## **The CTLA People's Law School Gives Students Understanding and Confidence** *Seminars explain an individual's rights under Colorado law.*

January 15, 2009 (Denver, Colorado) – Attorneys from the Colorado Trial Lawyers Association (CTLA), the largest specialty bar association in the state, have partnered with Colorado Free University to provide students with information about the judicial system and various areas of the law through the CTLA People's Law School.

"Win, lose or draw, people get only one chance to interact with the legal system on an individual case. This gives us a unique opportunity to educate students with information they can use on a daily basis," he added.

All seminars are held from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. at Colorado Free University, Lowry Campus, 7653 East 1st Place in Denver.
