Course Description

In this class, we will cover three key periods in early American literature: Native and Colonial literature (before 1700), Revolutionary and Early National Periods (1760-1830), and Romanticism (1820-1865). We will read a broad survey of early American literature, including short stories, poetry, drama, and excerpts from novels. In so doing, we will cover not only key literary periods, terms, and authors, but also gain a sense of how American literature illuminates and critiques specific historical events, (re)shaping how we think about what it means to be American.

Course Objectives

Students in this course will be able to:

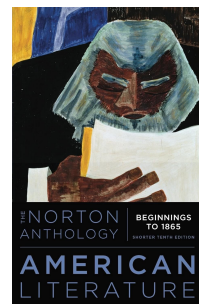
- Identify and define key literary genres and movements from American literature
- Develop close reading strategies to support analysis and arguments
- Synthesize information between key periods in American literature in a final essay

In-class activities/Quizzes/Discussion (25% of final grade)

Students are expected to actively participate in class discussion and collaborative activities. Contributions to discussion will be measured by, among other things, quality of insights, familiarity with the material, responsiveness to the ideas and comments of classmates in both open discussion and small group work, and willingness to take intellectual risks. You should carefully read each day's assignment *before* class ready to respond to the material at hand. Quizzes may be held at the beginning of class

Close Reading Essay (15%)

In this essay you will scrutinize a text's internal complexities. Your analysis should strive for a deepened understanding or a nuanced analysis of the text's meaning (by looking at a particular passage, image, symbol or narrative technique). Your paper must make an argument and develop it with textual evidence. This essay should be between 700-1000 words (not including Works Cited entries or identifying information), typed and double-spaced in Times New Roman 12-point font and properly formatted in MLA citation style, quoting your chosen works appropriately. See formal assignment sheet on Canvas.

Final (Comparative) Essay (20%)

In this essay you will develop connections between at least two of the major historical periods that we have covered over the semester. Your essay should develop a thesis-driven argument about what we can learn from connecting texts across historical periods and literary movements. Your essay should be between 800-1200 words (not including Works Cited entries or identifying information), typed and double-spaced in Times New Roman 12-point font and properly formatted in MLA citation style, quoting your chosen works appropriately. Up to two academic (e.g. published in an academic journal) sources may be used but must be cited correctly in both in-text cites and Works Cited entries. See formal assignment sheet on Canvas.

Midterm Exam (20%)

The midterm exam will consist of a variety of multiple choice, short answer and essay questions. The midterm will cover our readings and class discussions up to the midterm exam.

Final Exam (20%)

The final exam will consist of a variety of multiple choice, short answer and essay questions. The final exam will cover readings and class discussions after the midterm exam.

Instructor Policies and Expectations

Participation and Civility:

We are all members of an academic community where it is our shared responsibility to cultivate a space where all students/individuals are valued and where both they and their ideas are treated with respect. Therefore, I expect you to conduct yourself in a professional and respectful manner during all classroom interactions and activities. Late Policy

In-class activities/Quizzes/Discussion are designed to assess your preparation for class discussion. I will drop two grades in this category to account for general absences or missed readings. You are welcome to complete a 1-page close reading essay for up to 80% for missed or failed activities in this grade category.

Your close reading essay will have a one-day grace period. Essays turned in two days late will receive up to 90%, three days late up to 80%, four days late up to 70%.

Your final comparative essay will have a one-day grace period. Grades are due shortly thereafter. If you have an extenuating circumstance, please reach out to me.

Midterm and final exams will be held in person. We will discuss allowable resources in advance of our exams. Attendance is critical on exam days.

In this class we will cover foundational texts that continue to shape American democracy, history, and culture. I want *you* to develop the critical skills to analyze these foundational texts to be able to better engage in the marketplace of ideas about what it means to be American. Your ideas, your thinking, your writing are all forms of power. I urge you to think about the ways that your intellectual and creative powers matter and are a source of hope for a future that is not yet here.

For these reasons and so many others, the use of generative AI writing tools (such as ChatGPT, GrammarlyGO, GPT-3, GPT-4, BERT, or others) is prohibited in this class. These tools do not align with our goal of fostering the development of your independent thinking and critical writing.

Using GenAI to complete any part of an assignment, exam, or coursework will be considered a violation of academic integrity, as it prevents the development of your own skills, and will be addressed according to the Student Academic Integrity policy.
