fundraising Campaign week on Sunday, July 30, which is National Public Education Day.

Beyond the teaching grants and scholarships, LREF provides significant supplemental funding to the Lakewood City School District for academics, performing and visual arts, athletics, clubs, scholarships, and more. Some examples include providing support for private student music lessons, new marching band uniforms, specialized athletic equipment and training clinics and transportation for the 4th grade field trip to see the Cleveland Orchestra. Money raised in the Summer Fundraising Campaign will be dedicated to the Foundation's Teaching Grant Program.

Teaching grants are awarded annually to support innovative classroom and co-curricular projects led by Lakewood Schools faculty, and benefit students at every grade level in all buildings. If our campaign this summer is successful, LREF hopes to award a greater number of grants and dollar figure beyond the \$13,700 given out last school year. Some of the teaching grant projects LREF has funded in past

years include elementary Battle of the Books, CREATURES in the Classroom for the Lakewood High MILES unit, Middle School Soccer Club, Lakewood High Model UN and Academic Challenge clubs, elementary reading and STEM projects, CHAMPS Cafe at Horace Mann Elementary, Gardening Club, various field trips, and more.



A soul wronged is beaten and raped and so much: buried alive in a force that is wrong, and no "right" matters.


History is not written by the victors in America-- it is written by more and better approximations of listening and hearing and seeing that suffering is a quotient we will not refuse.

You Can See Good Knight's Rest At The Quilting Bee

The Quilting Bee is pleased to present the fiber artwork "Good Knight's Rest" by Ellen Howard. This work combines Howard's love of sewing and art into a unique soft sculpture. Made entirely of cotton muslin, it features a knight's tomb effigy as a full-size figure, presented atop quilted shields that resemble relief carvings. The idea first emerged in 1978 and was recorded in a sketchbook. The title preceded the actual completed artwork by 44 years and prompted some details in the quilted decoration.

After her retirement from teaching art at Cleveland Central Catholic High School in 2014, there was time to focus on the figure. After a few trips to Cleveland Museum of Art's armor court, she determined that her own stature could be used to create proportions like those in some shorter medieval armor. Experimentation with machine quilting on her



45-year-old sewing machine resulted in a pattern to suggest chain mail. The entire work reflects an original concept worked out with assorted interfacing and batting supports along with an eye towards threedimensional design. An experienced seamstress, Ellen has produced mostly two-dimensional art before the knight emerged.

The soft sculpture "Good Night's Rest" won the People's Choice award at The NEW NOW 2022 juried show presented by the Artists Archives of the Western Reserve at Tri-C Gallery East in the fall of 2022. You can see "Good Knight's Rest" in The Quilting Bee's window, 15709 Detroit Avenue, from Friday, August 4 through Monday, August 7. Stop in to meet the artist, Ellen Howard, on Saturday, August 5 from 12 pm to 3 pm.

Senior Health Fair at Westerly Apartments August 9

If you are an older adult, do you sometimes wish one venue could offer valuable information pertaining to multiple aspects of your everyday life? The Senior Health & Wellness Fair hosted by the Barton Center might be just that.

This free event will be held Wednesday, August 9, from 10:00am - 2:00pm at the Westerly Senior Apartments, 14300 Detroit Avenue. (The Barton Center is located within the Westerly complex.) Be aware that you should arrive via the Barton Center entrance only. Once inside the facility, staff and volunteers will direct you to sites. Over 60 participants will be positioned throughout the ground floor.

All are welcome, but be advised that resources are primarily geared toward those in the 60+ demographic.

Free screenings for balance, blood pressure and vision will be offered. Otherwise, representatives from many sectors (not only healthcare) will answer your questions and distribute materials covering a variety of topics. There will also be food trucks, including "Wrap It Up," as well as raffles.

The gathering will allow attendees to learn what services are available and to connect on an individual basis. Many residents of the community may not realize what is there for them

throughout the area. Here is one way to find out.

Examples of those expected to take part include The Gathering Place (cancer support group), Hearing Science and Lakewood Community Paramedic. You can also speak with a geriatric massage therapist. Beyond the health industry, The League of Women Voters, Global Meals and Cuyahoga County Consumer Affairs will also be present. This is an opportunity for you to discover numerous entities ready to introduce themselves and address your interests and concerns. Upon entering, you will be offered a bag to facilitate collecting pamphlets and other giveaways from vendors.

While visiting, please DO NOT park on Westerly property as you may be taking a space from a resident, especially one with limited mobility. The Barton Center entrance is located in the "parking circle" that borders all three buildings in the back. (Enter via Detroit Avenue or Marlowe, immediately south of the railroad tracks.) Guests can be dropped off while their driver parks elsewhere. Try nearby streets such as Olivewood or Lincoln (south of The Westerly off Detroit) or the limited spaces available at nearby Lakewood Presbyterian Church, 14502 Detroit Avenue. Parking on Detroit in front of the Westerly will be available too. The RTA 26 lines stop close to the Westerly should you prefer to travel by bus.

Mark your calendar for the August 9 Barton Center Senior Health & Wellness Fair. It may be the one stop information shopping experience you've been looking for.


