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Course Description

This course examines the constitutional and statutory bases and judicial interpretations of the procedures governing the administration of criminal justice. The course material is divided into chapters and modules. The order in which we will cover the chapters and modules is provided in the Course Schedule later in this syllabus. Online modules that accompany each chapter will highlight and supplement the assigned text readings. All learning modules will have an accompanying quiz while some learning modules will also have a discussion board. The quizzes and discussion boards that accompany the learning modules are designed to verify and extend your knowledge and understanding of the class materials. The discussion boards also provide a mechanism to apply such knowledge and understanding.

Course Structure

This course will take place completely online through Canvas. The course is composed of several modules. Each module contains relevant chapter outlines as well as other supplementary material as needed. Online materials that accompany each module will highlight and supplement the assigned text readings. The students will also participate in twelve (12) quizzes through Canvas during the course. The students will also have four (4) discussion board assignments, and two exams (midterm exam and final exam), all in Canvas.

Course Objectives

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to: Describe the exclusionary rule and probable cause, analyze court decisions and judicial interpretations involving arrests, searches, and seizures, define the law regarding interrogations and confessions, recognize constitutional rights and defenses during trial, apply contemporary U.S. Supreme Court decisions to fact patterns.

Teaching Philosophy

My teaching philosophy is that students interact with course materials and one another using critical thinking skills. Students should engage with each other throughout the course via the class discussions. At the beginning of each week, the student should refer to the course schedule (see below) for their

reading assignment for that week. After completing each reading assignment in its entirety, the student should open the corresponding module and study the notes. As noted in the course calendar, throughout the semester the student will have discussion posts to complete. They will respond to material that is pertinent to the theme of the course that week and then respond to one of their peers' posts. The textbook chapters and the online modules will help you complete the discussion posts and satisfy all learning objectives. The textbook chapters and online modules will assist the students in completing the online quizzes and exams as well.

Communication Expectations

Correspondence for this course will take place primarily through Canvas Announcements. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

In the event that it needs to be adjusted, I will announce such adjustments to the class. I will make every effort to ensure that any changes to the syllabus benefit the class as a whole. It is the student's responsibility to check announcements/email so that all changes are documented. Failure to obtain syllabus changes because of failure to check and read announcements/email does not constitute a defense against a missed reading, test/assignment date, or other applicable changes.

Course Requirements

Module Quizzes (120 points total)

There will be a total of twelve (12) quizzes in this course for a total of 120 points (each worth 10 points). The quizzes are designed to assess the knowledge that each of you has individually learned regarding the textbook and the course materials. Once you start the quiz you will have only 15 minutes to take it. You may use your textbook and all course materials while completing the quizzes. The quizzes themselves should not be copied or duplicated by you or anyone else for any purpose whatsoever. The university rules concerning academic integrity will be strictly enforced. The quizzes are included in the related Course Materials, under Modules, and should be submitted there. Quiz due dates are listed in the course calendar below.

Discussion Posts (80 points total)

Each student will be required to respond to 4 Canvas discussions throughout the course of the semester. Each Canvas discussion is worth 20 points (up to 15 points for your posting and up to 5 points for your response to another student's posting), for a total of 80 points towards your final grade. The discussions boards will close at the time indicated on the Course Schedule. Discussion posts should include your response to the post, and a response to a classmate's post. Your discussion submission should be thorough and well-written and at least three paragraphs in length. Students must reply to at least one other student's posts for full point potential (responding appropriately and meaningfully). Responses to other students should be at least one paragraph long. Discussion due dates are listed in the course calendar below.

Your discussions will be graded on the depth of explanation, utilization of sources, connection to course materials, specific efforts to back up your arguments with logical points and sources, grammar and spelling, and adhering to the assignment. A detailed rubric for the discussions is provided in Canvas.

To locate the discussion boards in Canvas, click the Discussions tab to the left of the main screen. Select the appropriate Canvas Discussion assignment. Next click on the appropriate forum. To post a comment select "Create Thread." In order to receive full credit, you must post an original response and respond to at least one other students' post. Note that you will NOT be able to see any other students' posts until you have first posted a thread yourself.

Exams (200 points total)

There will be 2 online exams (a midterm exam and a final exam) for this class which will be available on the course site when they are released. The exams are designed to assess the knowledge that each of you has individually learned regarding the course materials. Therefore, I expect your exam responses to reflect your own individual and independent knowledge and work, without assistance from any other person. You may use your textbook and all course materials while completing the exams. The exams themselves should not be copied or duplicated by you or anyone else for any purpose whatsoever. The university rules concerning academic integrity will be strictly enforced. The exams are included in the related Course Materials, under Modules, and should be submitted there.

Each exam will consist of 50 multiple choice questions. Each multiple choice question is worth 2 points. Thus, each exam is worth 100 points. Each exam will cover the assigned text material and the modules in Canvas. Exams are timed (75 minutes), so plan your time efficiently to do your best. You are allowed only 1 attempt to take each exam. Once you start the exam, you cannot exit (and return to) the exam or pause the exam time. For the midterm exam and the final exam, you will have from the date it is released until Sunday at 11:59 pm to set aside 75 minutes to take the exam. Students who do not complete any exam during the scheduled time period will receive a zero for the exam. Exam grades will be available immediately upon completion of each exam.
