- Effective prayer is exemplified by Elijah (James 5:17–18).

 - 1. <u>Ignorance</u>: Follow a Reading Plan.

"Such a prayer offered in faith will heal the sick, and the Lord will make you well. And if you have committed any sins, you will be forgiven." James 5:15 (p.932)

2. Arrogance: Get a prayer partner.

"Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results." James 5:16 (p.932)

3. Shame: Watch out for one another.

"My dear brothers and sisters, if someone among you wanders away from the truth and is brought back, you can be sure that whoever brings the sinner back from wandering will save that person from death and bring about the forgiveness of many sins."

James 5:19-20 (p.933)
