## **Course Description & Objectives:**

This course introduces the four basic skills of Japanese -- speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Students will gain a solid foundation in Japanese grammar and develop practical written and oral communication skills.

At the end of this class you will be able to:

- Read and write 96 new kanji characters (144 total)
- Talk about family and describe people's appearances
- Talk about vacation plans, past experiences, etc.
- Quote what a person said
- Give opinions
- Describe health conditions and give advice
- Use informal speech when appropriate
- Read and write basic letters, essays, etc.

#### Class & Lab Participation

Both class attendance and lab attendance are mandatory and absolutely essential to your success in learning Japanese. Full participation credit (10 points per class) will be given to those who are present for the entire class period, prepared for class, and fully participating in all activities. Partial attendance or lack of participation will result in deduction of points. You will get 3 free class absences and 1 free lab absence. Absences will only be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or extended illness with documentation (by permission of the program coordinator after the free absences have been used). ). It is not necessary to provide excuses for other absences. After 3 unexcused absences, regardless of reasons with/without appropriate documents, you will lose 10 points for each absence. (Note for TAMS students: If you are absent for any reason, you are required to file an absence report with Dr. Gruver of the TAMS Academic Office.)

#### <u>Essays</u>

You will write two essays over the course of the semester. Essays must be written by hand on the writing paper provided by your instructor. They will be graded on content, language accuracy, and proper formatting. After each essay is checked by your instructor, you will revise the essay. Make corrections by referring to your instructor's feedback. Essays that receive 80% or higher are not required to be revised. Your original score and score on the revision will be averaged. Late essays will drop 10% for each class day late, up to 30% for three class days late. No credit will be given to essays more than three class days late. In the case of the Essay 2 Rewrite, no late submissions will be accepted past the last day of class.

#### Homework

Daily homework consists of vocabulary worksheets, Genki workbook assignments, Kanji workbook, and some other worksheets. Assignments are listed in the schedule. Some will be due in class, and some will be submitted online via Canvas (more details will be made available in the instructions for each

assignment). You can find the worksheets on Canvas. The workbook assignments are from the Genki I Workbook.

For the Genki workbook, checking/correcting your own homework is an important part of the assignment. Use the answer keys on Canvas and follow the procedures below:

- Use a colored pen for the necessary corrections to your answers
- If all items in the section are correct, make a large circle over the section
- Leave sections that require instructor's correction unmarked

DO NOT copy the key! The assignments are important practice and should show your effort and corrections. Copying from the key or from a classmate is both unethical and counterproductive to your learning. Your instructor will check any free-answer sections. If you don't show evidence of trying on your own and checking your answers or you only complete the sections that are in the answer key, your instructor may deny credit for the entire assignment.

Your instructor will accept all late homework ONLY one class day late with 50% credit.

## <u>Quizzes</u>

There will be three quizzes per chapter: two over vocabulary and one over kanji. Your lowest quiz score from each category will be dropped. There are no make-ups for quizzes.

During each chapter, you will also be expected to read the information about the grammar points for each chapter in the textbook, watch some short videos, and complete a short online quiz about the grammar points that will be covered in the chapter. This will give you the opportunity to preview the new information so that you can understand more easily when we discuss it in class. These quizzes are open note and open book, and your 2 lowest grades will be dropped.

## Chapter Tests

There will be three chapter tests, one over each chapter 7, chapters 8-9, and chapters 10-11. Chapter tests focus on the grammar of the two chapters, but also include both new and review vocabulary and characters. Each unit test will include a listening section. If you are absent on the day of the chapter test **one time**, you may contact your instructor to make it up. No excuse or doctor's note is required, however, you are responsible for being the one to contact your instructor in this case. After you have missed one test, you will no longer be able to make up tests, so make sure to look at the schedule and plan in advance.

# Oral Exams

There will be two oral exams. The oral exams will measure your ability to communicate in Japanese.

# Final Exam

There will be a cumulative final exam at the end of the course covering Ch. 7-12. Part of the exam will be multiple-choice and part will be written, including a one-paragraph essay. Please bring a Scantron sheet (882-E) and a pencil to the exam. The exam is in the usual classroom.
