Boom! Cleveland Shops Makes Noise

Gordon Geiger was tired of seeing Amazon trucks roaming his neighborhood. He was concerned when he witnessed the increasing number of big

As the owner of Geiger's, a familyowned, Lakewood institution, Geiger decided to take things into his own hands.

He created Cleveland Shops, an organization of locally owned, independent retailers who joined together to educate the public about the importance of supporting local retailers.

That was nearly five years and a pandemic ago.

While the concept was welcomed by retailers on both sides of Cleveland, plans to launch were ill-timed. Marketing slated for March, 2020 was postponed because of the Covid outbreak. Momentum was lost. Plans for moving forward were put on hold.

That was then...

Today, Cleveland Shops boasts nearly 40 impressive retailers as members.

On June 1, it will launch its first major marketing promotion, "Boom!"

"Boom! connotes increasing sales at the cash register. It's the surprise that our members have in store for those on our e-newsletter list and our followers on social media," Geiger explains.

Followers of Cleveland Shops and subscribers to its e-newsletter will gain exclusive access to sales, previews of trunk shows and more.

Boom! exclusives will announced to this group on the first and third Monday of the month. Lakewood retailer The Tea Lab,

another Lakewood retailer, will launch the promotion on June 1. Retailers have the option of creat-

ing one-day or one-week promotions. One retailer will be featured during each of the promotions. "We believe this will be an excit-

ing way for Clevelanders to discover our outstanding members as well as a means for other retailers to learn the value of Cleveland Shops. Shopping local is not only beneficial for the retailer, it's important for our economy and the landscape of our cities. We can't survive without marketing. Cleveland Shops helps us achieve our goals," Geiger adds.

Human Services Department Is A Testament To The Spirit Of Lakewood

The City of Lakewood provides many highly visible services to our residents, from the public works department who are always out and about improving and maintaining things to our police and fire department who patrol our streets and respond to emergencies in vehicles and uniforms we all readily observe. One department that can fly under the radar but also provides a major benefit for the people of Lakewood is our Human Services Department.

In Lakewood, we are proud that our concept of providing services also extends to the deep and important work done by our Human Services Department. That includes work at Cove Community Center and in homes across the city. Human Services Director Chad Berry and his team provide an impressive breadth of support to our seniors, youth, families in need, and those living on the edge and facing crisis.

On any day at Cove, you might find a social gathering for Lakewood residents (everything from a Leap Year Dance Party to Breakfast with a by Meghan George

Bunny); a financial literacy class; or the Human Services team figuring out an emergency plan for a resident whose heat went out or who lacks air conditioning on a sweltering day. That is just the tip of the iceberg, and it would be impossible to list all their efforts and impact in a single column.

In 2023 alone, an average of 150 community members came through the doors of Cove Community Cen-

ter daily to participate in activities and programming. Seniors and family room participants checked in to our Human Services programs close to 29,000 times. Nearly 19,000 home meals were delivered, and over 12,800 congregate meals were served. The work of the Human Services department is a testament to the spirit of Lakewood and how deeply we care for

and lift each other up.

I also want to highlight the efforts that Director Berry and his team make to successfully apply for outside dollars to support our work. In 2023, they obtained funds from NOACA (Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency) that paid for over 80% of the cost of a new senior services transportation van and were also able to increase one of our county grants by over \$125,000. This year, Human Services has already secured a \$45,000 grant from the Healthy Aging Grants program, a state program designed to help provide funds to services aimed at increasing the quality of life for seniors. This consistent work to find additional dollars is a huge help to our quality of services and is critical in limiting costs for our taxpayers.

Total ankle replacement helps preserve range of motion and treat arthritis pain.

If pain in your ankle is interfering with your daily life, Cleveland Clinic orthopaedic surgeon Sagar Chawla, MD, shares some treatment options that can help you return to your favorite activities.

Many people find relief from ankle arthritis pain and stiffness with treatments such as medications, injections, physical therapy or orthotics (special shoe inserts or devices, like braces).

If the pain persists, you may consider total ankle replacement – also known as ankle arthroplasty – a type of joint replacement surgery.

