COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Provides more experience with sewing machine operations and advanced sewing techniques. Flat patterning/Draping and construction skills. Focuses on specialized pattern drafting and draping.

- 1. To build upon the skills learned in Costume I with more advanced sewing and patterning techniques.
- 2. To become familiar with the various fabrics and textiles used in costuming.
- 3. To learn basic flat patterning and draping.

Polyester quilt batting. General sewing kit with thread, sewing needles, hooks and eyes, snaps, skirt hook and bar, tape measure, mechanical pencils.

Things that are great to have but not necessary: French Curve, Tailors Square, and hip curve.

ASSIGNMENTS:

Specifics about the assignments will be given in class. If you are absent on the day an assignment is given, please contact another student for details. Assignments will be listed on the day they are assigned. DUE—means just that—that's when the assignment is due. You may turn in ONE assignment late during the semester, but judge accordingly, because no other assignment will be accepted late—NO EXCEPTIONS. The last day in which to turn in any assignments is: TUESDAY APRIL 29TH. THE late assignments will be docked at least 20%. Final project WILL NOT be accepted late.

- Practical Application of skills in Costume Shop

Practical Application of skills in Costume Shop—Your new skills will be put to practical application in the costume shop. This is different from lab hours assigned to lower level design courses or practicum. You will need to do 10 hours for the entire semester with additional hours applied toward extra credit. You will need to sign up for a specific time in at least 2 hour blocks and will need to keep track of hours in the shop, and use your time well (meaning, they should not be spent sweeping or cleaning up the shop, but constructing costumes for productions). You will be given a note card. On this card you will write the date, time start/end, what you worked on, and signature of the Costume shop manager or shop staff that was supervising you. Hours are due TUESDAY APRIL 29.

Participation: You will also receive a grade for participation. This will be partly based on your attitude in class and attendance. Being punctual to class and good attendance will improve your participation points. Parking issues are not an excuse!

Show Review: You will also be required to see **one** UNT Theatre production this semester. You will need to write a 1 page about what you saw (proof), including something exceptional about this particular production focusing on the costumes.

Expectations: Projects will be worked on outside of class. Expect 4 hours of outside work on this class every week. I don't expect perfection. Corrections can be made for more credit after the initial grading. Growth and improvement is the goal. Try not to get behind!!!!

EXAMS:

There will be no written exams for this class. There may be occasional pop quizzes throughout the semester based on the reading assignments and class discussions.

For the final students will complete a Final Project of their own choice. Criteria for the project:

- It must be approved by the instructor by Feb. 18th
- It can be flat patterned, draped and/or drafted from a sloper and can be made for a ½ size mannequin or for yourself.
- 2-3 commercial pattern that you alter to work together
- commercial pattern that you alter
- It must be either a dress or a combination of a shirt/blouse, skirt/pants, or vest.
- It must include at least 5 elements from the advanced sampler done in class. Additional

- techniques such as dyeing, leather, or adding a mask, a hat, footwear or written sewing instructions will count toward extra points on the final.
- Please wear to final. If you choose to make ½ size outfit I will expect it to be more complicated.

The project will be due at the University scheduled final time which is: **May 8th at 8AM** Please do not be late. Latecomers will be docked.

*Please Note: Final exams will not be given earlier than scheduled. Please do not ask. If this conflicts with your travel plans at the end of the semester, you may want to change your schedule now. This is a university policy and is not subject to pleading, bribing or tears.

EXTRA CREDIT:

You may do extra credit for this class. However, all late assignments must be turned in first.

- You may also see up to 2 UNT or outside theatrical productions and write a review that could earn you a potential 20 points each. Your paper will be graded on content, depth of research. The production may NOT be a high school or community theatre production and MUST be approved prior to using as an extra credit option. The paper should specifically discuss the costumes and different construction techniques that you observed. Each review should be 1 1/2 to 2 pages long, typed, double-spaced and should be a college level paper
- You may also see one ballet or opera using the review criteria. This MUST be approved prior to using for an extra credit option; also up to 20 pts.
- You may spend additional time in the shop working on departmental productions. For
 every hour over the required 10, you can earn 1 point per hour with the shop and may
 not use the hours for any other class. If there is no work available in the shop, the credit
 is not available.

The Maximum amount of extra credit a student may earn for this class is 80 points. All extra credit is due by: TUESDAY APRIL 29TH.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Punctual attendance is mandatory for all classes. The class meets twice a week; 2.5 hours each class. This class is a combination of lecture, demonstration, discussion and lab. Much of the instruction will be in the form of demonstrations. Be ready to be tested on the readings assigned and the information from these meetings. It will not be possible to repeat these demonstrations and/or lectures. You will be responsible for material missed if absent. Ask a friend to teach you what you miss. Parking is not an excuse for missing class!

Theatre is a career based on DEADLINES! Therefore non attendance has a direct correlation with poor and/or missed work. You are allowed 3 absences (10% of the total class meetings). You can earn over 100 points to be added to your grade. If you are present on time when I call roll you earn 4 points. If you come in during roll you lose ½ a point. If you come after roll is taken it is your responsibility to make sure you are marked present and will lose 1 point for the day. If you need to leave class or lab early for any reason even if it's a good one you will lose 1 point. If you are not actively participating in class by sewing, taking notes, or participating in discussion you will lose a point. If you have a bad attitude you will lose a point. If you are not prepared for class with supplies or presentations you will lose 1 point.

The easiest way to pass this class is to show up, participate and turn in assignments! I am an easy grader if you put in the effort!

Communication and Devices:

The use of cell phones, beepers, or other communication devices is disruptive, and is therefore prohibited during class. Except in emergencies please talk with me beforehand and leave the room when you receive the call. During class work time you may use them to review videos from canvas or to listen to music with 1 ear only so we can communicate.
