

H. RAGGIO YOUNG:

H. RAGGIO YOUNG was born in Gainesboro, Tennessee, on June 18, 1892. He was the son of Napoleon B. and Sadie Young.

Mr. Young was educated in the public schools at Gainesboro, Tennessee, and later taught there for a while. He entered the Armed Forces of the United States in 1917, in the First World War and served overseas. Shortly after he ceased to serve in the Armed Forces, he became an employee of the Internal Revenue Bureau, Treasury Department of the United States, being one of its special investigators in the East, and he later served said Bureau in Chattanooga and Nashville,

He resigned as a revenue agent in 1926, and became associated with John S. Glenn as an accountant, and a few years later he attended the Y. M. C. A. Night Law School at Nashville, Tennessee, and became a member of the Nashville Bar, and at the time of his death was, and for many years prior thereto had been, a member of the Tennessee Bar Association and the Nashville Bar Association, formerly the Nashville Bar and Library Association,

Mr. Young specialized in tax and bankruptcy law, and was trustee in bankruptcy in a goodly number of instances. He was trustee in bankruptcy in the Bankers Bond and Mortgage Company case, and largely as a result of his knowledge, application and diligence, all security holders and creditors were paid and the stockholders received a dividend. He also worked long and diligently in the reorganization of the Castle Heights Military Academy, and his efforts were most successful.

Mr. Young was a man of independent thought; was firm but courteous in the expression of his views, and never indulged in ambiguous dialectic. He was a sincere and great believer in constitutional government. He was unassuming in demeanor, but always cordial and friendly with those with whom he came in contact. His devotion to duty and right was of the highest. His practice of accountancy and law was on the plane of integrity and diligence, and those who sought his advice knew that he gave it in the utmost sincerity and after careful investigation of the facts and the law.

On November 25, 1917, he married Miss Nell Fowler Sadler, of Gainesboro, Tennessee, a niece of the late beloved United States District Judge, the Honorable John J. Gore.

Mr. Young died on October 16, 1951, at Thayer Hospital, this County, after a short illness, and is survived by his widow and four sons, H. R. Young, Jr., Kenneth M. Young, Dan Young and John Young, the latter two being in the Armed Forces, the first in the U. S. Army Signal Corps in this country and the latter in the U. S. Air Force in England. Mr. Young was also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Frank Galbreath and Miss Lora Young, both now residents of Washington, D. C. and Mrs. M. B. Sadler of Union City, Tennessee, and by three grandchildren.
