Understanding the processes and policies in American politics is just as, if not more important than, identifying and understanding its institutions. American policies and processes are the result of our opinions and beliefs about what makes a good society. The results of these processes are legislation, regulations, and policies that reflect our beliefs. This course examines these processes and policies in depth. This course provides high value added as the readings compliment the lectures and provide important background for understanding the material. Consequently, viewing daily lectures and completing daily assigned readings are imperative for your success.

A note about the Maymester

This course is an *extremely* accelerated course. In essence, four months of coursework are condensed into just 11 days of instruction. As such, expect to have 3-hour lectures, readings, workbook assignments due on the same day, and tests posted and due within 24 hours. EXTRA CREDIT OPPORTUNITY: Letter to the Editor (due May 31st 11:59pm) Worth up to 5 extra points toward final grade

This assignment requires you effectively demonstrate core competencies of critical thinking, communication, social responsibility, and personal responsibility within the context of civic engagement in the U.S. political process. You must

- Identify a current political issue that affects you and your community.
- Educate yourself about the issue by reading at least three articles from reputable news sources about the issue.
- Identify a media outlet used in your community (this could be a news blog, a newspaper, or a radio station).
- Verify that the media outlet accepts letters to their editorial staff and find the parameters for such submissions.
- Take a screenshot of the submission guidelines.
- Draft a letter (of a length that adheres to the submission guidelines for your particular media outlet, but typically about 150 words) to the editor in which you
 - identify yourself
 - o identify the political issue about which you are concerned;
 - o clearly state a position on that issue (what the government should do or not do); and
 - o provide an explanation for your position that will persuade the readers to agree with you.
- You will submit:
 - o a .doc, .docx, or .pdf version of your letter
 - o a .doc, .docx, or .pdf document listing the three articles you read
 - o a screenshot (.jpg, .png, .pdf) of submission guidelines for the media outlet you chose

Check the letters-to-the-editor guidelines from several newspapers for examples of what a letter-to-the-editor should look like. The following links provide details on submissions to some possible media outlets:
