

# MEDICAL ERRORS AND PATIENT SAFETY

## An Epidemic of Medical Errors.

*"For every dollar that was spent in the health care system, about 18 to 45 cents of that dollar went to hurting someone."*<sup>1</sup>

- ✓ The Michigan Health and Hospital Association estimates that a patient safety reform would result in a 40 percent reduction in "Hospital Acquired Conditions" [HAC]; 1,800,000 fewer preventable injuries to patients from a current total of about 4,000,000 annual HACs.<sup>i</sup>
- ✓ 1 in 3 hospital patients are affected by medical errors.
- ✓ Medical errors 10 times more frequent than previously estimated.<sup>ii</sup>
- ✓ 86% of medical errors that result in "harm done to patients" are never reported.
- ✓ Over half of US doctors admit to not reporting medical errors or incompetence.
- ✓ 1 in 7 Medicare patients were harmed or killed by their medical care.<sup>iii</sup>
- ✓ There are 15,000,000 incidents of medical harm each year in the US.

Based on the NCPA estimates **approximately 6,000 Michigan residents die from preventable medical errors each year.** Approximately 10 times that many [60,000] are seriously injured by preventable medical errors. **The cost of these Michigan injuries and deaths is between \$12 billion and \$28 billion each year.**

**Michigan's Failed Effort.** Studies of the looming medical malpractice crisis in the 1980s recommended a 3-prong solution: 1) Medical Safety Reform; 2) Insurance Reform, and: 2) Tort Reform. Michigan ignored the first two and focused only on the last. While medical errors skyrocketed Michigan became "the most tort reformed state."

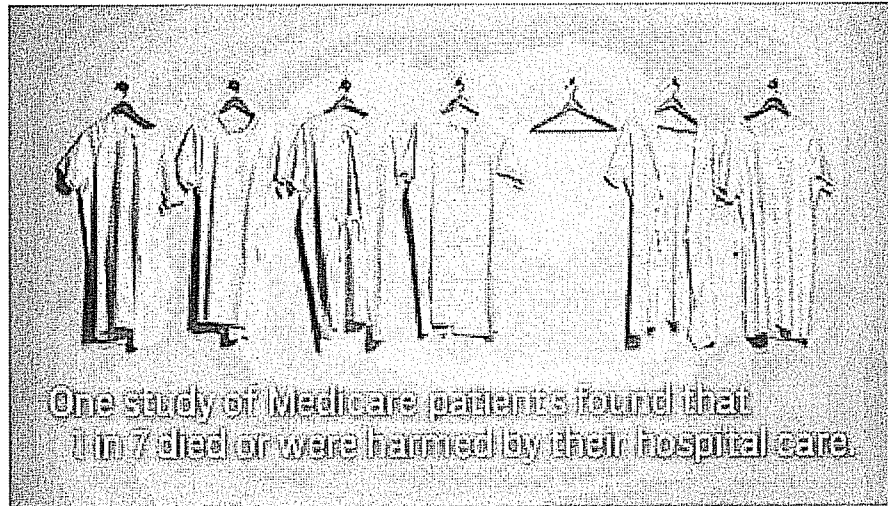
**FAILURE: Tort reform did not reduce medical errors. Tort reform cannot solve these problems and only makes them worse.**

## The Real Solution: Reducing Medical Errors.

The University of Michigan, the Michigan Health and Hospital Association, the U.S. Health and Human Services Department, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and others who focus on patient safety report that **medical errors themselves are the cause of the medical malpractice crisis and these patient safety reforms are the effective solution.**

