## **Lakewood Arts Festival**

For one breezy summer day, Detroit Avenue from Belle to Arthur on Saturday, August 2, 2025, 10am-6pm, becomes a creative oasis and brings artists of all disciplines together with 15,000 collectors and art lovers. The juried festival hosts over 175 regional and national artists displaying painting, prints, photography, art glass, ceramics, sculpture, jewelry and more.

Fine art prints and painting selections include works by Eileen Dorsey capturing meditative forests of light and color, emphasizing our connection to nature, Emily Haggard our "Best of Show 2024" offers abstract

acrylic paintings of dreamy botanicals. Akron native Rich Cihlar stencils and spray paints intricate layers and shadows on founds objects like skateboards. Fine print artists are represented by the hand carved and hand colored Lino block prints of Micki Mencin and the illustrative whimsy of Brian Andrew Jasinski of Grey Cardigan.

Returning to the festival this year will be Billy Ritter featuring handmade ceramics, crafted from stoneware and porcelain and Yumiko Goto offering one-of-a-kind ceramics vessels, featuring delicate petals,

#### FirstEnergy Promises To Try To Deliver 3rd World Power To Lakewood

In a series of letters back and forth between city officials and First Energy Management, First Energy offered Lakewoodites a third world solution: "Rolling brown-outs during peak energy times."

Yep, you heard right, we pay our bills, tolerate their wires, poles, exploding substations and transformers, the thanks we get, at some point or points during the week, they will shut your power off with no warning. But just for a bit, even though your power grid is working fine.

You know that weekly food you just put in the

fridge? Don't count on it not spoiling. You know Grandma on oxygen? No problem, she will probably make it. You know those things you need to finish? First Energy said forget it for now. Your fish tank of prized tropical fish? Oh well. Your security lights and cameras? Not an issue according to them.

First Energy told our city officials it is hoped that this only lasts until 2027 or so.

It should be remembered that FirstEnergy was just fined \$20 million a year ago, in connections with charges of "epic utility ripoff that featured more than \$61 million continued on page 3


ebration on Saturday, July 19 Drawing nearly 15,000 Melt-

## THE MAYOR'S CORNER

## Lakewood City Hall Space Challenges Stem Largely From Growth And Evolution Of Police Department

As some of you likely know, the City of Lakewood is currently working to address the longstanding space challenges at City Hall. What some of you might not know is that a large part of this space challenge comes from the growth and evolution of our Lakewood Police Department (LPD) over time. It also involves our effort to better align the amount of working space our police have available to better reflect national industry standards and also what is being provided with peer departments here in Greater Cleveland.

Back in 2023, the City of Lakewood engaged Weber Murphy & Fox (WMF), an architecture and design firm, to help us better understand the challenges at City Hall and explore potential solutions. What became even clearer

during the ongoing analysis was just how cramped things had become for our police officers. Research conducted by our planning department provided further documentation of this issue.

We are all proud of the excellent police work being done by Chief Fischer and LPD day-in and day-out. When City Hall opened in 1960, the total number of officers was 30 fewer than today. Over the past 65 years, the department has evolved with the times to bring in expertise and capacity focused on SWAT, narcotics, crisis intervention and de-escalation, and many other specialized elements. While this work keeps the people of Lakewood

safe, it also has helped cause an unaddressed space crunch for LPD.

What we see in the national market is that the industry standard for square feet per officer is two to three times what Lakewood is providing to our team at LPD. Beyond that, local peer departments – everyone from Bay Village and Westlake to Cleveland Heights and Strongsville – are providing 100% to 200% more space than Lakewood. As we compete with these other local departments for excellence in talent, our inability to provide the baseline for space is a clear disadvantage in recruiting and retention.

Beyond the issue of basic square footage the matter of basic fairness for our female officers is a glaring problem. When the current City Hall building was completed in 1960, Lakewood had a grand total of zero female officers. While I am very proud to say that today

we can claim that nearly 20% of our force is female, I am dismayed to report that although the city has invested twice in enhancements over the last decade, our female officers lack adequate locker rooms. We must address this situation, and it is one of the reasons we need more space across the board than exists in our current footprint.

There are several other meaningful space challenges at City Hall beyond those faced by our police, but LPD's issues are major and glaring. They are ones that have been known generally for some time, yet left unaddressed and it is time to take them head on. As we work towards the solution to the City Hall space crunch, I am committed to continuing in an active dialogue with our city staff and City Council, as well as with Judge Neff and Lakewood Municipal Court, who are also another key element of the discussion. I look forward to reporting out more on our progress in the near future.

# Updates On City Of Lakewood Efforts City Pushes FirstEnergy For Solutions

The City of Lakewood continues to push FirstEnergy to address the frequent and severe power outages that have been plaguing Lakewood. As many of you know, on June 27th I sent a letter to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) in part-

nership with Councilmen Kazy and Slife of Cleveland to demand action regarding FirstEnergy Corporation's chronic failure to consistently provide power to Lakewood and Cleveland's west side over the past year. PUCO is the only governmental entity in Ohio




Dan walked into our offices selling copiers. Friendship rekindled. His sales stops would turn into hours of conversation about any and every topic.

## How To Keep Your Family Safe Around Water This Summer

After weeks of waiting, summer in Northeast Ohio arrived in full force. And even though our hottest days might be behind us, there's still plenty of summer fun left to squeeze in before the start of school.

