Course Objectives:

This course focuses primarily on common compositional techniques and the harmonic vocabulary of twentieth-century musical practice. We will focus first on diatonic modes and symmetrical scales before moving into atonal set theory and twelve-tone techniques.

Pre-Requisites: MUTH 2400 (Theory III) and MUTH 2410 (Aural Skills III), both with a grade of C or better.

Co-Requisite: MUTH 2510 (Aural Skills IV)

<u>Undergraduates</u>

A student must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) to continue to receive financial aid.