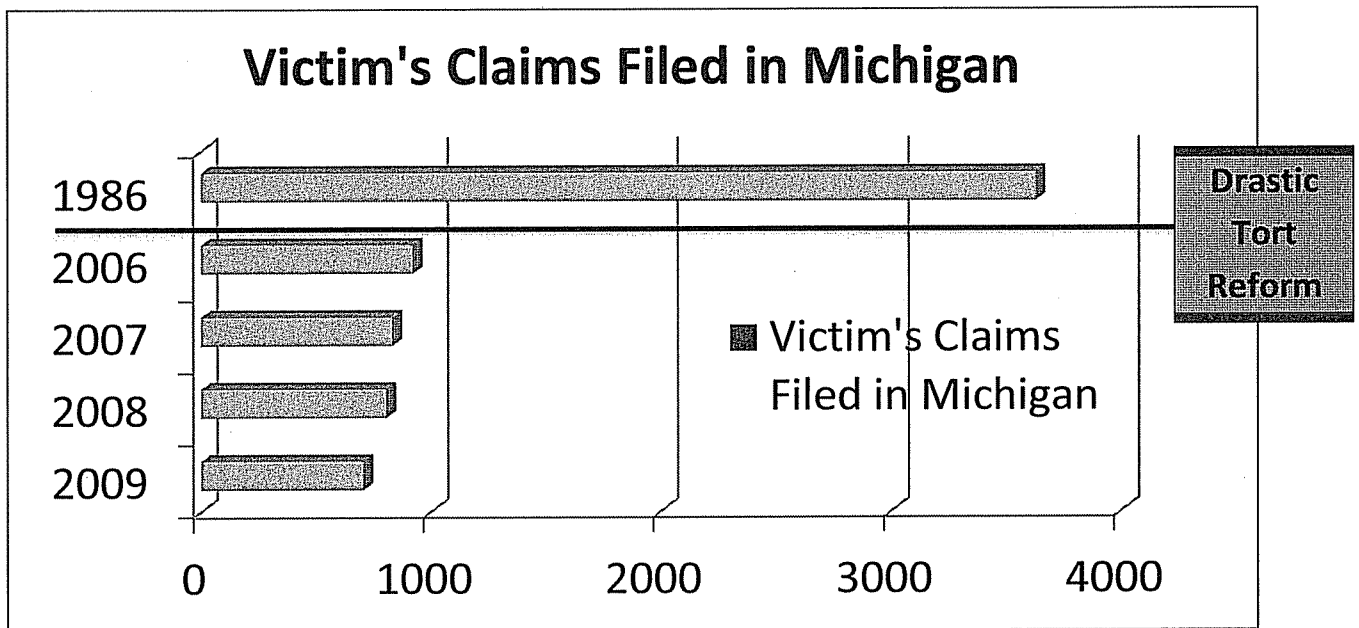
- ✓ **Honesty and transparency**
- ✓ **Mandatory reporting**
- ✓ **Error-reduction policies**
- ✓ **Tracking and discipline for the few 'bad apple' doctors [6%] who cause most medical errors [67%].**
- ✓ **Disincentives for medical errors.**

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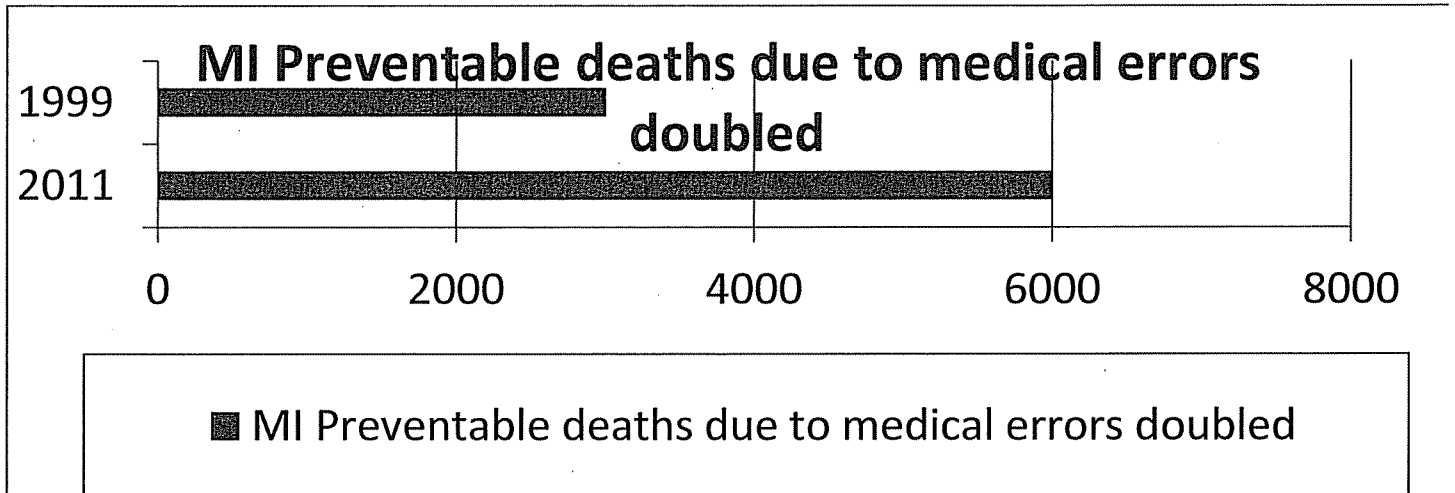

