## **Course Description**

This course is designed to help you learn about various topics related to Japanese culture and become able to read, write, converse, and present about them in various registers at an advanced Japanese level. By exploring five themes related to Japanese society (religion, popular culture, traditional theater, education, and shopping), we will learn new vocabulary, kanji, and grammar, and expand our socio-cultural knowledge.

## **Course Objectives**

- Learn about five aspects of contemporary Japanese society
- Raise kanji, vocabulary, and grammar skills to enable you to engage with a variety of new topics in new contexts
- Present on a story of your choice at different formality levels
- Solidify elementary and intermediate grammar
- Increase overall communicative ability and confidence in Japanese

## **Class Participation**

A significant amount of the practice we do during the course will take place in the class, and interpersonal interaction with other learners and me, your instructor, is essential to your development as a language learner. For this reason, participation in this class will be required for a grade. Full participation credit will be given to those who are present for the entire class period, prepared for class, and fully participate in all activities. Partial attendance or lack of participation will result in a reduction of points.

You will get three free class absences, no questions asked. After that, absences will only be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or illness. If you miss a class, follow the schedule and use the materials on Canvas to keep up. Please contact me by email as soon as possible in case of excused absences.

#### Homework

Homework will consist of:

1) Three worksheets per chapter to help you practice the vocabulary, kanji, and grammar we are covering in class, as well as the material in the reading from the textbook. You can check your

answers with your classmates during class, but students who do not come to class with a finished worksheet will have their grades lowered. **Worksheets will be due at the end of each class.** 

- 2) For one assignment (選択首題) per chapter, you will be given a choice of whether you want to do extra practice with kanji, listening, or reading. You can choose which assignment to do based on what you most want to practice, but you can only select the same option twice. I will provide more details in class and on Canvas during the second week. **Due at the end of class.**
- \*Missed homework assignments due to excused absences may be turned in one week from when the student returns to class for full credit. You must email me beforehand about the excused absences to receive full credit for the assignment. In the event of an extended absence, please contact me as soon as possible so that we can work together to get you caught up.
- \*Late homework may be turned in up to one week after the original due date with a penalty of 10% for each class late.

#### **Ouizzes**

Kanji and vocabulary quizzes will be given three times per chapter. Use the worksheet assignment to help you study the new vocabulary and kanji. A list of kanji and vocabulary to study for each quiz will be uploaded to Canvas and handed out in class. Quizzes may also include kanji and vocabulary from previous chapters. Missed quizzes due to absences cannot be made up, but your **three lowest quiz scores will be dropped at the end of the semester.** 

#### **Chapter Tests**

At the end of each chapter, there will be a test covering its content, vocabulary, kanji, and grammar. There will be no comprehensive final exam. Missed tests because of an excused absence can be made up within one week of returning to class. Please email me to arrange a time to make up the exam. At the end of the semester, if you have taken all the exams, your lowest exam score will be dropped.

#### **Presentation and Essay**

Each student will give a short presentation once in the semester on a Japanese related story from a book, anime, TV show, or movie they have recently enjoyed. Afterwards, the presenter will answer questions from their classmates. Students will also submit an essay draft based on their presentation to Canvas, due on the class day following their presentation. At the end of the semester, students will submit a revised essay incorporating my comments on the draft.
