COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is intended to introduce students to the field of global public health. Students will become acquainted with the work done in global health to solve transnational health challenges affecting communities all over the world in this course. Students will investigate health outcomes and the elements that influence health in various nations and locations across the world. Students will learn about global health issues as well as the public and private organizations that are trying to solve them. The course will stress the interaction of social, cultural, economic, political, and environmental variables on global health and illness.

Quizzes:

Students must complete weekly quizzes in Canvas. The quizzes will feature questions from the same week's topic. Each quiz will be released on Monday, and students will have until Sunday, 11:59 p.m. the following week to finish it. Quizzes are only available once.

Project 1:

Students will choose a country and the detail specific factors that impact the health of the population. Students will include one current event that is impacting health in the country. In addition to submitting the report, students will read another report and leave feedback for one student's project.

Project 2:

Students will choose two countries and detail specific factors that impact the health of the population. Students will detail the differences between the two countries and explain why differences exist. In addition to submitting the report, students will read another report and leave feedback for one student's project.

Final Exam:

Students will be tested over the information presented throughout the course. Questions will be taken from the weekly quizzes. The final exam will be worth 20% of the final grade. A review of quiz questions will be held before the final becomes available.