- A small minority of 'rogue' bad doctors cause the majority of medical malpractice
- A mere 6% of doctors are responsible for over 67% of medical malpractice.
- The small minority of doctors who repeatedly commit serious malpractice have often had multiple problems in the past that were ignored by the Medical Board.

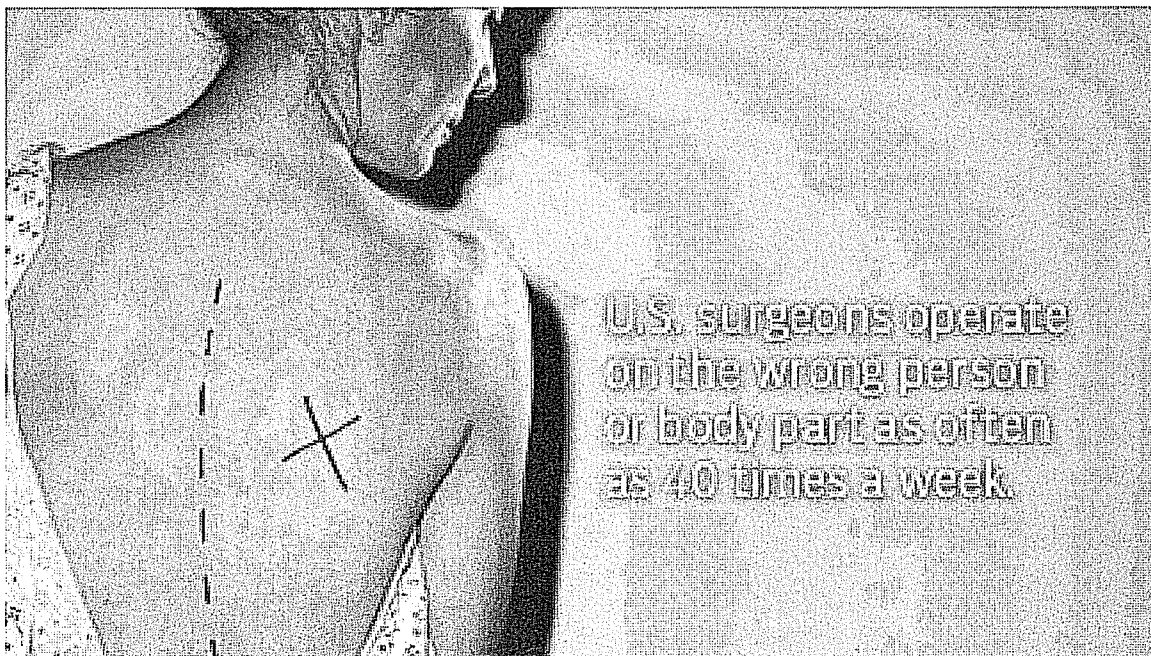
