When this is not possible, the instructor will post an announcement to the class.

Course Description

Spanish 2050 online is a language course designed to bring students to an intermediate level of proficiency in the Spanish language. The course focuses on developing Spanish skills in the four areas of communication: listening, speaking, reading and writing. Students will participate in listening comprehension activities, oral projects, in-depth cultural study, readings, audio and video resources, as well as Web-based language interaction. The class will be conducted in Spanish. To further develop the Spanish skills, students are expected to use only Spanish on all assignments.

Important

All quizzes and exams will be taken using LockDown Browser, a proctoring system provided by UNT that requires the use of a webcam. Students are required to record their environment before taking exams and quizzes. Students will be recorded the whole time while being tested, which does not constitute a violation of the student's privacy. If the student does not feel comfortable using a webcam during testing, we suggest they take a face-to-face course. By taking this course, the student acknowledges and accepts that the instructor will be reviewing the videos recorded by LDB.

Course Structure

The course content is organized in weekly modules in Canvas, which cover chapters 15-18 in the textbook (Puntos de Partida, 11th Edition). Each module contains folders with quizzes, specific information, guidelines, and grading rubrics for assignments. Exams and study guides are in the last module of each chapter. To be well informed about the course, students are expected to carefully read the information in the modules in Canvas as the course progresses and as indicated in the Assignments Class Schedule available at the end of this Syllabus.

Readings and Assignments

Weekly readings, pages to study, and assignments are available in Canvas as well as in the Assignments Class

Schedule. It is highly recommended to work on assignments every day. All weekly assignments must be submitted before Friday, 11:59 pm. All assignments for the last week of class are due on Thursday. Late work will not be accepted. **Due date extensions will be granted only in the most extreme cases and per UNT policies as outlined in this Syllabus.**

Course Prerequisites or Other Restrictions

This course is designed for students who have passed Spanish 2040 at UNT or the equivalent. Do not enroll in this course unless you have completed the prerequisites. For more information, please contact the Department of World Languages in LANG 101, (940) 565-2404. If you are fluent in Spanish, please consider taking the placement exam at the main office in LANG. Taking the placement exam will save you tuition money and time. The exam is free of charge, and you will receive the credit hours for the courses you successfully pass. Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Analyze the different cultural aspects of the Hispanic world
2. Discuss topics related to natural and urban environments
3. Talk about relationships and stages of one's life
4. Express contingency and purpose in complex sentences using the subjunctive
5. Recall and describe past events using more complex sentences
6. Discuss about money, finances and job opportunities
7. Analyze situations related to diverse professions
8. Express probability using the future
9. Examine hypothetical events using the conditional
10. Discuss about government and civic responsibilities

- Proofread and fact-check your sources.
- Keep in mind that online posts can be permanent, so think first before you type.

Policy on Late Work

Late work will be accepted only in case of an emergency (Title IX, illness/accident or death in family, military deployment). To be successful in the next level of Spanish, it is highly recommended that students pass this course with a final grade of C or above. A minimum grade of C is obligatory for all Spanish majors and minors.

Extra Credit

Students can earn extra points by doing the SPOT evaluation, taking quiz 11 and turning in early discussions (more details below). The SPOT extra points will be counted towards the exams' category. To receive the SPOT extra points, the student must forward the instructor the confirmation email received from UNT after evaluating. Screenshots will not be accepted.

Connect Homework

You will be assigned a variety of online reading, cultural, Grammar videos and grammar assignments on Connect, the textbook electronic platform. Weekly assignments will be displayed on each module in Canvas. Connect assignments labeled as "Practice item" do not count for a grade. These assignments are individualized according to the needs of each student. You can work on these assignments as many times as needed until you master the concepts. Connect assignments labeled as "Graded Item" will count towards your grade. You must work on all these assignments.

It is highly recommended to work on all Connect assignments before taking exams. Homework will be due every Friday 11:59 pm. **Late work is not accepted.** Using translators or outside help for written assignments will result in a grade of 0 without the opportunity to redo the work.

Writing Assignments

Writing assignments will help you further develop your writing and cognitive skills in Spanish. To receive a grade on writing assignments, the student must write all the writing sections of each exam. Instructions and topics can be found in Canvas. Your writing proficiency in writing assignments must be close to your writing skills in exams. Using translators, ChatGPT, or outside help for written assignments will result in a grade of 0 without the opportunity to redo the work.

Important: If the student's level of writing proficiency in exams differs from the skills demonstrated in writing discussions, the professor will request a meeting via Zoom with the student to speak in Spanish and assess their level of Spanish proficiency.

