Catalog Description

3 hours. Didactic and experiential training in interpersonal relationships; analysis and application of effective counseling activities.

Prerequisite: COUN 2610 or with permission

Goal of the Course

As a step in the process towards professional growth and understanding of the counseling profession, each student will develop an integrated awareness of self through relationships and acquire skills necessary in building and maintaining therapeutic interpersonal relationships. Each student is expected to be able to apply counseling skills at the end of the course.

Methods of Instruction

This integrative, discussion-based seminar-style course is designed to be highly interactive, and students will be invited to participate in numerous ways. Class readings will be supplemented with classroom lectures, written and experiential activities, discussions, videos, guest speakers, and student presentations.

Participation (10 points):

Participating in classroom discussion is important to the learning experience. Participating in the weekly discussions allows students and instructors to share experiences, explore subject matter, share expertise, and examine the content from new perspectives.

The qualitative participation requirements are:

- Supporting the interactive classroom environment by being responsive to classmates shared experiences in ways that integrate course theories with a practical application of the subject, offering a personal observation or experience, or referencing real-world examples, current events, or presenting current research on the topic.
- Responses in class should encourage further discussion and ongoing dialogue with other students and the instructor in the class. Plan on asking additional, relevant questions about the week's topic.
- Communications in class should be presented in a professional and supportive manner, with respectful tone.

Attendance:

Class participation points are determined by attendance, punctuality, engagement of in class discussions, and participation during in-class exercises. This class will be interactive in nature and therefore active engagement is critical for success in this course. I ask that you come to class prepared by having read and reflected on the reading assignments. The counseling profession is one requiring skills to stay open and engaged with clients and class participation will be designed to help students identify and strengthen their helping skills and skills that make take them out of their comfort zone.

Students in my class will be extended the courtesy of **3 excused absences without penalty**. Absences beyond the 3 excused absences will incur a 3-point deduction. In other words, absence number 4 will earn a 3-point deduction from your final grade. If you are absent from class for a 5th time you will lose a total of 6 points from your final grade. Students absent from class more than 5 times may be subject to withdrawal status or withdrawal fail status. For extenuating circumstance, please see the instructor.

The above policy is intended to allow for reasonable accommodation in case of illness, family emergencies, or transportation problems. Individuals who chose to use non-penalized absences for other situations risk not having allowable absences available when needed. Accommodations will only be made in situations when all absences are severe, extenuating, and documented. Students are responsible for signing the daily roster. Students are also responsible for ALL material and assignments covered on days they are absent. In the event of an absence, please contact a classmate to get pertinent class notes, handouts, etc.

Lateness/leaving early: Class will begin promptly at the scheduled time and end at the scheduled time. The instructor may choose to document late arrivals and early departures as 1/2 absences.

Late Assignments (Effective 1/14/20): For any assignments turned in past the due date, there will be a deduction of points as follows:

COURSE REFLECTIONS (20 POINTS TOTAL)

Students will demonstrate critical thinking skills and mastery of instructional material(s) by participating in (4) Course Reflections. Students must bring an index card listing a minimum of 5 things they have learned, agreed, disagreed, related to, or just found interesting to date to share with their classmates. After sharing in class, students should be prepared and turn in their index cards at the end of class to receive credit.

Here are some helpful prompts to get you thinking:

- 1. The "thing" with which I agreed with most...
- 2. The "thing" with which I disagreed with most...
- 3. The "thing" I would most like to discuss / ask about / reflect upon...

Course reflections will be done tentatively every 4 weeks of the course. Students should be prepared to share reflections orally in class. Each course reflection will be worth 5 points each.

QUIZZES (30 POINTS TOTAL):

A total of 3 quizzes will be given during this course, worth 10 points each. If you are absent from class on a quiz day, you may utilize one of the extra credit options to make up the lost points.

FINAL PROJECT (40 POINTS TOTAL)

Counselor/Therapist Critique Paper:

Students will find an example of counseling/therapy in popular media (e.g. television, or movies) and provide a brief description of the counseling environment, counseling process, and counselor's nonverbal and verbal responses to the client. Students will provide a critique of the counselor/counseling process considering their learning and experiences in this class identifying strengths, weaknesses, and personal reactions. This critique should be written in APA style. Minimum word count 1000, maximum word count 1500. Papers are expected to have correct grammar, punctuation, and spelling. Papers should be turned in on time. See Rubric on Canvas.

Extra Credit Opportunity (5 points): Watch Brene' Brown's *Call to Courage* on Netflix and write a paper (300 words) on your take aways, at least five. Paper should be written in APA style. **Due:** 4/17/2020 by 11:59pm.

Extra Credit Opportunity (2.5 points each): Watch one of Brene' Brown's Ted Talks *The Power of Vulnerability* or *Listening to Shame* https://www.ted.com/speakers/brene_brown and write a paper (150 words) on your take aways, at least three. Paper should be written in APA style. **Due:** 4/17/2020 by 11:59pm.

Other Requirements and Special Note of Instruction

Expectations

Students are expected to turn in written assignments no later midnight the day they are due. Extensions will be granted at the discretion of the instructor PRIOR to the due date of the

assignment. No extensions will be granted the day an assignment is due or after the due date. Late assignments will be penalized 10% for *each day* they are late. Assignments turned in more than 7 days after the due date will **not** be accepted for credit. If you feel you have extenuating circumstances, please request a time to meet to discuss.

Cell phones and tablets must be silenced during class for the respectful learning of all, unless otherwise requested. Students who need to respond to an emergency call may leave the class with minimal disruption.

In this course, each student is required to reflect on one's own developmental journey. This reflection will involve self-examination and sharing of personal information with the class. Therefore, each student should be mindful of what one chooses to share. Discussions, exercises, activities, and presentations in this course may elicit unexpected emotions and memories or uncover previously hidden psychological processes that students may find unsettling. If at any time you feel that you are overwhelmed, please feel free to leave the room, pass from the current activity, and/or talk with the instructor.
