Course Objectives:

This course develops elementary music literacy and analytical tools. After a review of fundamentals, the class delves into diatonic harmony. Class activities will develop fluency in analysis, part writing, and model composition. Prerequisites: Must be a music major. Co-requisite: MUTH 1410 (Aural Skills I).

Tutoring Sessions

Each week, the TAs will lead FREE drill/study sessions during their office hours to review concepts and skills from class. These sessions are *open to all students* who want further guided practice on materials from class. Any student may attend as many or a few of these as they wish. TA Office Hours will be determined and posted via Canvas during the first week of classes.

The UNT Learning Center offers FREE tutoring sessions specifically designed for Music Theory students. These sessions follow the speed test topics and/or general topics from Music Theory I. All students should take advantage of the free tutoring from the UNT Learning Center.

***10% extra BONUS points on Tests are available when students show Dr. Graf proof of attendance from UNT Learning Center tutoring or TA office hours.

Attendance

I expect you to attend every class. You can always check your absences on the Canvas column at any time throughout the duration of the class—the posted number of absences does NOT include excused absences. Remember, if you miss class for any reason, you are still responsible to not only know the material covered in the lecture that day, but you are also required to submit all assignments on time. Unexcused absences will include: sleeping in class, leaving class early, distracting other students in class, and not being prepared for class at the discretion of the instructor.

Two tardy arrivals are equivalent to one unexcused absence. Absences and tardiness will affect the final course grade as follows:

0-2 absences: No penalty.

3 absences: Final course grade lowered by 10% (Example: 85%B = 75%C)

4 absences: Final course grade lowered by 20% (Example: 85% B = 65%D)

5 absences: Final course grade lowered by 30% (Example: 85% B = 55%F)

6 or more absences: Final course grade = F

*The TA and I will do our best to alert you as you approach the 5th or 6th absence, but it is ultimately every student's responsibility to monitor absence totals.

-Excused absences include official University or College of Music activities, medical emergencies, all COVID-related procedures, absences with supporting documentation from a doctor's visit, religious observances, and absences accompanied by a note from the Dean of Student's office.

-Excused absences do not count against your attendance or lower your grade. E-mail the instructor as soon as possible (within 48 hours of your last missed class) with the reason and documentation for your absence. If you are ill, please provide a doctor's note, but please keep your medical condition private. If you expect to be absent for several days or weeks, you will have to obtain a note from the Dean of Students Office. If you have a chronic medical condition that might affect your class attendance or performance, please see the Office of Disability Accommodations.

-If any student wishes to dispute an absence as "excused" instead of "unexcused" with the instructor (Dr. Graf, Benjamin.Graf@unt.edu), the student must do so within 48 hours of the last class period they missed. After that 48-hour period expires, the student will have to go through the Dean of Students Office (Union 409) to obtain an excuse note and official UNT documentation in order to request absences to be changed from "unexcused" to "excused."

Assignments

Homework will be assigned weekly. All homework and exams must be completed neatly and legibly—especially if submitted in an electronic/online format (no HEIC files please). Assignments submitted in person are due *to your grader* in class. If you do not understand how to complete an assignment, please see Dr. Graf (or any member of my team), we are happy to help and we will grant an extension if you need one. If you are absent, take a picture and email your completed homework to your grader and CC: Dr. Graf (no HEIC files please).

Please let me know the circumstances for your late Homework, and I will work with you. If you come and talk to me about your late work, I will often let students resubmit, make corrections with me, and raise the score to a max score of 80%. No late work may be submitted after the last day of class. Exceptions for Tests will only be made for unplanned excused absences (emergencies or COVID situations only) or other extreme circumstances at the discretion of the instructor. If you believe that your grader lost or misplaced your assignment, you must obtain instructor permission to resubmit within a week of the grades posting—not during the last week of class.

Financial Aid and Satisfactory Academic Progress

Undergraduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total hours registered. Students cannot exceed attempted credit hours above 150% of their required degree plan. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.

Students holding music scholarships must maintain a minimum 2.5 overall cumulative GPA and 3.0 cumulative GPA in music courses.

If at any point you consider dropping this or any other course, please be advised that the decision to do so may have the potential to affect your current and future financial aid eligibility. It is recommended that you to schedule a meeting with an academic advisor in your college or visit the Student Financial Aid and Scholarships office to discuss dropping a course before doing so.

Graduates

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid. Students must maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in addition to successfully completing a required number of credit hours based on total registered hours per term. Music scholarships require a 3.5 cumulative GPA. Students cannot exceed maximum timeframes established based on the published length of the graduate program. If a student does not maintain the required standards, the student may lose their financial aid eligibility.
