I am Martha Woerner, and I'm running for a seat on the Lakewood Board of Education this fall. As a passionate believer in the power of public education to transform lives, I decided to run for a seat for two reasons.

First, I am the parent of two young children (a 2 1/2 year-old and a newborn) who are future Lakewood students, and I believe that our board needs greater representation from this demographic. Parents of young children are in it for the long-haul with the district - my youngest son will



graduate in 2041 - and we have specific needs and perspectives as we navigate preschool and out-of-school time, enroll our children for the first time in school, and set our children up for long-term academic, professional, and personal success. The decisions that the board makes today are the ones that will affect our children's education for years to come.

Secondly, I have deep experience in public education that I believe would be an asset to the board and district administration. I've dedicated my career to figuring out how to make public education systems work so that each student is positioned for success, which requires educators to be set up to do their best work in classrooms every day. THE MAYOR'S CORNER

Extreme Weather

It would be an understatement to say that weather in Northeast Ohio has been extreme in recent weeks. With eight tornadoes touching down across nearby communities, multiple earthquakes shaking Lake County, and torrential 30-year thunderstorm events drenching the entire region, we have all been affected. The fallout from this extreme weather has ranged from basement backups from stormwater to trees smashing into homes to power outages at over 140,00 homes (some lasting up to a week).

Here in Lakewood, on Wednesday August 23rd we saw more rain in a shorter time than any other city in our county – nearly four inches fell in just a few hours. This storm, along with a similar storm in July, were both measured to be 30 year plus storm events. Unfortunately, that overwhelming amount of precipitation resulted in many residents

experiencing flooded basements and the misery that comes with it. This was not unique to Lakewood as these backups occurred throughout Cuyahoga County and the region.

The overall systems our cities have in place were simply overwhelmed by Mother Nature. Whether it was Bay Village or Gates Mills, homes and businesses were soaked and suffering. The storm was so severe that ODOT completely closed Interstate 90 in both directions through Lakewood, while our Fire Department had to perform swift-water rescues of ten motorists trapped in their cars on the highway and at risk of drowning. This endeavor was a first for our brave firefighters.

Following the storm, our Public Works Department has been working heavy hours to deal with the fallout. That includes helping homeowners assess flooded basements; working overtime to run extra refuse routes to pick up trash generated from storm damage; and dealing with the damage to trees across the city.

All of this makes us question what the future holds for weather in Lakewood and Northeast Ohio. How often will we be experiencing these types of severe and even scary climate events in the years to come? Is the new norm that we must deal with an ever-increasing frequency of intense storms? Unfortunately, the signs and the science point to an answer of yes.

With this in mind, the City of Lakewood has been taking steps to be proactive in addressing the threats that climate impacts place on our community. In May, the City officially adopted a Climate Action Plan, which has elements dedicated to ensuring that our community is ready and resilient in the face of an evolving climate and more frequent and intense major weather events.

Lakewood's sewer system is over 100 years old and clearly outdated, so

last year we also dedicated \$25 million in ARPA funding as part of our effort to upgrade the system and continue implementing our Integrated Wet Weather Improvement Plan (IWWIP). The sewer upgrades being implemented include two soon-to-beconstructed sewer overflow basins, one at our sewer plant and another on Lake Avenue, that will provide millions of additional gallons of overflow capacity during major deluges like the ones we have recently experienced. A capital project to upgrade our storm interceptor that runs the length of our city along Edgewater Drive is also currently underway.

The team at City Hall will continue to focus on implementing both our IWWIP and our Climate Action Plan to make Lakewood more climate resilient. While climate change is an issue that affects us all, our city is focused on being a leader in adapting and making sure the impacts to the quality of life for our residents are minimized.

Adoption Tales of Remarkable Rescue Dogs



The 2023 Lakewood Rangers Girls Tennis Team

High School Tennis exists mostly in the shadows—it is clearly not the most publicized sport. But the underlying elements are the same—students working hard at their craft, aspiring to succeed, and a willingness to risk "failure" or at least losing on center stage. It's time to meet our Lakewood Rangers.

This year's varsity Lakewood Ranger Girls team, under coach Becky Pope, features seven hard-working players who, according to our coach, "share a love for tennis, lots of laughter, and the desire to improve and to be the best tennis players they can be." From what I have seen—in both wins and losses—these competitive girls never back down, are enjoying themselves, and get better each time out.

According to Coach Pope, "This season, the Lakewood Varsity tennis team is formed from experience, consisting of three returning varsity players and four former JV players who have advanced through the ranks." The squad has defeated Valley Forge and Elyria—in a match that came down to three third set tie-breakers and a key doubles win. The Rangers also recorded a solid third place finish in Lakewood Doubles Invitational.

"We have a full schedule heading into September and look to be competitive within the GLC this season."

The Lakewood Seven are young, determined and fun to watch. Coach Pope had the following to say about her squad.

At Singles are sophomores Maya Trempe, Delaney Starr, and Abriana Heinz.



"Maya is a returning varsity player, her second year on the team. Maya is playing singles this season and never gives up, tracking the ball down and making her opponents play one more shot."

"Abriana is a returning varsity player (2nd season), bringing experience as she transitions to singles play. She is loving the singles game and the challenge that comes with it."

"Delaney is a second-year player rising from JV last year. Delaney is enjoying playing varsity singles, loving tennis and the challenge, always thinking about how best to improve her game."

Doubles Players include seniors Fiona Gjermeni and Hosanna Mosay and juniors Anna Moore and Lay Phalt Htoo.

