Course Description:

COS 1100 is a first-year seminar course designed to support and enhance success in the College of Science and UNT by teaching and practicing healthy academic habits, connecting students to campus resources, and building a support network of peers, faculty, and staff.

Course Structure:

This course will be held in person once a week. The seminar course will consist of both in-class and Canvas discussions and assignments.

Learning Objectives:

- Implement techniques to enhance preparation for academics and coursework
- Interpret and evaluate personal and career goals
- Utilize faculty/staff and campus resources to address personal, academic, and professional challenges
- Learn and discover new skills as a student, and future skills as a graduate
- Develop a better sense of self-efficacy, and determination of life goals

- Online Canvas course module

Attendance Policy:

Course Participation (40 points)

This class is designed to include active class discussion and participation. Students are expected to contribute to class discussions with relevant, on-topic contributions and to arrive with any required materials.

Daily Planner (40 points)

In this assignment, students will learn to develop strategies best suited for them to help manage their time and responsibilities.

Eisenhower Matrix (40 points)

This assignment will help students identify and develop priorities for tackling different tasks or responsibilities, and enhancing their skills for time management.

SWOT Analysis (40 points)

Students will complete a SWOT Analysis to determine what factors contribute to helpful or unbeneficial strategies for studying and completing course work.

VARK Assessment (40 points)

This in class assignment is a 16-question multiple-choice questionnaire that will provide insight into a student's learning style.

Personality Inventory (40 points)

Students will complete the 16Personalities inventory, which is based off of the Myers-Briggs MBTI. Results will be shared and discussed with an activity.

Marketing Yourself (40 points)

Students will complete an activity to help prepare them for professional communication, social media usage, and networking.

GRIT Gauge (40 points)

The GRIT Gauge is a tool to assess Growth, Resilience, Instinct, and Tenacity. It is available through Canvas and students will receive full credit for completion.

StrengthsQuest (40 points)

Students will complete the Clifton Strengths/StrengthsQuest inventory, which will build upon their experiences, values, and skills to help illustrate their personal strengths.

Final Reflection Paper (80 points)

Students will write a two-page reflection paper summarizing their experience during the semester, this is a cumulative assignment designed to help students reflect and prepare for the next semester.

SPOT Evaluation (20 points)

Students will be encouraged to complete SPOT evaluation for the course and instructor.