Speaking Assignments

Video Recordings

Throughout the semester students will record three short video assignments. Videos will be uploaded in Canvas. Some videos will be done as discussions other will be done in collaboration with a classmate. For videos with a classmate, the professor will assign in Canvas the pairs to work together. It is the student's responsibility to consult the list in advance and contact the classmate that has been assigned to work with. Speaking assignments will prepare students for the conversation with the professor that will take place in person in Zoom (or at the instructor's office) at the end of the semester. The purpose of these assignments is to stimulate discussions to practice your Spanish speaking skills. Reading the assignments is not allowed and it will result in a lower grade (10 points) or a grade of 0.

Assignments to Replace 2 Video Recordings

A maximum of **2 video speaking assignments** can be replaced by attending "**The Spanish Club at UNT**" (you must be a member to attend) (**video assignment # 3 cannot be replaced**). You can attend as many sessions as you wish but only two video speaking assignments can be replaced during the semester. Credits will be applied to the week the student attended the activity (or the closest week). To receive full credit, the student must sign in at the event and actively participate. The Spanish Club offers the opportunity to practice your Spanish speaking skills, interact with other students, expand your knowledge on the Hispanic culture through hands on activities, as well as do some volunteer work in the community (not obligatory). The Spanish Club activities for the semester will be posted by your instructor in Canvas as soon as they become available. A flyer with the schedule and activities will also be posted in several places around the LAN building.

Submitting writing and video assignments early to earn 3 extra points

Students who **1)** submit their first post by Wednesday, 11:59 pm; **2)** submit their 2 comments before or by Friday, 11:59 pm, and **3)** comply with all the requirements, will earn 3 points extra credit points, which will be added to the grade score. The purpose of this incentive is to motivate early submission and thereby provide a wider variety of posts for reply commenting by classmates. The extra points do not apply to video assignment 3 because it is not a discussion.

Guidelines to earn the 3 extra points

- a). Comments to each classmate must meet the minimum time required, be substantial, include vocabulary and all the grammatical structures required in the assignment and in the grading rubric.
- b). Students who submit their first post by Wednesday but do not submit their two reply comments will not be eligible for the extra points because they did not fully complete the assignment.

Conversation with the professor (or a classmate)

At the end of the semester, you will have a conversation in Spanish with your professor via “Zoom”. It will cover the communicative functions practiced in class based on the topics of the 4 chapters covered during the course. The conversation will be for **3-4 minutes**. This assignment will be graded on content, incorporation of grammatical structures, and vocabulary studied throughout the course, preparation, pronunciation and use of communication strategies in Spanish. Students will reserve their time slot in advance (on Canvas Calendar) on the date provided by the instructor. Only students who reserve their time slot will be able to access the Zoom on the day of the conversation. The grading rubric, topics to study, and guidelines on how to do well on this assignment are available in the Module “Conversation with the Professor” on Canvas.

Conversations will not be conducted on weekends or after last day of class. It is the student’s responsibility to make the necessary arrangements to have the conversation on the date scheduled. If there is a scheduling conflict with another class, the student must contact the instructor immediately to reschedule.

If you prefer to have the conversation with a classmate in a video recording instead of in person with the instructor, consult the guidelines and due dates in the Module “Conversation with the Professor”. To be accepted, videos must be done in pairs and each student must upload the video in the assignment.

ODA students should contact their professor during the first week of class if they require reasonable accommodations for this assignment.

Lockdown Browser System

Quizzes and exams will be using LockDown Browser System. Instructions and the link to download the application are in the “Where to get help” module. To take quizzes and exams, you will need a webcam on your computer. If your computer does not have a webcam, you can take the exam in the library at UNT or other buildings on campus. Check their schedule or call them in advance to confirm. In Canvas, there is a practice quiz to familiarize yourself with LockDown Browser and learn how to record your environment correctly. If this is your first time using LDB, it is highly recommended to take the practice quiz available in Module “Week 1” in Canvas.

Quizzes

Throughout the semester, there will be weekly quizzes assigned in Canvas (except for the weeks of exam). The practice quiz mentioned above will help you become familiar with the exam format. Quiz 1 will evaluate your knowledge on this Syllabus and modules “Start Here”, “Course Information”, and “Instructor Information”. You will have two attempts for quiz 1. Quizzes 2-10 will cover vocabulary and specific grammar concepts studied during the week of the quiz. Quiz 11 is optional to receive extra credit. Except for the practice quiz, all chapter quizzes are timed, and you will be allowed to take each only once.

Take your quiz and exams as soon as possible. In case of computer problems, you will need time to solve them before the exam/quiz closes. If you experience technical issues, contact the UNT Help Desk for assistance and

request a case ticket number. Then, contact your professor to report the incident. Take a screenshot of the problem and email it to your professor as soon as possible.

