

**MEMORIAL RESOLUTION**  
**FOR SAMUEL McPHEETERS GLASGOW, JR.**

Samuel McPheeters (Mack) Glasgow, Jr. a well-renowned member of the Nashville Bar, died December 14, 2009, just a few days short of his ninety-third (93<sup>rd</sup>) birthday. Mack professionally practiced law over a span of sixty (60) years beginning in 1941 until his retirement in 2003.

Born on December 23, 1916, Mack was the only son in a family of five sisters of Dr. Samuel McPheeters Glasgow and Samuella Keith Glasgow. He attended Peabody Demonstration School and Wallace School for Boys, winning the Math Award his senior year. In 1999, Mack received the Distinguished Alumnus Award of Wallace School. Mack received his BA degree from Vanderbilt University, where he was President of the Student Union, and his LLB degree from the University of Washington.

Mack served in the United States Army in World War, II in the Field of Artillery, attending Officer Candidate School, and was discharged as Captain in the Judge Advocate General's Department in 1946.

For over thirty years, Mr. Glasgow operated a vineyard on Center Hill Lake. In 1978, Mack, Judge William O. Beach, Homer Blich and others formed the Tennessee Viticultural and Oenological Society of Tennessee as charter members. Mack and Judge Beach were instrumental in changing Tennessee's laws to allow wine making in the state.

Mack was a member of the Nashville Bar Association, Tennessee Bar Association and American Bar Association; the International Association of Insurance Counsel; and a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers. For sixteen (16) years, Mack served as Chairman of the Davidson County Election Commission. Mack also served as a President of the Jr. Chamber of Commerce, at which time the first Clinic Bowl was held as a benefit for the national drive for the eradication of Polio. Mack was a former member of the downtown Rotary Club and the Belle Meade Country Club.

In 2003, Mack retired from the law firm of Glasgow & Veazey, a firm that continues today and honors him by retaining his name. The primary area of Mack's practice was insurance defense litigation. Mack proudly and successfully practiced in the Tennessee State and Federal Courts. Mack was admitted to practice before the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals and the United States Supreme Court.

Mack was a lifelong member of the First Presbyterian Church serving as Deacon and Elder beginning in 1953. He was very supportive of Dr. Walter Courtenay, Pastor of First Presbyterian Church, in starting the Oak Hill School as a part of the church, he lead the ground breaking and served as Chairman of the Board of Directors for the first six (6) years of the school's operation. Mack served on the first Board of Directors of Brentwood Academy. Mack was also active in the Meals on Wheels Program and often offered his services to other charitable organizations.


Mack is survived by his wife of seventy (70) years, Susan Barbara (Bobbie) Leake Glasgow. Mack and Bobbie had four children, Dr. Samuel McPheeters Glasgow, III; Bryant (Bim) Leake Glasgow; Susan Seymour Glasgow Brown; and Emily Risley Glasgow Bruno. Mack also has eight grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Mack was a distinguished attorney who not only devoted a long career to the practice of law, but was a person who devoted much of his time and attention to serving the public.

THEREFORE IT IS RESOLVED by the Nashville Bar Association that we honor the life and work of Samuel McPheeters (Mack) Glasgow, Jr and mourn in his passing.
