Course Description

This course investigates the relationship between music, gender, and sexuality. Perspectives may include, but are not limited to: women as composers, patrons, and performers in a range of historical, geographical, and popular contexts; feminist musicalities; and sexuality and music.

Course Objectives

Students who complete this course successfully should be familiar with women's contributions to music and musical life in in past and current musics. They also should have improved their understanding of the role of gender and sexuality in the creation and reception of music and related arts. It is hoped that the course will support students' progress toward developing their own identities and talents, and their roles in the musical cultures in which we live.

UNT Core Objectives

- Students identify, examine, and describe the multiple ways in which music, gender, and sexuality have been socially constructed and understood. In order to most effectively examine these musical issues, students will introduce problems and questions; present, interpret and analyze historical documents and contemporary

scholarship related to the music being studied in this course; consider context and credibility of source material; develop and present arguments; and present conclusions, while assessing their implications. (**Core LO: Critical Thinking**)

- Students will evaluate and communicate how gender has influenced all realms of music and media—from composers, musicians, performers, and audiences. To communicate these perspectives effectively, students will be asked to present a central idea; organize material cohesively; develop content; and apply rules of Standard English in their arguments. (**Core LO: Communication**)
- Students will recognize the concept of social responsibility by articulating the influences and effects that music, gender, and sexuality have on one another, as well as the impacts and effects of other categories of social and cultural identity such as race, ethnicity, and class. Students will acknowledge and apply diverse perspectives; acknowledge and apply civic responsibility; and articulate insights about personal attitudes, behaviors, or beliefs as they relate to music, gender, and sexuality. (**Core LO: Social Responsibility**)
- Working as a part of a team, students will participate in frequent in-class group activities and complete a final creative project. Throughout these activities, students will reflect frequently on how best to contribute to a group; prepare and collaborate with a team; foster a constructive team climate; and respond to feedback constructively. (**Core LO: Teamwork**)

Should you miss class, you cannot earn in-class assignment points or iclicker points. You also should not submit iclicker if you absent, as that is academic dishonesty. If we discover you are completing iclicker questions outside of class, you will be reported to the Dean of Students.

Being punctual indicates our respect for others. Please arrive before class begins to find a seat, prepare your materials, and connect with your peers. More than two instances of tardiness will result in an absence from class. TAs will monitor tardiness and attendance.

Because we will complete more in-class assignments than required to earn the necessary points, it is not possible to make up missed in-class assignments. In other words, it's okay to miss a few classes here and there – you'll be able to make up those points. As a general rule, you can miss around 2 weeks of class (or 6 class periods) without penalty.

Please note that a substantial portion of your grade comes from attendance and participation. If you miss 13 or more class periods, you forfeit all in-class activity points for the entirety of the semester, which means you forfeit a total of 375 points. The total points you can earn will then be 625 points, which is a D in the course.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility.