Water play can be one of the best parts of summer. It's incredibly attractive to children, especially toddlers. Children love to explore.

But water also comes with risks. Drowning is the leading cause of death for children under 4 years old in the United States. It can happen within seconds or minutes, with no screaming or a lot of splashing.

Drowning is silent and fast, and not always at a pool. A hike near an open body of water can quickly turn deadly.

That's why it is important that you play it safe when it comes to water, whether it's in a private or community pool, the Cleveland Metroparks beaches, or streams and lakes.

## Constant supervision around water is non-negotiable. Be especially alert when:

- Kids are near home pools including inflatable kiddie pools and hot tubs even if they're not supposed to be swimming
- Exploring parks, trails, or anywhere with ponds or rivers
- Older kids are swimming in lakes or oceans with unpredictable currents

Water safety isn't just one action — it's a system of precautions. Experts call it the "Swiss cheese model;" no layer is perfect, but together they make swimming safer.



Elizabeth Krupa, MD, is a pediatrician at MetroHealth Ohio City Health Center.

#### Follow the model's five key precautions:

- Designate an adult water watcher (or several adults in shifts) who isn't using phones or consuming alcohol, to constantly watch children, regardless of whether they know how to swim.
- Introduce children to swimming lessons. Look for courses through the local American Red Cross or your local public swimming pool. Some classes take children as young as 1 year old.
- Make children wear U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets on boats or in open water. Floaties (which are often banned at beaches) are not a substitute for a life jacket or swimming ability.
- Avoid blue swimsuits, which are hard to see under the water's surface. Instead, choose bright colors (like neon orange, neon green or pink) that are easy to see underwater.

• Secure home pools. A pool fence should be at least 4 feet tall, not climbable, and enclosed on all sides. Gates should swing outward, making it harder for toddlers to push open. Install pool surface alarms and door/window alarms for added protection. Anything that invites climbing or jumping over fences (toys, ladders, etc.) should be removed. Drain water after each use.

Older kids may feel more confident around water, but they still need clear boundaries:

- Always swim with a buddy—never alone.
- Choose safe, designated swimming areas.
- Don't swim after dark or after drinking alcohol.
- Watch for chilly water or changing temperatures, especially in lakes or oceans.

Water safety also means protecting your child (and yourself) from harmful sun exposure.

- Wear UV-protective clothing and wide-brimmed hats.
- No direct sun exposure for infants.
- Use broad-spectrum SPF 30+ or higher sunscreen every 2 hours (or right after swimming) on children 9 months and older.
- Stay in the shade or indoors from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. when the sun's rays are the strongest.
- Remember: melanin-rich skin still needs sun protection.

Ask your health care provider for swimming and sun safety advice at your next appointment.



As we continued speaking of his 100 years, he would stop, smile and say, "Then there was the time I fell asleep and woke up with a poisonous snake next to my head where I was sleeping..."

I said, "Ok, that's 2, maybe." He would talk of his family and life at O'Neills then suddenly say, "Then there was the time in the war…" I would say that's 3, then 4, then 5.

It is rare to run into a 70-80 year-old with his amazing retention, and love for telling stories. I personally look forward to hearing the other 230 experiences over the next couple of years.





or so. Call PUCO, let them hear we are tired of 3rd world power at prime rates.

government has no direct power over utilities, we can only advocate.

I am pleased to report that I received a response from PUCO Chair Jennifer French on July 1st which confirmed that PUCO had launched an official investigation in response to the joint letter. Chair French stated that the PUCO Board Members "share and appreciate the concerns outlined in your letter [and] I take the concerns in your letter very seriously [and] I can assure you that the PUCO is engaged in this important matter and we will follow up." I have continued to communicate with Chair French by phone and email following her letter to keep apprised of the process.

In addition to my direct outreach to PUCO, I have been in direct contact with Governor Mike DeWine's office to make him aware of the severity of the issue. The Ohio Governor is charged with appointing all members of PUCO, so it is important that Governor DeWine understands FirstEnergy's failures. I was appreciative that a member of Governor DeWine's team met with me personally at City Hall last week to discuss this matter.

While PUCO pursues its investigation, the City of Lakewood is directly pushing FirstEnergy to disclose the source of the problem and take action. On July 3rd, I spearheaded a meeting at Lakewood City Hall where I along with Cleveland City Councilman Brian Kazy (Ward 16), Lakewood Council

President Sarah Kepple, and State Representative Tristan Rader held a session with FirstEnergy decision makers to demand swift action and long-term solutions. During the meeting, First-Energy acknowledged that the issues do not stem from weather events, accidents, or acts of god, but are instead due to issues with their failing equipment and infrastructure.

In response to demands for a plan to solve the issues, FirstEnergy committed to over \$3 million in repairs and improvements to the substations serving Lakewood and Cleveland, including the replacement of a transformer and new breakers. Unfortunately, they will not commit to permanent fix until 2026 or 2027 which is completely unacceptable.

While their track recent record of failing to provide reliable power to our community does not give me much faith, I left the meeting with clear commitments from FirstEnergy that PUCO can use to hold them accountable. We will keep the pressure on FirstEnergy to meet these commitments and continue following up with PUCO on their own independent investigation of these chronic power outages. I continue to urge any of you that experience outages to directly contact PUCO as well. The more voices the better so they fully grasp just how severe this problem has become. I will keep our Lakewood community updated on our progress ongoing to address this situation.