"Ankle arthritis occurs after injury to the ankle and results in ankle stiffness and pain. An ankle replacement allows patients to preserve their range of motion while treating the pain," says Dr. Chawla. "During the surgery, we remove degenerated bone and cartilage and insert new prosthetic pieces which move together, resulting in a fluid range of motion. This flexibility allows you to walk normally, with less pain, and return to a more active lifestyle."

Total ankle replacement is typically an outpatient procedure. In the early days of recovery, you will need someone to drive you to physical therapy and help with daily tasks. Everyone is different, but most patients recover in three to six months.

Ankle fusion surgery – or arthrodesis - is another procedure. Fusion surgery permanently joins the ankle bones together at the point where the cartilage has worn away. This limits your range of motion, affecting the way you walk or possibly causing arthritis to develop in other joints.

Talk to an orthopaedic surgeon to determine which option may best meet your needs.

Dr. Chawla has clinics at Richard E. Jacobs Health Center at Richard E. Jacobs campus in Avon and Lakewood Family Health Center. He performs surgery at Lutheran Hospital, Fairview Ambulatory Surgery Center and Marymount Ambulatory Surgery Center.



Middle School & LHS Mock Trial Teams Shine In Competition

MIDDLE SCHOOL MOCK TRIAL SHOWCASE

Garfield and Harding participated in the statewide Middle School Mock Trial Showcase sponsored by the Ohio Center for Law-Related Education last month in at the State Courthouse in Columbus and came away with many awards, including Best Attorney and Best Witness.

Garfield's three teams together won three of six possible Best Attorney awards and three of six possible Best Witness awards. Harding's two teams won two Best Attorney awards and one Best Witness award.

Garfield's Best Attorneys winners were Tyler Kemp, Avery Spahr, and Adam Tanina. Harding's Best Attorneys were Julia Thomas and Ingrid Matera. Garfield's Best Witnesses awardees were Cory Clemens, Zsofi Flasher, and Henry Trefethen. Harding's Best Witness was Harper Haney.

Forty-three teams from districts across Ohio competed over three days, and only 16 teams scored in the top tier of three scoring tiers. The Garfield Ranger Team received the highest rating of Superior. Garfield Gold and Purple Teams as well as Harding Team 1 received a rating of Outstanding and Harding Team 2 received a rating of Excellent.

This year the Middle School Mock Trials were based on the book "The Giver" by Lois Lowry in which a teenager in a dystopian society risks his well-being and goes against the rules of his community to save the life of a small child.

Each middle school team subdivides into a prosecution and a defense squad, and prepares for two different trials against other Ohio middle schools. Students take on the roles of attorneys, witnesses, and bailiff/timers. The trials take place in front of real attorneys who act as trial judges and who rate teams on case understanding, professional demeanor, oratory skills, and understanding of trial technique and courtroom procedure.

OHIO HIGH SCHOOL MOCK TRIAL

The Lakewood High School Mock Trial Team competed this spring in the 2023-2024 Ohio High School Mock Trial competition, sponsored by the OCLRE (Ohio Center for Law Related Education). Each fall high school teams from around the state prepare a trial based on a case created by a panel of judges, lawyers, and staff. This year's case was State v. Espinoza, which dealt with the history and application of the Excessive Fines Clause of the Eighth Amendment. In this case the LHS team looked at excessive fines in the context of the forfeiture of a classic 1967 Chevy Camaro. This case was argued at the historic Old Courthouse in downtown Cleveland.

Violet Gonzalez and Jay Dozier served as the Timekeepers for the Lakewood team, keeping the lawyers on track throughout the proceedings. Luisa Garcia and Abby Emerson participated as backups for the team, working with the lawyers and witnesses to keep them on target. Alessio Matera and Cameron Wereb served as advisors to their peers providing assistance when needed.

The Prosecution team was composed of Mel Diemert and Mikayla Jaissle, while the Defense attorneys were Gwen Hongosh and Maya Trempe. The lawyers prepared the examination and cross examination of all witnesses, using the case materials and evidence provided by OCLRE. They all were diligent in their preparation and executed their roles

skillfully and with determination.

