


Permanent Disability Horror Story No. 3 Juana Yolanda Jimenez

The Schwarzenegger Administration's Disability Rating Schedule severely cuts benefits to permanently disabled workers.

About Me: My name is Juana Yolanda Jimenez. I am 59 years old and was born in Guatemala. I am a U.S. citizen and I live in San Pablo, near Oakland.

My Family: My husband and I have raised five children, ages 22 to 37.

My Job and What Happened: I have worked at the Hyatt Regency Embarcadero in San Francisco as a room cleaner for the past 20 years. Several years ago I fell while cleaning a bathroom, and by May 2004, I was in such pain I



couldn't continue to work. I had ruptured 3 disks in my back, and my doctor asked for permission to do a back fusion. However, the insurance company wouldn't approve that surgery, so he performed a laminectomy. Unfortunately, that surgery was unsuccessful, and I am now living with severe back pain.

What this has meant to my life: I have lost my job at the Hyatt. I can't clean my own home, much less guest rooms. I have had one surgery, and am awaiting more. I can't walk any distance or lift more than 10 pounds. I used to dance with my husband, Hector, but I can't dance anymore. I can't sit or stand for any period of time. I have pain in my legs and miss living life as I used to.