This is an online course, and it is the student's responsibility to have a reliable Internet Connection. Exams and quizzes will not be reopened or reassigned if the student has a weak Internet connection, computer issues or uncharged batteries.

Chapter exams

To evaluate your listening, reading, writing, vocabulary, and grammatical skills, there will be four exams (Chapters 15-18) throughout the semester. Exam 4 will be your final exam, and it will be taken on the date scheduled by UNT for all online courses. Study guides and instructions on how to take the exams using LockDown Browser are available on Canvas.

Examination Policy

- Take your quiz or exam as early as possible. In case of a technical issue with your computer, you need time to solve the problem and take the exam before it closes.
- Ensure your laptop is fully charged before starting any quiz or exam. **Make-up quizzes or exams will not be allowed due to computer problems or weak Internet service.**
- To take each exam, you will need your UNT Student ID. If you do not have one, notify your professor immediately.
- You need to have reliable Internet. If you lose Internet connection during an exam, contact the Student Helpdesk and document the remedy ticket number before contacting your professor.
- Each exam will be available ONLY on the days and times assigned.
- Quizzes and exams will be timed and will automatically close at 11:59 pm on the due date.

Student issues with the instructor

When a student has class-related issues with the instructor (e.g., appeal a grade, disagreement about attendance record, interpretation of a class assignment, assigned grades, etc.), the student should follow these steps to resolve:

3. Dr. Weber may meet individually with the student and instructor to resolve the issue.

Grade Appeal Policy

Students should try to resolve the grievance with the professor. If that does not work, the student can initiate a grade appeal with the professor based on one of these three grounds:

- 1) The grade was based on unfair treatment.
- 2) Instructor departed from the standards set out in the course syllabus without a rational academic reason, or
- 3) An error occurred in calculating the grade, including the failure to factor in an assignment, project, quiz, or examination.

Note: If the student is alleging discrimination, they must report this belief to the Office of Equal Opportunity.

Attendance Policy

Student attendance for this online course is defined by working on assignments on time. Students are required to log in to the course by the first day of class or before if possible (the course will open earlier). As part of the attendance requirement, students are expected to check their email and course announcements daily. The student is solely responsible for checking updates related to the course. Note: Nonattendance may affect financial aid. If a student fails to meet the attendance requirements, they may be recommended for withdrawal from the course. In

the event of an anticipated absence, such as a military deployment, the student should contact the instructor in advance to make arrangements for completing the required assignments. In the event of an emergency (illness/accident, or death in the family), a student should contact the instructor as soon as possible, providing documentation to support the need for any late submission of a graded event.

Excused Absences

Important Notice for F-1 Students taking Distance Education Courses

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the [Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website](#). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An online or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission, including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no online or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experiences integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following:

Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.

- (1) Ensure that the activity on campus takes place and the instructor documents it in writing, with a notice sent to the International Student and Scholar Services Office. ISSS has a form available that you may use for this purpose.

Because the decision may have serious immigration consequences, if an F-1 student is unsure about their need to participate in an on-campus experiential component for this course, s/he should contact the UNT International Student and Scholar Services Office (telephone 940-565- 2195 or email internationaladvising@unt.edu) to get clarification before the one-week deadline.

Student Verification

UNT takes measures to protect the integrity of educational credentials awarded to students enrolled in distance education courses by verifying student identity, protecting student privacy, and notifying students of any special meeting times/locations or additional charges associated with student identity verification in distance education courses. Use of Student Work

A student owns the copyright for all work (e.g., software, photographs, reports, presentations, and email postings)

they create within a class, and the University is not entitled to use any student work without the student's permission unless all the following criteria are met:

- The work is used only once.
- The work is not used in its entirety.
- Use of the work does not affect any potential profits from the work.
- The student is not identified.
- The work is identified as student work.

If the use of the work does not meet all the above criteria, then the University office or department using the work must obtain the student's written permission. Download the UNT System Permission, Waiver, and Release Form

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically Delivered Courses

1. No permission is required from a student for their image or voice to be transmitted live via video conference or streaming media. However, all students should be informed when courses are to be conducted using either method of delivery.
2. If the instructor records student presentations, they must obtain permission from the student by using a signed release to use the recording for future classes, in accordance with the Use of Student-Created Work guidelines above.
3. Instructors who video-record their class lectures, intending to reuse some or all of the recordings for future class offerings, must notify students in the course syllabus if their images may appear on video. Instructors are also advised to provide accommodation for students who do not wish to appear in class recordings.

Example: This course employs lecture capture technology to record class sessions. Students may occasionally appear on video. The lecture recordings will be available to you for study purposes and may also be reused in future course offerings.

No notification is needed if only audio and slide capture are used or if the video only records the instructor's image. However, the instructor is encouraged to let students know the recordings will be available to them for study purposes.
