Course Description

Developing additional competence in special areas. Prerequisite(s): <u>ASTU 3350</u>. Advanced standing and consent of instructor. May be repeated for credit.

Course Content + Objectives

This course develops technical and conceptual competence in the extraordinarily diverse and everexpanding field of sculpture. Though it is most commonly defined by three-dimensional form, material and space, the discipline now encompasses everything from found objects and assemblages to largescale public monuments, from kinetic machines to land art and interventions, from ancient relics to immersive new media installations. The possibilities made available by such an expansive field are truly limitless.

This course aims to equip you with the skills to know and express yourself fully, to further explore the relationship between making and thinking, and to apply creative solutions to problems of all kinds. Assignments are designed to promote a sense of autonomy, allowing you to develop your own personal art practice, and to set and meet your own goals as an individual. You will need to be independently motivated, imaginative, resourceful, self-disciplined, and unafraid of failure. You will be expected to connect your visual knowledge to other disciplines, and to view and discuss contemporary sculpture in the context of art history, current events, and social, political and environmental concerns.



Course Structure

Class meetings will vary in nature from day to day, and involve activities such as slide presentations, discussions, group activities, studio workdays, individual meetings, and critiques. There will be three major project critiques held over the course of the semester, at which you will be expected to present one or a series of new works. You will also be asked to give two slide presentations, one outlining a brief history of you and your work, and one describing a studio visit you conduct with a local artist. You will be required to submit a final portfolio at the end of the semester containing images and an image list of work created in this class.

Grading

Your grade will in this course will reflect your commitment to the quality, creativity and timely completion of your work, and your participation in class discussions and critiques.

Projects will be graded on criteria such as:

- 1. Utilization of the basic elements and principles of art & design (form, surface, proportion, scale, etc.)
- 2. Execution (craftsmanship/intentionality)
- 3. Work habits and activity (ability to set and meet individual goals, productivity both in and outside of class, independent research and brainstorming)
- 4. Creativity (ingenuity, innovative use of materials, wonder)

Participation will be graded on criteria such as:

- 1. Your ability to describe, analyze and evaluate your own work and the work of your classmates.
- 2. Your attitude and cooperation with classmates in the studio.
- 3. Your involvement in class discussions (evidence that you have done the readings).
- 4. Your adherence to the studio rules.

Attendance Policy

Attendance is absolutely mandatory on all days, and for the entire class time. Success in a studio art class is dependent upon your participation in the studio activities and your interaction with other students. This cannot occur if you are not in class. Because it is so important, Attendance will account for 10% of your grade in this class. You will be deducted 5 points from that grade for every unexcused absence. You will automatically be dropped from the class if you are absent five or more times. Excused absences are granted only with proper documentation of illness, military service, family emergencies, and the observance of religious holy days. A request to excuse an absence for a religious holy day must be made in advance through the Office of Student Affairs. If you know you will be absent, please email me in advance. In the event of an emergency, please email me as soon as possible. If you are absent from a class, it is your responsibility to inform yourself of the material you missed, and arrive by the next class period fully prepared.

Critiques

Critiques in a studio class take the place of exams and quizzes in a lecture course. Attendance is critical and required. Not only are make ups not allowed, they are not possible. Assignments are due at the beginning of critique sessions, and late work will not be accepted under any circumstance. If you and/or your work are not present for a critique you will receive a zero for that project. An exception to this rule will only be made with proper documentation of an excused absence.

Despite the title, critique sessions are not intended to be forums for demeaning criticism. Critiques provide you with the opportunity to analyze, understand, evaluate, and speak intelligently about your work and the work made by your classmates. Active participation in the critique of a project demonstrates that you have understood the conceptual and technical basis of that assignment. Critiques will also aim to generate an open dialogue about what we value as individuals and as a society, and to promote a sense of participation in broader cultural discourses. Your participation in critiques will account for a large part of your Participation grade.

Readings

The class will be assigned readings from various sources throughout the semester. Interesting conversations result when everyone reads critically, comes to class prepared, and openly joins the dialogue. Please take notes and record questions about the readings in your sketchbook and use those notes to prompt discussions during class. Your participation in class discussions will account for a large part of your Participation grade.

Tool + Material Purchases

The work you do for this course can be executed in the medium and scale of your choice. With that freedom comes a tremendous amount of responsibility: you will need to source and purchase all the tools and materials you require to realize your individual projects. These items are your responsibility and can be purchased at your discretion. Please plan ahead and come to class prepared with whatever you will need to be productive on studio workdays. Permission to leave class to purchase materials will not be granted under any circumstance.

Sketchbooks

Please purchase a sketchbook that you can use as a journal for the semester. It can be whatever size or style you prefer, and it does not need to be dedicated solely this class. You should bring it to class every day, along with the tools you require for drawing (pens, pencils, markers, etc). You should use your sketchbook to brainstorm and sketch ideas for assignments, to record your thoughts and questions about the readings, and to document your independent research.

Saturday & Sunday: Shop and Cage are closed.

- Students may work outside or in the classroom when the shop is closed.
- All tools needed for the weekend must be checked out on Friday. Please plan accordingly.

Studio Rules

The sculpture studio is a sacred and highly cooperative environment that must be treated with respect. Here are some rules to follow in order to maintain a safe, clean space conducive to working:

- 1. The use of laptops and cell phones is strictly prohibited in the classroom except in the event of an emergency. Please turn your phone to silent and keep it out of sight, preferably in your bag or locker.
- 2. Headphones are not to be worn at any time. This is for your safety and the safety of others. Headphones will prevent you from interacting with your classmates and hearing important announcements, and will decrease your awareness in the event of an emergency.
- 3. Wear appropriate shoes and attire. <u>No open-toed shoes are allowed in the shop at any time.</u> Please keep a change of clothes and an extra pair of shoes in your locker so you don't come to class and find yourself unable to participate in the activities.
- 4. Respect the shared tools and materials. If you are unsure how to use a tool, ask for help. If a tool doesn't seem to be working properly, please inform me and/or shop tech as soon as possible.
- 5. Assume responsibility for your own mess and materials. Clean up after yourself, both during and after class.

Final Clean-up

During the time allotted for our final exam meeting, we will conduct a final clean-up of our facilities. Attendance and participation in final clean-up is mandatory, absence will result in lowering your final grade by one full letter. If you are unable to attend final clean-up, you must schedule an alternate date and time.

Office Hours + Email Policy

You are strongly encouraged to make an appointment to meet with me outside of class to discuss your work, interests, questions or concerns. I would love to talk with you over lunch or coffee, or meet you in the studio for extra help with a project. If your schedule prevents you from meeting with me during my office hours, please email me or speak to me after class to request another day/time.

In order to keep my use of technology under control, I check my UNT email twice per day, at 9am and 5pm. I teach from 11am - 5pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays, so I am completely unavailable via email during that time. I will typically read and respond to emails more frequently on Mondays and Wednesdays when I am in the office, and less often Friday - Sunday. I try to reserve Fridays for working in my own studio, and Saturdays and Sundays for time with my family. Please respect my personal time and don't expect to reach me at any hour, especially late at night or on the weekends.

Upon request, your professor will provide a list of chemicals and safety issues for your doctor to review. Material Safety Data Sheets are available on all chemicals. It will be up to you and your doctor to determine what course of action to take.

Financial Aid Satisfactory Academic Progress

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total registered hours per term.
