## Be Kind

Several years ago one of my kids was with-drawn and quiet—a reasonably rare occurrence at our house in those days—so I asked him what was wrong. He hesitated, then with a little prodding told me that it was because I had spoken harshly to him earlier that day.

I wish I could say it was a case of childish hypersensitivity on his part, that he was wearing his feelings on his coat sleeves, that he needed to toughen up . . . but it wasn't that at all. I knew it was true when he said it. I had been impatient, critical, and unkind, and it was bothering him (as it should have).

The Spirit convicted me with Paul's words in Ephesians 4.

Let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths, but only such as is good for building up, as fits the occasion, that it may give grace to those who hear. . . . Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you (vv. 29, 31, 32).

Use your words to build one another up, Paul says, and be kind. The Bible contains a lot of theological mysteries, stuff most of us will never really understand, and then there are a few things that are completely clear. One of them is this: Christians ought to be kind.

On a blog that I read, the writer posted some comments about interviews he had had with people who had left Christianity. At the end of the interview, he asked them what it would take to get them to come back. A com-

ment he heard dozens of times was, "I would consider coming back if I knew people in the church would be nicer." Many of them had apparently been burned by the unkindness of Christians—either as recipients or spectators.

Maybe Paul's words are a needed reminder. Maybe some of us treat strangers more kindly than we do our spouses and kids and siblings. Maybe some of us have forgotten that the church ought to be a safe place where everybody lives by the law of kindness.

Build one another up. Be kind. Be nice.

Christianity certainly can't be adequately described with only those admonitions, but can it be described at all without them?

# **Appoint Elders In Every City**

One of the most fundamental differences between the churches of Christ and all other religious institutions can be seen in the matter of church organization. In Titus 1:5, Paul left specific instructions for Titus to appoint elders throughout the island of Crete. Given what the New Testament says concerning elders and local congregations, we understand that Paul here speaks of each city having a single congregation, and not of a hierarchy overseeing a multiplicity of congregations.

From the earliest days of the church, even in the days when the apostles were still active, the local church was overseen and led by elders. According to the biblical record, James was the first martyr among the apostles in Acts 12. But at the conclusion of chapter 11 we see relief from the brethren in Antioch being sent to the elders of the church in Jerusalem (11:27-30). Even Peter himself, being an apostle, also served a local congregation as an elder (1 Peter 5:1-4).

When Paul and Barnabas made their journey into Pamphylia, Pisidia, and Cilicia (Acts 13-14), they made it a priority to appoint elders in every church (Acts 14:23).

Paul's second journey into that region led to the establishment of the church at Philippi. Yet, in the short time after that event, Paul wrote to the church at Philippi, specifically addressing the overseers, also called elders (cf Titus 1:5, 7).

Finally, in Acts 20, Paul called for the elders of the Ephesian church to meet him in Miletus (v 17). During this meeting, the elders are also identified at "overseers" who were to do the work of shepherding the flock (v 28, cf 1 Peter 5:2).

But what kind of leadership or oversight do we find among most groups today? Among evangelicals, most are committed to the one-person "pastor system." The New Testament never presents a church as being led or overseen by one person called the "pastor." The only time "pastor" is found in the English text is in Ephesians 4:11. In

every other instance where this word is translated, it appears as "shepherd."

In the New Testament, elders, overseers (poorly rendered "bishops"), and pastors (properly, "shepherds") all refer to the same men functioning in the same office.

God's plan for church leadership is a plurality of men serving to lead, feed, and oversee the work of the local congregation. These men must meet the largely parallel qualifications enumerated in Titus 1, and 1 Timothy 3.

#### Mercy

On at least two different occasions, Jesus said, "Go and learn what this means: I desire mercy and not sacrifice" (Matthew 9.13; Matthew 12.7). It's quoted from Hosea 6.6, but in multiple other passages God tells us that He prefers obedience over going through the motions of worship (Isaiah 1.11ff; Amos 5.21; Micah 6; Mark 7).

This is NOT saying that worship is less important than obedience, since obedience causes us to worship. It does show God's attitude toward those who claim to follow Him, but whose actions say otherwise.

Listen to the force behind His words in Amos 5.21, "I hate, I despise your feasts, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies." Israel had adopted some religious and social misconduct.

Do our actions cause God to wince at our worship? Israel was God's chosen nation, but when they neglected to show mercy, justice, compassion, or faithfulness, God rejected their worship and sent them into captivity. So what kind of worship does God love? Obedience, mercy, pursuing good, showing compassion to those less powerful, integrity, justice, and being morally pure (Amos 5.11ff).
