EDWARD C. WHITE

The lawyers of the Nashville Bar Association are gathered on this November 18, 1993 to pay our respect and tribute to the memory of our brethren, Edward C. White, who passed away on June 16, 1993 at the age of 75 years.

Mr. White was born in Shelby County, Tennessee. He grew up in Memphis during the depression years along with his parents, two brothers and two sisters. Edward attended school in Memphis and graduated from Memphis State University in 1941.

Edward is survived by his wife, Mary Elizabeth White, and he has children surviving him, John, William, Robert, Janice, Patricia and Brenda and has one child, Edward Wayne, who predeceased him.

Ed and Mary have nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Ed was a "family man", devoted to his family, loved ones and friends. His devotion to his family was life long and as his widow will tell you, that his devotion and loyalty survives to this day. His main concern was that his widow, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren be provided and cared for.

Ed would often enjoy telling of his and Mary's travels. They traveled throughout most of the United States and several foreign countries. Ed especially loved camping and many of their travels included camping and fishing in areas around Tennessee.

Edward White moved to Nashville in 1941 from Jackson, Tennessee, where he worked for the Veteran's Administration. He enrolled in the Andrew Jackson University Law School and graduated in 1949. He started his law practice that year in West Nashville and for forty-five (45) years he maintained a very successful practice of law up to his retirement the first of 1993. Ed's accomplishments in the law and all other areas of life were vast. He was an extremely friendly, warm and concerned person,

and not just for his clients and friends but for the stranger. He was generous with his time and if you asked, also his advice. Ed was, after all is said, a gentleman in his practice of law and his daily contacts with people. Ed was very interested in the furtherance of the suburban practice of law and several years ago was instrumental in getting a suburban lawyers group organized


Ed gave tirelessly of himself toward civic and church affairs. He was a member of Barth Vernon United Methodist Church, the American Legion, the V. F. W. and was past Commander of the Disabled American Veterans.

Edward White served his Country in the Navy during World War II. Ed served in the Cee Bee's and was a highly decorated Veteran. He received the purple heart and numerous other medals and commendations. He served in the South Pacific including the New Guinea campaign. His group built the forward base for General Douglas McArthur leading to the Philippines Campaign. Ed was rightfully proud of his service to his Country.
