On December 11th, the City of Lakewood received the Clean Energy Community Award at the Power A Clean Future Ohio (PCFO) Clean Energy Champions Awards ceremony in Columbus. Jill Bartolotta, Lakewood's sustainability manager, and I proudly accepted this award, highlighting our community's commitment to clean energy and sustainability.

This award celebrates Lakewood's completion of its Climate Action Plan-a bold roadmap for a cleaner, greener future. Through collaborative efforts, we have made significant progress toward ambitious goals, including achieving 100% renewable energy, expanding EV charging infrastructure, and saving taxpayer dollars through energy efficiency measures like transitioning to LED streetlights.

While completing the Climate Action Plan is a major

Antonio Celebrates Passage Of **Dolly Parton's Imagination** Library License Plate Bill

"I am proud to have the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library license plate pass unanimously out of the Senate," said Antonio. "As a parent and former educator, I have been pleased to work with the governor on this important piece of legislation that will benefit children across the state. I also want to thank Ohio's First Lady Fran DeWine for championing this program."

Residents of Ohio will have the opportunity to buy a special license plate with Dolly Parton and an Imagination Library logo for \$25, with the proceeds benefiting Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Ohio. The funds will be used to cover operational expenses, such as book distribution. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has provided one free book a month to Ohio kids aged 0-5 since 2019.

A study conducted by the Cincinnati Children's Hospital found that kids who participated in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library saw a 15.4% increase in Kindergarten Readiness Assessment in just three years from 42.9% to 58.3%. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Ohio, brought by First Lady Fran DeWine, was a primary focus in Governor DeWine's State of the State Address given this year.

Senate Bill 290 now heads to the Ohio House of Representatives.

Antonio Celebrates Passage Of Senate Bill 100

On December 11th, Senate Democratic Leader Nickie J. Antonio (D-Lakewood) celebrated the General Assembly's passage of Senate Bill 100, her bill with state Senator Nathan Manning (R-North Ridgeville) to prohibit the installation of an electronic tracking device on someone else's property without their consent.

"I am pleased to see Senate Bill 100 make its way through both the House and Senate with overwhelming bipartisan support," said Antonio. "Ohioans deserve to have their fundamental rights to privacy protected, and our laws must reflect the changing environment created by emerging technology."

The Senate concurred with House amendments that included strengthening the definition of 'tracking device', authorizing law enforcement to collect oral fluid samples from those arrested for operating a vehicle under the influence, and increasing the fines for repeatedly selling tobacco products to minors.

The bill now heads to Governor Mike DeWine for his signature.

City Enters Formal Agreement

Lakewood To Redevelop Former Hospital Site

I am excited to share some important updates on the downtown development process for the former Lakewood Hospital site. On Monday, Lakewood City Council approved a formal development deal negotiated between the City and the private development team of CASTO Communities and North Pointe Realty. This agreement spells out the final terms of the project and will allow construction to begin in the first half of 2025.

This agreement is a significant win for Lakewood on multiple levels, meeting the goals that our community set out during the initial visioning process. This development will bring with it hundreds of housing units with diverse options; thousands of feet of new commercial space; new jobs and income tax revenue; a welcoming public space;

high quality architectural and environmental design; historic preservation of the Curtis Block; and increased activity in the heart of Downtown Lakewood.

Key aspects of the development include:

Housing: 305 total units of housing, including 293 new apartment units (including a number of affordable units) spread across three buildings, five fully renovated units in the Curtis Block, and seven townhomes on Belle Avenue;

Commercial: approximately 25,000 square feet of new ground floor retail in addition to the renovation of the Curtis Block historic first floor retail space, all of which will add new energy to Lakewood's already bustling

downtown business district;

Outdoor Community Space: a 17,000 square foot plaza and community space (situated between the Curtis Block and the five-story mixed-used building at Belle and Detroit) that will be used for frequent public events and gatherings. This plaza is in addition to a similar sized new public pocket park further south in the development and a linear park along Belle Avenue;

Parking: a total of 567 structured parking spaces, including a 536-space parking garage that will serve the development and also provide additional public parking, and another 31 garage spaces in the five-story mixed-use commercial / apartment building;

Design Aspect: key elements of the design will promote downtown vitality and walkability, including a pedestrian walkway behind the Curtis Block that connects the public community space and another new connection between Marlowe and Belle Avenues.

I want to thank City Council President Sarah Kepple and all the members of Council for their partnership in evaluating and approving the agreement with the developers. Their input and feedback over time was essential. I also want to extend my gratitude to the Lakewood City Schools for their role in supporting this agreement, especially Superintendent Maggie Niedzwiecki, Treasurer Kent Zeman, and Board of Education President Michael Callahan. I also must thank the members of our team at City Hall who worked so hard on this project over many years, especially members of the Planning and Development Department, the Public Works Department, and the Law Department.

Finally, I want to thank you, the members of the public, who attended multiple planning meetings that developed the original community vision and helped shape the final plan. Many voices were involved to ensure that this project was a success and aligned with that community vision set out years ago.

With the final development agreement now approved, the City and CASTO expect construction work on the site to begin in the first half of 2025. We all look forward to seeing the site come to life again as construction begins in the new year.





Holiday Greetings From Lakewood Municipal Court

Judge Tess Neff and her merry band of court employees send our warmest wishes for a happy, healthy holiday season and joyous New Year! With full hearts and fuller stomachs, we share a favorite recipe from the court:

Snow Balls

1 cup butter, softened

½ cup powdered sugar + more for dusting

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 ¼ cups all-purpose flour ¾ cup finely chopped nuts

Heat oven to 400 degrees;

mix butter, ½ cup powdered sugar, and the vanilla in a large bowl. Stir in flour, nuts, and salt until the dough comes together. Shape dough into 1 inch balls and place about 1 inch apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes until set but not brown. Remove from cookie sheet and cool slightly on a wire rack. Roll warm cookies in powdered sugar, cool on a wire rack, and roll in powdered sugar again.





