

**MEMORIAL RESOLUTION
FOR
WALLACE WALTER DRUECK, JR.**

Wallace Walter Drueck, Jr. died on September 19, 2016. Known by all as “Wally,” he was a loyal friend with a warm heart and was a blessing to those he knew and sorely missed by many.

Wally was originally from Jackson, Tennessee. He began his career in law enforcement by serving as a dispatch operator in the City of Jackson, Tennessee. Wally retired as a Special Agent with the Internal Revenue Service – Criminal Investigation Division in August 2015, where he served for 28 years. During his service as an investigator and forensic computer specialist, Wally’s experiences included security detail for Russian Prime Minister Michel Gorbachov, President George H.W. Bush, and First Lady Hillary Clinton; working closely with Federal Bureau of Investigation and Drug Enforcement Administration investigations of white collar crimes and security details; and was recognized and given a service award by Kenneth Starr for his services in the Whitewater Investigation.

He attended the Nashville School of Law and graduated in 2002 and was admitted to the Tennessee Bar in November of that year. After graduating law school, Wally handled civil and domestic cases on a part-time basis while continuing with his career as a Special Agent with the Internal Revenue Service, where he served as the E-Discovery Program Manager and handled computer forensics and Congressional and Department of Justice requests for his expertise.


Upon retiring from the Service in August 2015, he practiced law in the Middle Tennessee area, handling both civil and criminal cases and maintaining an office in Mount Juliet, Tennessee.

Wally always brought a counselor’s heart to the clients he served, and he always strived to bring integrity and compassion to those in need.




