Course Description

Creative project presentation and extended artist statement in lieu of a written thesis.

*Must be taken with your major professor.

Course Outcomes

- Individuate an approach to visual artmaking and address self-defined research projects with distinct and challenging parameters
- Demonstrate the visual, verbal, and writing skills needed to engage with contemporary discourse in contemporary art
- Display a familiarity with historical and contemporary approaches to visual art and their interrelationships
- Demonstrate an ability to communicate through oral and written communication skills
- Demonstrate the ability to plan and meet deadlines

Course Structure

We will meet periodically on Friday afternoons as a group at 2pm, or individually as follows:

- 2pm Chenxi: in your private studio or another place scheduled.
- 3pm Magaly: in your private studio or another place scheduled.
- 4pm Sunil: in your private studio or another place scheduled.

We will meet weekly as laid out in the Calendar.

There are 4 modules, each with several graded assignments. The first Module will examine professional documentation of creative research. The second module will examine the progression of the Extended Artist's Statement. The third Module will cover prestnations (Review and Defense). The fourth module will idetify a series of deadlines for completion of this capstone cours and the MFA degree.

Photographic documentation assignments must be professional quality.

Written assignments must follow standards of spelling and grammar and citation.