Indoor Riding During The Chilly Winter Months

Many thanks to Lakewood's Spin Bike Shop's Sales & Social Media guru Tim Comerford for sharing his insight for this article.

Winter, winter, winter!

For cyclists who are counting the days till warmer weather and a fresh new cycling season, an option exists that will help keep you in the saddle, boost your mood and maintain and improve your fitness level, all without having to step outside the front door!

This option is the indoor bike trainer. These devices allow cyclists to recreate the feeling of a ride outdoors. Simulation of routes, headwinds, ascents, and descents are all possible. And once you add more technology, you can re-experience routes saved on your GPS bike computer, do structured workouts, even ride (and compete!) in virtual worlds using online programs such as Zwift (which offers fun with avatars — different bikes and jerseys are earned as your skills increase) and TrainerRoad.

With the wheel-off type of trainer, the back wheel of a bike is replaced with the trainer which gets connected to its drivetrain. Wahoo currently has two two-wheels-off types: the KICKR and the KICKR CORE.

The latest type of trainer is also available from Wahoo. According to Tim, the KICKR BIKE Smart Bike is

"pretty rad" - it was made for indoor riding exclusively and doesn't include your bike at all but replicates it to match the settings on your road bike: the height and angle of the saddle, the handlebars, etc. Details such as the angle of sweat pouring off a cyclist's forehead were considered during its design. What does this mean? On an outdoor bike, sweat tends to fly off one's face due to wind but when riding indoors, a towel draped across the handlebars is typically needed to catch sweat falling straight down. No towel necessary on the KICKR BIKE Smart Bike. I have one and it's also great for multiple users - switching settings for each rider in the household is a piece of cake. Ace bike mechanic Mitch Gable installed mine with easy-to-follow adjustments for two!

The original wheel-on type, such as those offered by ROCKBROS, is deceptively simple, with both wheels staying on the bike and a roller to provide the necessary resistance. I say "deceptively" because although they are the most basic, these trainers are the hardest to use and are best for more experienced cyclists. I won't even try it but admire those who do. Roller trainers can be great for balance and core work, but for under \$50 more you can get a KICKR SNAP which is also wheel-on but has flywheel technology plus direct connect and Wi-Fi connec-

tivity, updated Zwift-friendly features, and more.

As with any cycling equipment there's quite a price range, but a basic model can start as low as \$150. If you're in the market for a trainer, GearJunkie published online The Best Bike Trainers of 2024 https://gearjunkie.com/biking/best-bike-trainer to help you determine your best option.

Enjoy your winter and start riding indoors now if you're not a year-round rider — consider alternative ways to keep cycling!

Italian Christmas Cookies

I grew up eating these, every year my Aunt Jo would welcome everyone that could possibly squeeze around her kitchen table to help her roll these cookies out. Some of us were better than others, and that just added to the fun of it. She could always tell which ones my mom rolled, telling her to not be so rough with the dough!

I really didn't care for the flavor that much when I was young. Anise is a acquired taste that you come to appreciate as you get older. Sambuca anyone? It tastes like black licorice, and people love it or hate it. You can always substitute lemon or almond extract if you're a licorice hater. It was more about the tradition, and the time spent with family and friends you adored. Telling stories and making jokes while cranking out hundreds and hundreds of cookies.

I haven't made these in too many years to mention, but I'm finding myself craving them to go with my morning coffee this season. They are especially good dunked.

I hope you enjoy them as well and add them to your holiday treats.

Here is my Aunt Josephine's recipe cut down to approximately 6 dozen instead of the 30 that she used to do every year.

For the cookie dough:

- 2 3/4 cups of all-purpose flour
- 2 ½ teaspoons of baking powder ¼ tsp of salt
- 3/4 cup of granulated sugar
- 1 stick of melted butter (Do not use margarine or butter substitute)
 - 2 large eggs (room temperature) 1/4 cup whole milk
- 1 tsp of anise extract (or lemon, almond, or even vanilla)

For the glaze:

- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 5-8 teaspoons of milk
- 1 tsp of whichever extract you put in the dough

Preheat oven to 325°

Use nonstick cookie trays or line with parchment paper

Cream the butter and sugar together in a large bowl with your mixer or by hand with a wooden spoon until the sugar has dissolved.

Add the eggs one at a time and beat until well blended, then add the milk and extract and beat for a minute until smooth.

In a separate bowl, mix the dry ingredients with a whisk or fork until combined.

SLOWLY add the flour mixture, a little at a time to the wet ingredients and mix until well blended.

The dough will be tacky but easy to work with. If it's too sticky, add a little more flour. You can just drop teaspoon size balls onto the cookie sheets, or get creative with shapes like wreaths, candy canes, or simple logs that I think are best for dunking.

Space them at least an inch or two apart, and bake for 8-10 minutes or until just lightly golden brown.

Prepare the glaze by whisking the powdered sugar, milk and extract together until smooth (Add the milk a spoon at a time to desired consistancy). Dip the tops of the cooled cookies into the glaze and sprinkle with festive nonpareils while still wet. (Do this over cooling racks to help with the recycling of spilt sprinkles!)

Let sit out until glaze hardens. They then can be stacked in cookie tins or bagged.