The witnesses were played by Abby Peck as Ash, Ceci Whiteamire as Harley, Delano Yeung as Makani, and Tarik Ibrisagic as Oakley/Presley. They prepared their parts and helped the lawyers present their best case. The judges thoroughly enjoyed the actors in costume, the manner in which each acted their roles, their knowledge of the facts, and a stellar acting performance. This is especially true for Delano Yeung, who won the outstanding witness in his trial, which he earned by being well prepared and showing dedication to his role.

Lakewood's team worked diligently on the case materials as they organized strategy and legal arguments. This tight knit team of students prepared from October through January, on their own, to prepare for the Mock Trial competition. They presented a lively trial and impressed the judges with their preparation, questions, arguments, and appropriate objections.

The team wishes a fond farewell to Cameron Wereb, who recently graduated. However, the good news is that none of the other members of this year's mock trial team will be graduating this spring, which should make for a stronger, more experienced team for next season.

The 2023-2024 Lakewood Team was led by teacher/moderator Mr. Joseph Lobozzo, with assistance from local attorneys Amelia Leonard and Dan Shields. The moderators are especially proud of this year's team, as they organized themselves and prepared their own schedule to work on this year's trial.

The mock trial team is open to all Lakewood High students. The team encourages everyone to join them next year, including those who participated in the Middle School Mock Trial at Harding and Garfield middle schools.

Lakewood Municipal Court Modernizes With Technology

Modernizing the Court is a priority for me because technology brings efficiency and access to the Court. We have successfully implemented several technological advancements and I am excited to inform you about the progress. I am very pleased to announce that the Court recently launched a new website that is freshly improved, updated, and user-friendly. Navigating any website should be easy and rather intuitive, and we strived to do just that. The website contains an abundance of useful information about the types of cases that are processed and heard in the Court, FAQs, making payments online, the various departments that comprise the Court, and much more. I encourage you to take some time to check out the new website, which can be found at www. lakewoodcourtoh.gov.

A much needed improvements were made to the Court's Probation Department. It included implementing a new software program in 2023. The software program is an excellent source to collect data about the types of offenses committed, the Ward where the offense occurred, recidivism information and more. The new system helps the probation staff in countless ways. Probation staff are occupied conducting pre-sentence investigations, collecting information from victims including restitution, all while managing their caseloads. They are tasked with monitoring persons on probation to ensure they are complying with the Court orders issued from their sentencing. All this information, including individuals' case history is easily searchable with the new software. In 2023, there were approximately 200 active probation cases. This is a heavy caseload for three probation staff; however, the new software is an excellent support to the Probation Department.

Another advancement the Court made was the implementation of the Probation Department kiosk in the Court lobby. The easy to use and accessible device has simplified and streamlined the check-in procedure for individuals under the supervision of the Court. The kiosk has eliminated the monotonous paperwork that pre-



viously was required every time a probationer appeared for an appointment with their probation officer. As a result, the probation staff's time is optimized, and they can concentrate on their client. Once a person completes the check-in questions such as contact information updates, the Probation Department staff receive a notification on their computer that the probationer is ready to be seen. Each individual checking-in receives a timestamp with the date and time for efficiency and verification.

Moving along in our efforts to modernize the Court, we engaged in services for scanning the hundreds of thousands of civil paper documents being physically stored by the Court. Records retention rules promulgated by the Ohio Supreme Court preclude courts from ever destroying certain court documents. Other records eligible to be destroyed are subject to timelines. The physical records have outgrown the available space. Scanning the documents preserves them digitally. It also opens the door to removing the scanned documents

from storage to be shredded. Not only does scanning the records free up space within the Court, but it eliminates manual searches for files that are among thousands of documents. The scanning project is an ongoing endeavor that will last several years because it is such a monumental task. The plan for 2024 is to scan years 2012 and 2013. We are hopeful to also squeeze in years 2014 and 2015. The Court was created in 1928 and there are physical records including docket books from 1968 forward!

Also, the Court is close to opening our Check-In/Self Help kiosk for public use and for court appearances. The hard wiring is almost complete, and the kiosk will be ready to make its debut within a few weeks. Users will be able to view FAQs, search what court forms are required for driving privileges, get assistance in filing small claims cases etc. The check-in process for court appearances will be smooth and timely. Like the Probation kiosk process, individuals checkingin will be placed in order of time of arrival and the information will be transmitted to the court staff computers. Again, this will save a lot of valuable time for staff who currently sit in the lobby to receive individuals. Once the kiosk is functional, staff can then take care of other tasks while the

kiosk takes over the check-in process.

