Course Description

This course is designed to help you learn about various topics related to Japanese culture and become able to read, write, converse, and present about them in various registers at an advanced level. By exploring five themes related to Japanese society (history, traditional crafts, nature, politics, and Japan and the world), we will learn new vocabulary, kanji, and grammar and expand our socio-cultural knowledge. We will read and write about, discuss, and present on the themes.

Course Objectives

- Learn about five aspects of contemporary Japanese society
- Present about topics you are interested in related to these aspects
- Raise kanji, vocabulary, and grammar skills to enable you to engage with a variety of new topics in new contexts
- Solidify intermediate grammar and vocabulary
- Increase overall communicative ability and confidence in Japanese

Course Eligibility

This course is designed for students who have completed at least 6 semesters of Japanese (JAPN 1010, 1020, 2040, JAPN 2050, JAPN 3020 and JAPN 3030), or the equivalent at another university. Students who have studied Japanese informally or in high school may test into this level and receive credit for courses skipped by taking the placement test. Class Participation

A significant amount of the practice we do during the course will take place in the class, and interpersonal interaction with other learners and me, your instructor, is essential to your development as a language learner. For this reason, participation in this class will be required for a grade. Full participation credit will be given to those who are present for the entire class period, prepared for class, and fully participated in all activities. Partial attendance or lack of participation will result in a reduction of points.

If you miss a class, follow the schedule and use the materials on Canvas to keep up.

You will get **three free class absences, no questions asked**. After that, absences will only be excused in the case of university-sponsored activities, religious holidays, military service, or illness.

Homework

Homework will consist of:

1) Three worksheets per chapter to help you practice the vocabulary and kanji we are covering in class, as well as the material in the reading from the textbook. You can check your answers with your classmates, and the **worksheet will be due at the end of each class. However, students who do not come to class with a finished worksheet will have their grades lowered.**

2) For one assignment per chapter, you will be given a choice of whether you want to do extra practice with kanji, listening, or reading. You can choose which assignment to do based on what you most want to practice, but you can only select the same option three times. I will provide more details in class and on Canvas during week two. **Due at the start of class.**

***Missed homework assignments due to excused absences must be turned in one week from when the student returns to class. You must email me beforehand about the excused absences. In the event of an extended absence, please contact me as soon as possible so that we can work together to get you caught up.**

***Late homework may be turned in up to one week after the original due date with a penalty of 10% for each class late.**

Quizzes

Kanji and vocabulary quizzes will be given three times per chapter. Use the worksheet assignment to help you study the new vocabulary and kanji. A list of kanji and vocabulary to study for each quiz will be uploaded to Canvas and passed out in class. Quizzes may also include kanji and vocabulary from previous chapters. Missed quizzes due to absences cannot be made up, but the **three lowest scores will be dropped.**

Chapter Tests

At the end of each chapter, there will be a test covering its content, vocabulary, kanji, and grammar. The lowest chapter test grade will be dropped at the end of the semester. If you miss a test due to an excused absence, please contact me to arrange a make-up exam within one week of returning to class. Otherwise, missed tests cannot be made up.

Final Project

Students will work on a project on a topic of their choice throughout the semester (deadlines noted on the course schedule). First, you will submit a draft on April 3. Then, on April 10, students will workshop their papers in groups during class and submit written comments to their group and to me. At the end of the semester, students will turn in a short essay and present on the topic during a poster session. More details will be provided as each deadline nears.

Extra Credit

There will be extra credit opportunities during the semester, and I will provide more details later in the semester.
