Course Objectives

- Learn to blend with other guitarists in band as one section, similar to a horn section in a big band.
- Improve your skills in reading, soloing, and accompanying in various styles and situations.
- Guitarists will arrange one chart for the guitar ensemble. Arrangements will need to have 5 guitar parts, one bass part, and one drum part. This can be an original or a Jazz Standard.

Grading/Assignments

Your grade will be made up of three separate components this semester

1. 1) Attendance (33.3%)
2. 2) Preparation (33.3%)
3. 3) Arrangement (33.4%)

Attendance Policy

Unexcused absences are not acceptable in this ensemble or any UNT ensemble. Communication is key to avoid issues with attendance and in the event of an absence **you must send a sub with your folder.**

With the new schedule change for rehearsals being 2 hours It can be harder to find a sub for that length of time. Consider finding TWO subs that could come in for 1 hour each. It may help make things a bit easier for folks.

If you do need to miss a class for a medical issue or a school-related function, let me know in advance, find a sub, and I will consider excusing it.

Student Arrangements/ Deadlines

Your final major project for the semester will be to complete one arrangement for the guitar ensemble (5 guitars, bass, and drums). This arrangement may be an original composition, or any style of genre that will fit the ensemble appropriately. Parts and scores will need to be computer-notated. We will discuss this project further during class time and I will be available to help. ***Due dates are subject to change per instructor's discretion.

- **1/25 (Sunday): Composition/arrangement selection due**
- **2/15 (Sunday): First draft of arrangement due**
- **3/15 (Sunday): Final arrangement due**

*You can of course do this any time earlier in the semester if you wish to have your arrangement played at an earlier concert before the deadline. I do recommend it!

However, your arrangement must be ready at **least FOUR rehearsals before a concert so everyone can have time to learn it.** If your arrangement is a difficult level for the group, please have it finished earlier than 4 rehearsals so the group can have time to prepare.

Equipment:

The charts that we will play often ask for pedals or require a range typical of a solid body or a semi-hollow body guitar. If you have one, please consider using this instrument in this ensemble. Solid body or semi- hollow body guitars will also help us achieve a better blend.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended that you to schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course before doing so.

Graduates

Students must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total registered hours per term. Music scholarships require a 3.5 cumulative GPA. Students cannot exceed maximum timeframes

established based on the published length of the graduate program. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.
