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EDEC 1010: LEARNING WITH AND FROM YOUNG CHILDREN

COURSE OVERVIEW- An introduction to early childhood education and care as a field of study that centers on young children's play, experiences, and identities. This course focuses on observation to account for children's knowledge-production within their everyday social practices. The course will engage students in material and intellectual inquiry that explores the relationships between children's experiences and their human and more-than-human (e.g., technology, the natural world, material objects, etc.) worlds.

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUIRED READINGS- Supplemental readings provided by the instructor using online links, electronic copies, and/or handouts.

COURSE STRUCTURE- The content of this course is divided into 4 weeks. Each module contains a sequenced collection of readings, information, discussion, and assignments designed to teach a specific aspect related to learning with and from young children. **Activities, readings, and tasks are meant to be completed in the order they appear.**

Discussion prompts and assignments are heavily dependent on course readings, videos, and other shared resources; therefore, it is crucial that you complete the readings, watch the assigned videos, and read any additional information before you post a response or complete an assignment.

ONLINE COURSE NETIQUETTE- Online courses provide few opportunities for face-to-face interaction between you, your professor, and your classmates. Since most of the interactivity that takes place in an online course involves text-only discussion, you cannot always accurately "read" body language, facial expressions, vocal inflections, or the changing pace of what's being said. This presents a few challenges and opens up opportunities for classmates to misunderstand what one another is saying.

Course discussions are meant to be personal and will likely contain dialogue involving your belief systems regarding race, gender, sexuality, religion, and politics. Respond in a respectful non-critical tone regardless of whether you agree or disagree with another person's posting or comments. In some cases, discussion threads may make you feel awkward, uncomfortable, or frustrated. When this happens, remain open-minded and remind yourself that others are entitled to have their own perspectives on the issues.

When posting, avoid using language that is angry, sarcastic, or meant as a joke. Without seeing your facial expression or hearing your tone of voice, your classmates might not realize you are joking. When in doubt, ask questions and clarify what the other person is trying to say. Think carefully about the content of your message before posting. If you are uncertain about posting something, it may be best to set it aside, spend some additional time thinking about it, and return to it later. Feel free to contact me privately if you are concerned about "inappropriate" content that's been added to a discussion or if you want to talk over your posting before adding it to the thread.

Be sure to read the entire discussion thread before responding. Make sure your question was not asked, discussed, or resolved previously. Keep your posts to the conversation relevant, brief, and straightforward. If you refer to something a classmate posted earlier, then quote a few lines from the initial text you are mentioning so that it will be clear what you are referring to when your response.

COURSE OBJECTIVES- This course was designed to denaturalize typical ways of seeing and understanding young children, so rather than thinking of yourself as a "teacher," consider yourself someone who has much to learn with and from young children.

As we proceed through this course together, I expect you will be able to:

- Disrupt Western colonial discourses and categorizations of "appropriate/inappropriate" or "good/bad" in viewing children's learning and experiences
- Hone a pedagogy of listening to become keen observers of children being and learning in the world
- Record children's experiences through simple acts of documentation that take up the language of learning with children
- Engage in active inquiry with more-than-human worlds to gain perspective into learning as embodied, experiential, dialogical, and co-constructed
- Develop a curriculum map that features provocations that allow children to inquire and build on previous knowledges

The effectiveness of class discussions depends on your timely and thoughtful contributions. You must post and respond to posts in order to receive full credit for course participation each week.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS- All discussion responses, tasks, and assignments must be completed and turned in on time. Points will be subtracted for each day an assignment is late past the designated due date. I do not provide extra credit assignments, so it is important that you submit your best work by the posted due date. All assignments must be completed in full before they are submitted. Grades will not be given for incomplete submissions. Written assignments must be completed in APA style and submitted via Canvas.

The Educator as Agent of Engaged Learning

The educator as agent of engaged learning summarizes the conceptual framework for UNT's basic and advanced programs. This phrase reflects the directed action that arises from simultaneous commitment to academic knowledge bases and to learner centered practice. "Engaged learning" signifies the deep interaction with worthwhile and appropriate content that occurs for each student in the classrooms of caring and competent educators. "Engaged learning" features the on-going interchange between teacher and student about knowledge and between school and community about what is worth knowing. This conceptual framework recognizes the relationship between UNT and the larger community in promoting the commitment of a diverse citizenry to life-long learning. In our work of developing educators as agents of engaged learning, we value the contributions of professional development

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schools and other partners and seek collaborations which advance active, meaningful, and continuous learning.

Seeing the engaged learner at the heart of a community that includes educators in various roles, we have chosen to describe each program of educator preparation at UNT with reference to the following key concepts, which are briefly defined below.

1. Content and curricular knowledge refer to the grounding of the educator in content knowledge and knowledge construction and in making meaningful to learners the content of the PreK-16 curriculum. 2. Knowledge of teaching and assessment refers to the ability of the educator to plan, implement, and assess instruction in ways that consistently engage learners or, in advanced programs, to provide leadership for development of programs that promote engagement of learners. 3. Promotion of equity for all learners refers to the skills and attitudes that enable the educator to advocate for all students within the framework of the school program. 4. Encouragement of diversity refers to the ability of the educator to appreciate and affirm formally and informally the various cultural heritages, unique endowments, learning styles, interests, and needs of learners. 5. Professional communication refers to effective interpersonal and professional oral and written communication that includes appropriate applications of information technology. 6. Engaged professional learning refers to the educator's commitment to ethical practice and to continued learning and professional development.

Through the experiences required in each UNT program of study, we expect that basic and advanced students will acquire the knowledge, skills, and dispositions appropriate to the educational role for which they are preparing or in which they are developing expertise.

A broad community stands behind and accepts responsibility for every engaged learner. UNT supports the work of PreK-16 communities through basic and advanced programs for professional educators and by promoting public understanding of issues in education.
