

SPECIAL PROBLEMS - SYMPHONIC LITERATURE II MUAG 4900 FALL, 2024

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Course Times and Locations:

MWF 9:00am-9:50am; MU 232

Course Content:

Broad spectrum study of works in the following categories: concertos, shorter and minor works by major composers, tone poems.

Course Purpose:

To familiarize graduate orchestral conducting majors (and related field) with a larger portion of the symphonic repertoire (from a conductor's point of view) than is possible within graduate conducting courses.

Expected Outcomes:

Significant knowledge of the standard repertoire.

Methods for Assessing the Expected Outcomes:

- 1. Evaluation of individual presentations in class.
- 2. Evaluation of individuals' contribution to class discussion.
- 3. Written and listening exam(s).

Course Requirements:

- 1. Regular class attendance. There is no specific grade deduction for missing class, but regular attendance is assumed. It is best if the professor is notified directly or through another class member if a student will be missing class.
- 2. *Thorough* study of all scores to be studied, including background historical materials.
- 3. High level preparation and execution of assigned presentations.

Attendance and Grading Policy:

- --Regular attendance is expected and required.
- --Students are graded on the following criteria:

15% class participation

35% listening/score ID quizzes

20% written project

30% final exam

Scores can be found on IMSLP and/or PDF's provided by the professor.

Students are responsible for thorough examination and listening (before the class in which the work is discussed!) for each work in its entirety including such details as duration, forces required, plot (if any), and understanding of major sections (movements, etc.).

Written project:

- •Provide an analytical and descriptive chart of an assigned concerto (see attached example).
- •The chart should include the title of the composition, date of completion, composer, and in cyclic works, the number and tempo indication of the movement, the key, and finally the design in which the movement is cast.
- •At the left of the chart should be a series of columns. The column at the extreme left indicates the large sections into which the movement is divided (e.g., Exposition, Development, Subordinate Song). The second column names the sub-sections of the larger parts (e.g., Main Theme, Variation 1) or the design of the section (three-part form, sectional). The third column lists a further breakdown of the large sections (e.g., Part 1, Transition). The fourth column should include measure numbers, the numbers indicating the exact measure in the composition at which each small section begins.
- •The main body of the chart describes each section in as much detail as seems necessary or as space will allow. At the extreme left of the body is the number corresponding to a theme at the extreme right and its appropriate appearance in the course of the score.
- •At the right is notated the principal thematic material which the composer has used to develop the work
- •Instrumentation should be listed at the bottom of the page.