"Fiona is a returning varsity player (3rd season) and lends experience in varsity doubles. Her volleys are allowing her to start taking control of points and be a force at net."

"Hosanna is a four-year member of the tennis team, officially joining varsity for the first time. She is steady, knows where to be on the doubles court and is ready for the challenge varsity brings." "Anna is a third-year player joining varsity for the first time, also moving up from JV. Anna is a steady player who uses others' pace well, incorporating it into her doubles game.

Lay Phalt is a first year on varsity player, moving up from JV this season (3rd year season overall). She is a consistent player and tracks many shots down, a valuable component of a doubles team." Having had most of these girls in class, and knowing of the others, I can see why Coach Pope has such positive feeling about her squad.

"All of the girls on varsity are positive and supportive of each other and their JV teammates, taking a leadership role on a large squad of twenty-seven girls. Lots of laughter and enjoyment follows these girls. They all share a passion for tennis, and win or lose, are always strategizing what they want to work on and their next goals for themselves. It is going to be a great season."

While the typical stands at the matches include parents on lawn chairs, the occasional friend and/or teacher, it's clear that for these racquet wielding Rangers, the love of the sport, the thrill of competition, and the camaraderie—carry the day. Long Live Lakewood.

experience working with and within K-12 education systems, I've built an understanding of the opportunities and challenges that schools and districts face. I have worked in research, policy, strategic planning, human resources, finance, and stakeholder engagement,

many of which are key responsibilities of the board.

I'd be honored to bring this set of experiences to the board, and as a prospective board member, I have three priorities.

First, we must protect what's great about Lakewood's public schools. I hear from so many parents, students, and graduates how amazing their education here has been. They've been challenged in their pursuits, felt supported and welcomed as people and as learners, and have been able to explore multiple pathways and interests - these are the things that I want for my kids and for all kids. This doesn't happen without the tireless work of so many educators, leaders, parents, students, and community members, and I'm

committed to continuing that legacy.

We must continue to expand that experience to all students because it's not yet universal. I hear another set of stories about struggling to navigate our schools and their students' needs. I see it in our data as well. For example, the difference in reading proficiency at the end of third grade between our Black and white students is nearly 30 percentage points. We need to continue to work to make sure every student is set up to reach their greatest potential.

Finally, I'd like to focus on community-wide collaboration - how our district, schools, and board partner with students, families, our city government, and the broader community. Together, let's strengthen two-way dialogue, authentic engagement, and deep collaboration in service of our students' education and the strength of our community.



District Completes Summer Capital Projects

When June rolls around and our buildings are no longer filled with the sounds of classrooms and hallways full of students, our Operations Department gets to work making the major repairs and upgrades needed to have our buildings in top shape for the next school year. This summer was no different, and in fact, was probably one of the busiest summers in recent years thanks to some major projects.

With less pedestrian and vehicle traffic going in and out of our buildings and parking lots, summer is an optimal



lot improvements and tree trimming, which are some of the typical summer jobs our Operations Department manages. Emerson, Garfield, Harding, Horace Mann and Lakewood High all saw pavement improvements this summer. Tree trimming and removing took place at Franklin School of Opportunity, Grant, Horace Mann and Lakewood High.

Some larger projects (\$700,000+) were also on tap this summer: roof system replacement at Hayes Elementary and a new turf for the Lakewood High baseball field. The Hayes job was needed to correct a ventilation flaw in the roof when it was installed in 2007. The baseball turf was last upgraded in 2004. Additionally, a contractor will soon begin installing secondary door locks on all of the doors in the District for added protection in our classrooms.

Besides the ball field turf, other surfacing projects include refinishing the Harding gymnasium floor, the work bay for Auto Tech in the high school's D Building and installing a rubber-surface path in the wood chip playground at Horace Mann that will make it easier for our students with mobility assistive equipment to navigate the area.

Finally, the Lakewood High natatorium is receiving an upgrade to the HVAC system. As it is related to air quality, this project will be paid for from federal Elementary and Secondary Emergency Relief funds received following the pandemic.

Lakewood City Schools is grateful that the community's amazing sup-

port of the district has afforded it the opportunity to make these improvements. Maintaining and improving our facilities is part of providing a learning environment that offers students the best chance at success.

Ohio Traffic Safety Office Awards Westshore Enforcement Bureau Funding For Teen Driver Education Scholarships

Westshore Enforcement Bureau (WEB) announces the availability of teen driver education scholarships courtesy of funding from the Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO). The grant will help teenager's in low income and/or families that are struggling financially to get access to free driver training. Attendance at one of the Westshore High Schools in Bay Village, Fairview Park, Lakewood, North Olmsted, Rocky River and Westlake is required. Financially eligible families with students (15 1/2 to 17 yr. old) with a valid temporary permit can be referred through their schools guidance office for an application.

Students who receive the OTSO "Drive to Succeed" scholarship will be able to select driver education training taught by 911 Driving School or Professional Driving School. The OTSO Drive to Succeed scholarship will cover the entire class fee (less \$25.00 deposit).

Young drivers under age 24 are involved in 31% of all crashes in Ohio, but only make up about 13% of licensed Ohio drivers. With the proper education and training, 16-year-old license applicants perform best of all those licensed under age 25 on the on-road test, with a 78% pass rate – compared to a 63% pass rate at age 18.

Since 1975, WEB has provided drug and alcohol prevention services through a broad range of community programs being heralded as a model Ohio Drug Task Force. The Westshore Young Leaders Network (WYLN) is comprised of middle and high school students from its six service communities. WYLN meets monthly during the school year to support young leaders and promote healthy, safe and substance-free lifestyle choices.


