Course Description

This is a creative arts core course! *Music Appreciation* focuses on the appreciation and analysis of music as a creative work of the human imagination. In so doing, this course develops critical listening and analytical approaches to all kinds of music.

The course is designed so that you can be successful without a background in music. A musical performance background (reading music notation) is also not a prerequisite. The main requirement is a willingness to listen carefully, listen wider, and to reflect on those experiences.

Course Structure

MUMH2040 is divided into four big units, which are broken up into weekly course materials and assignments. Canvas holds the learning objectives and detailed schedule for each week.

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

There are no prerequisites for this course.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course you will be able to:

- define and recognize “traditional” and “humanistic” musical elements and how they intersect and diverge
- explore the concepts of musical taste and analyze music both in and outside of your taste boundaries
- create a variety of creative musical pieces that explore course concepts
- listen to a wide range of musical examples across all kinds of genres, styles, and historical periods

UNT Creative Arts Core Objectives

- Through historical documents, contemporary scholarship, and musical examples you will cultivate the critical thinking skills needed to introduce problems and questions; present, interpret, and analyze a variety of source material; consider the context of a variety of source material; develop arguments with a logical progression; and present conclusions and their implications. (Core LO: Critical Thinking)
- You will develop communication skills by writing and speaking about music with a clear statement of purpose, organization, developed content, and accuracy. (Core LO: Communication)
- By exploring music both in and outside of your musical taste, you will learn social responsibility by acknowledging and assuming diverse cultural/intercultural perspectives; exploring aspects of civic responsibility; and reflecting personally on the ability to understand, recognize, and even challenge notions of cultural bias. (Core LO: Social Responsibility)
- As team members, you will be asked to contribute, prepare, collaborate, foster constructive team climates, and respond to feedback constructively related to the music and sources studied in this course. (Core LO: Teamwork)

Statement on Use of AI: Prohibited Use

In this course, I want you to engage deeply with the materials and develop your own critical thinking and writing skills. For this reason, the use of Generative AI (GenAI) tools like [Claude, ChatGPT, and Gemini] is not permitted. While these tools can be helpful in some contexts, they do not align with our goal of fostering the development of your independent thinking. Using GenAI to complete any part of an assignment or coursework will be considered a violation of academic integrity, as it prevents the development of your own skills, and will be addressed according to the [Student Academic Integrity policy](https://policy.unt.edu/policy/06-003) (<https://policy.unt.edu/policy/06-003>).

If you submit work where AI has generated incorrect knowledge (chapters/quotes from Ratliff, for example, that are hallucinated) you will receive **no credit** for your work and there will be no recourse to revise and

resubmit.

Instructor Feedback

Due to the class size, I will return feedback on all written assignments within two weeks of the due date. If I see that I will be unable to return your feedback within that timeframe, I will post an announcement to let everyone know when it can be expected.

Late Work

The album reviews and creative assignments have a 3-day grace period in the event of unforeseen technical difficulties or life emergencies. That means students can submit **their assignments** up to 3 days after the due date without penalty.

Of course, if something unforeseen happens and you need additional time after the 3 days, please contact me (not a TA!) directly **before the assignment is due** regarding an extension.

Late work will not be accepted for TBL activities (RATS/Application Questions) or iClicker activities, as students will complete more assignments than needed to earn full points.

Attendance Policy

We will take attendance regularly, especially to monitor in-class team activities. We will use iClicker with the geo-location enabled, so that you can check into class.

Should you miss class, you cannot earn in-class assignment points or iclicker points. You also should not submit iclicker if you absent, as that is academic dishonesty. If we discover you are completing iclicker questions outside of class, you will be reported to the Dean of Students.

Being punctual indicates our respect for others. Please arrive before class begins to find a seat, prepare your materials, and connect with your peers. More than two instances of tardiness will result in an absence from class. TAs will monitor tardiness and attendance.

Because we will complete more in-class assignments than required to earn the necessary points, it is not possible to make up missed in-class assignments. In other words, it's okay to miss a few classes here and there – you'll be able to make up those points. As a general rule, you can miss around 2 weeks of class (or 6 class periods) without penalty.

Please note that a substantial portion of your grade comes from attendance and participation. If you miss 13 or more class periods, you forfeit all in-class activity points for the entirety of the semester, which means you forfeit a total of 350 points. The total points you can earn will then be 650 points, which is a D in the course.
