## GENERAL INFORMATION

### DESCRIPTION

KORE 2040 is the first part of the intermediate Korean courses. This course is designed for students who have completed elementary Korean (KORE 1010 and 1020). This course aims to develop students' interpersonal and presentational Korean language skills in all the areas of listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

### EXPECTATIONS AND GOALS

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to grasp intermediate level of essential grammars, vocabulary and expressions, and demonstrate an awareness of Korean popular cultures such as K-pop, Korean drama and film, and communicate on a variety of topics such as report, presentation, and daily conversations.