On a final note, you may recall a previous article I wrote regarding a \$425,000 grant award the Court received in 2022. At the end of this year that two year grant will close. We were able to utilize the funds for very important purposes such as to purchase the Check-In/Self Help kiosk and cover the cost of installation, desk scanners for staff in the Clerk of Court department, cover payment for the Public Defender to represent indigent defendants, laptops, and defray some of the cost for the new Court case management system. We remain grateful for the grant opportunity which greatly assisted the Court on many levels, and it is our hope to apply for future grants.

I look forward to keeping you apprised about all the good work the Court is producing and future accomplishments. You as a taxpayer should be proud of the court staff who work hard daily to serve our community. I know I am.

Where To Learn About Water Quality This Beach Season

Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District monitors beach water quality at several Lake Erie Beaches to help beachgoers know what to expect when they visit Edgewater and Villa Angela beaches.

Based on morning predictions observed at the beach and Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District data collection, the Great Lakes Nowcast system predicts beach water quality.

These predictions account for recent weather patterns, rainfall, wind direction, and other factors, that can affect bacteria levels in recreational beach water. Bacteria levels can also be affected by nature. Large



concentrations of gulls and other shorebirds means larger concentrations of bird poop at the beach. Dog waste in areas near our shores is another contributor of bacteria, which is why it is important to Pick Up Poop.

Advisories related to recreation may or may not be related to water quality. Factors beyond water quality such as wave conditions, rip currents, debris, or other issues can also affect beach recreation.

Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs) can affect water quality. When heavy rains produce large volumes of surface runoff, combined sewers may not be able to handle the increase. For this reason, rather than having sewage back up into homes or treatment plants, relief points were designed in the system to release the combined flow to the environment. Those points are called Combined Sewer Overflows (CSOs).

Project Clean Lake is NEORSD's 25-year program that will reduce pollution in Lake Erie by 4 billion gallons per year. Work completed for Project Clean Lake has already led to the elimination of 1.7 billion gallons of overflow from discharging into the environment annually.

There are several ways to access water quality information. You may notice signage on the beach related to water quality. A green sign indicates good water quality, and a red



sign indicates poor water quality. You can visit our website at neorsd.org/beaches for more information.

I've been a proud Lakewood business owner for years and a homeowner here since 2017. As such it's great to see Bike Lakewood – a resident-led advocacy group and chapter of Bike Cleveland - increasing its activities in recent months!

Lakewood currently has the highest marks in Ohio from Walk Score, a company that helps people find walk/bike/transit-friendly areas. (Bike Scores are determined by bike lanes, hills, destinations/road connectivity, and bike commuting/mode share.) Currently Bike Lakewood is spotlighting the City of Lakewood's Bunts Road rehabilitation project. Starting in 2026, Phase One will cover Lakewood Heights Boulevard to Franklin Boulevard and in 2027,

Phase Two will encompass Franklin to Clifton Boulevard.

The improvements will benefit

ALL road users: motorists, cyclists, micro-mobility device users, and pedestrians. Everything from surface drainage to pavement, curbs, and sidewalks to long pedestrian crossing distances to streetlights to updating signage to Clean Water Lakewood to sewer improvement to bicycle lanes will be addressed. Southbound traffic will be maintained, northbound traffic will detour to Warren Road. A small price to pay for such a huge list of safety improvements in our community!

PLEASE NOTE: Bike Lakewood supports Alternative 1, which will get us a 10-foot-wide separated shared use path (reducing accidents/injuries) and curb bump outs for greater connectivity and safety for all. More trees, less impact on traffic and the environment, plus Active Transportation Plan (ATP) and Safe Streets for All (SS4A) progress. Alternative 2 would mean on-street bike

lanes on both sides of Bunts Road.

The City welcomes public comments no later than June 9, 2024 on the project website. Here's where you can weigh in on the future of bike safety in Lakewood:
