COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will expose students to the history of public health, major concepts and theories in public health, and the interdisciplinary connections between public health and other areas. Students will also study about domestic and international public health initiatives.

- 3. Explain the various research methodologies used in public health

- 5. Examine evidence supporting the relevance, use, and evaluation of public health
- 6. Demonstrate the role of public health in addressing issues at the local, state, federal, and global levels.
- 7. Identify the primary determinants of health and disease, as well as the determinants of health inequalities among groups distinguished by race, ethnicity, economic status, geographic location, and ability.
 - 8. Demonstrate better problem-solving ability, research talents, and writing abilities.

Participation:

Students are required to complete the readings assigned in the textbook and review the supplemental material before class on Tuesday. Participation points are earned by attending class

Case Study:

Over the semester, you will complete one Case Study, worth 50 points. Each will focus on a different topic related to the course material. Students will be required to submit the assignment on Canvas. Details for each Case Study will be posted in Canvas.

Midterm/Final Exam:

Students will be tested over the information presented throughout the course. Questions will be taken from the weekly quizzes. The Midterm and the Final Exam will each be worth 50% of the final grade.
